5 new cases of COVID-19 in Myanmar reported on 14 August, total figure reaches 374

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases reached 374 after 5 new cases were reported on 14 August according to Ministry of Health and Sports. Case No. 370 returned from USA, No 371 from UAE and No. 372, No. 373, and No. 374 returned from India. Out of the 374 confirmed cases, six died, 322 have recovered, 314 have been discharged from hospitals and 20 were held under investigation.—MNA

VP U Henry Van Thio looks into development works in Falam, Thantlang

VICE President U Henry Van Thio is making an inspection tour for the development works in Chin State.

He visited the development projects in Falam and Thantlang townships yesterday.

City hall construction in Falam

The three-storey new city hall in Falam Township will be 100 ft long, 60 ft wide and 42 ft high. The Progress of Border Areas and National Races Development constructed the hall with K456 million granted by the Indian government and K50 million from the fund of state development committee.

New building of Falam General Administration Department

The new building of GAD in Falam Township will be 100 ft long, 70 ft wide and 43 ft high, with an estimated cost of K700 million.

During the meeting with the locals in Falam Township at the nursing training school, the Vice President said that his visit to Chin State was to witness the difficulties of local people in transport during rainy season.

The Chin State has enjoyed development significantly thanks to the unity between the government sector and local people, said the Vice President, emphasizing the need to follow COVID-19 prevention guidelines, orders and directive of the Ministry of Health and Sports.

He also advised the locals to vote in the upcoming parliamentary election as it is the only chance in every five years.

The Vice President heard reports on requirements of infrastructural development, upgrade of cyclone shelter and electricity

supply from diesel-fuel generator in Falam Township and promoting Reedhorda town into a township level.

Deputy Minister U Tin Myint and U Khin Maung Win, state government minister U Soe Htet and the directors-general responded to the discussions.

The Vice President also presented cash awards to the volunteer groups that took part in COVID-19 prevention and control measures.

Chin State Chief Minister U Salai Lian Luai, State Hluttaw Speaker U Zo Bwe and Deputy Minister U Myint Kyaing gave the national scrutiny cards to 318 locals.

The Vice President and party also looked into the construction of nursing training school, with 140 ft length, 30 ft width of two-storey reinforced cement concrete building.

Extended building at 200-bedded public hospital in Falam

The extended building is the two-storey reinforced cement concrete building with 150 ft length, 62 ft width and 28 ft height.

Construction of Surbung Airport

The construction project of Surbung airport has completed 98 per cent, and it is included in the urban development fund to improve social, transport, health, trade and travel sectors of the region.

Officials reported on the situations of existing cyclone

shelters, construction works with the funds of National Disaster Management Committee and camps for the internally displaced persons.

The Vice President also inspected construction of a new cyclone shelter with 90 ft length, 60 ft width at an estimated cost of K238.850 million.

Government technical high school

The Vice President heard reports on the government technical school and development projects at schools in 2018-2019 financial year and the future projects in next FY.

He instructed on timely completion of works and supply of hygiene water at the school.

The school is located at 4 miles south of Thantlang Township on 40.6 acres of land. The three-storey reinforced cement concrete building was constructed with K941.184 million from the fund of 2019-2020FY. The school will conduct the courses of building technology, electrical engineering and automobile. Each course will allow 30 trainees. The short-term vocational training courses such as brick laying and masonry, carpentry, metal bar bending, motorcycle repairing, home electrical appliance, and home wiring connection.

66/11 kV, 5 MVA sub power station

The new 66/11 kV, 5 MVA sub power station is included in electrification project of Chin State from 2019-2020FY to 2024-2025 FY.

The Vice President and party also inspected construction of water storage facility for Thantlang Township.

This water storage facility, with 40 ft length, 40 ft width, 10 ft height and 6 inches thickness. The reinforced cement concrete facility is under construction with K128.9 million fund.

THE Myanmar Investment Commission held a regular meeting yesterday morning. The meeting was chaired by Union Minister U Thaung Tun, Chairman of the MIC, Union Minister Dr Than Myint, Vice-Chairman of the MIC and (10) members of the Commission attended in the meeting.

Chairman of MIC, U Thaung Tun stated that MIC strives for achievement of the investment targeted amount of USD 5.8 billion in the near future and further stressed MIC's commitment to responsible investment.

The meeting approved (3) new projects in the manufac-

turing sector, hotel sector and other services sector as well as additional investments in (3) existing projects. The approved projects amounted to USD (20.057) million, Kyat (158,059) million and (750) job opportunities are expected to be created.

By the end of July 2020, the countries/regions with the largest investments in Myanmar are Singapore, People's Republic of China and Thailand. The power sector accounted for 26.33%. This was followed by the oil and gas sector, accounting for 26.24% and the manufacturing sector, accounting for 14.27% of the total permitted amount of foreign investment.—MNA ■

Section 59 (g) in Hluttaw Election Law



IN accordance with section 59 (g) of the Hluttaw Election Law, no one is allowed to vote more than once in any election for a Hluttaw constituency in which he or she has the right to vote. Anyone who is found guilty of or abetting this act shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term not exceeding one year, or with fine not exceeding K100,000 (one hundred thousand Kyats), or with both.

Mekong Sub-region countries discuss transboundary haze pollution

THE Sub-regional Ministerial Steering Committee on Transboundary Haze Pollution in the Mekong Sub-region held its 9th meeting online yesterday.

Representatives from Me-

kong Sub-Region countries – Cambodia, Laos, Myanmar, Thailand and Viet Nam – joined the virtual meeting.

Vice -Minister for Natural Resources and Environment of

Laos PRD Dr Saynakhone Inthavong chaired the video-meeting, and Deputy Minister for Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation Dr Ye Myint Swe acted as the deputy chair of the meeting.

At the meeting, Vice-Minister Dr Inthavong made an opening remark, followed ASEAN Specialized Meteorological Centre (ASMC)'s discussions on haze pollution conditions in Mekong region. The meeting approved the report discussed at 15th Meeting of the Technical Working Group on Tranboundary Haze Pollution.

They also discussed the extension of the targets of hotspot counts in Mekong Sub-region countries not going beyond the limit of 50,000 up to 2025.

Cooperation among Mekong

Sub-region countries and with international organizations on haze control management preceded the meeting.

They also reviewed the Roadmap on ASEAN Cooperation towards Transboundary Haze Pollution Control with Means of Implementation (2016-2020) (Haze-free Roadmap) and ASEAN Pealand Management Strategy –APMS (2014-2020).

Myanmar, in cooperation with EU, IUCN, GIZ, GEC, CIFOR, and IFAD, will implement Sustainable Management of Pealand Ecosystems in Mekong Countries, ASEAN-EU Sustainable Use of Pealand and Haze Mitigation in ASEAN-SUPA), and Measurable Action for Haze-Free Sustainable Land Management in Southeast Asia-MAHFSAs for

pealand sustainability and reduction of haze pollution in ASEAN region.

Myanmar will host 16th Meeting of the Technical Working Group on Transboundary Haze Pollution and 10th Meeting of the Sub-Regional Ministerial Steering Committee on Transboundary Haze Pollution in the Mekong Sub-Region in 2021.

The meeting was concluded following the speeches of Mekong Sub-region countries and ASEAN Secretary-General Office.

The 15th Meeting of the Technical Working Group on Tranboundary Haze Pollution was held at the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation in Nay Pyi Taw on 11 August. — MNA

Myanmar brings 122 nationals back home from India by relief flight

A relief flight of Myanmar National Airlines (MNA) brought back 122 Myanmar nationals stranded in India, and it landed at Yangon International Airport yesterday evening.

As they arrived in Yangon, officials from the Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population, the Ministry of Health and Sports, and the Yangon Region

government helped for their 21-day quarantine period in line with the regulations of immigration and medical checks.

To bring back the Myanmar citizens who were stranded in foreign countries in relief flights and chartered flights in accordance with the instructions from National-Level Central Committee for Coronavirus Disease

2019 (COVID-19), the Ministry of Foreign Affairs cooperated with the relevant ministries and Myanmar embassies from respective countries. The government also has arranged to repatriate the remaining Myanmar nationals from India on 29 August. —MNA

Govt provides farmers over K14 bln to produce monsoon paddy seeds

A ceremony to provide cash assistance for farmers to produce monsoon paddy seeds was held in Mahin Village, Toungoo Township in Bago Region yesterday.

Union Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation Dr Aung Thu, Bago Region Chief Minister U Win Thein, Region Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation U Aung Zaw Naing, departmental officials and farmers attended the ceremony.

Speaking at the event, the Union Minister said state-owned newspapers and television channels were publishing and broadcasting agricultural practices and technical education programmes during COVID-19.

The ministry is not only implementing short-term plans in accordance with COVID-19 Economic Relief Plan (CERP) but also undertaking post-COVID-19 procedures and long-term plans for agricultural development.

Farmers' organizations were being formed in accordance with the Law of Protection of the Farmer Rights and Enhancement of their Benefits to build the systems that farmers can themselves solve their

farmlands disputes, manage their farmlands, and ensure their accountabilities in future.

The "Collective Strength" exerted by all the nationalities plays a key role in carrying out the works.

More than 2,000 Water Utilizer Groups have been formed so far for water management sector, he added.

The farmers should use the water resource systematically depending on the climate change.

Most of the farms are fed by rain water, and only 15 per cent of the farms are fed by irrigation water. Therefore, plans were already set up to meet climate changes and improve water access in future, he said.

The Bago Region Chief Minister discussed the implementation of CERP procedures in the region, the region's development, and cooperation between departments concerned and farmers.

The Union Minister provided K31 million for 58 farmers' production of seeds in 207 acres.

The Chief Minister gave K27.5 million for 88 farmers' production of seeds in 94 acres.

Region Minister U Aung Zaw Naing presented K23.3 million for 46 farmers' production of seeds in 150 acres. Farmer representatives received the cash assistances.

A total of K81.8 million for 551 acres of seed production was provided at the ceremony.

Under the COVID-19 Economic Relief Plan, Toungoo District will grow 3,141 acres

of paddy to produce monsoon seeds, Bago District 8,439 acres, Pyay District 9,824.50 acres, and Tharyarwaddy District 10,340 acres.

A total of 31,744.50 acres of monsoon paddy will be cultivated in Bago Region to produce monsoon paddy seeds.

Monsoon paddy seed production will be implemented in 287 townships of all states and

regions except Chin State.

A total of 100,000 acres of paddy -- 69,335 acres of good yield rice and 30,665 acres of good quality rice -- will be cultivated this year.

The ministry will provide a total of K149,11.33 million from CERP for the seed production works.—MNA (Translated by Khine Thazin Han and Ei Phyu Phyu Aung)

The official assistance included family education and health services, cash assistance, a special cash assistance for the elderly unregistered for a pension plan, and assistance for PLWDs who did not receive assistance in the previous support process.

While the assistance is meant to fulfill short-term needs, the cash assistance provided could flow into the regional mon-

ey supply and support socioeconomic development, according to Dr Win Myat Aye.

He mentioned that his ministry has been implementing the 11 points concerning the social sector included in the collective agreement of the Union Peace Conference since 2017 and always incorporates social harmony and coexistence.

The Union Minister said the humanitarian assistances are, in a way, the government giving the people their money back from public finance when they are in need. He then thanked the General Administration Department (GAD), other government departments and the people involved in organizing the government assistance.

The Union Minister then handed over K56.92 million cash assistance for 1,423 families and K14.88 million for 496 elderlies in

A COMMUNITY fever clinic in Yangon announced yesterday that it has diagnosed 50 suspected tuberculosis cases after testing 400 people, and over 30 of these cases need to receive medical treatment.

Some of those tested have refused treatment, while others are hesitant to go to health services due to the fear and stigma associated with COVID-19.

However, TB must not be ignored amidst the COVID-19 pandemic.

Putting the blame of acquiring or transmitting TB or COVID-19 infection on the person, or stigmatizing those who are infected, is likely to be big deterrents for those with symptoms to seek care voluntarily.

Our country, which is still among the 30 countries most affected by TB, needs to ensure the continuity of TB services in the time of COVID-19. This includes being proactive to protect the most vulnerable, including protection against economic hardships, isolation, stigma and discrimination.

Free X-rays for respiratory tract infections have been added to the services provided by fever clinics under the plan of the National TB Project, to maintain the country's achievements in fighting TB.

Nowadays, TB is disproportionately a disease of the poor. We find it in slums, amongst the rural poor, and amongst those living with HIV.

Nearly one-third of the world's population have latent TB, carrying the bacteria while not showing symptoms, while nearly 10 million a year fall ill – of which 15% die.

WHO urges countries to gamble on shared coronavirus vaccine search

- **World Health Organization chief pleads for investment in ACT-Accelerator programme that aims to beat Covid-19**
- **Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus says cost is 'tiny fraction' compared to pouring trillions into stimulus packages as pandemic ravages world economy**

THE WHO on Thursday urged countries to invest billions of dollars in searching for Covid-19 vaccines and treatments – calling it a snip compared to the vast economic cost of the coronavirus crisis.

The World Health Organization insisted it was a smarter bet than the trillions of dollars being thrown at handling the consequences of the global pandemic.

The UN agency's chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus pleaded for investment into the WHO-led ACT-Accelerator programme, which aims to share global research and development, manufacturing and procurement in a bid to beat Covid-19.

Citing the International Monetary Fund's predictions of the pandemic wiping out US\$12 trillion over two years, he urged countries to spend on shared solutions.

"It's the best economic stimulus the world can invest in," Tedros told a virtual press conference.

Funding the ACT-Accelerator, with US\$31.3 billion needed immediately, "will cost a tiny fraction

in comparison to the alternative, where economies retract further and require continued fiscal stimulus packages".

He said spreading the risk and sharing the reward is a better bet than the option some countries have taken, of going it alone in backing one of the dozens of vaccines in development.

"The development of vaccines is long, complex, risky and expen-

sive," he said. "The vast majority of vaccines in early development fail."

Tedros said multiple vaccine candidates, of different types, were needed to identify the best one.

Russia on Tuesday declared itself the first country to approve a vaccine, even though final stage testing involving more than 2,000 people was only due to start on

Wednesday.

Bruce Aylward, who heads up the ACT-Accelerator, said the WHO was still awaiting more details from Moscow.

"We're currently in conversation with Russia to get additional information, understand the status of that product, the trials that have been undertaken, and then what the next steps might be," he said.

The WHO says 168 candidate vaccines are being worked on around the world, of which 28 have progressed to being tested on humans. Nine of those 28 – not including the Russian vaccine – are in the ACT-Accelerator programme.

WHO access to medicines chief Mariangela Simao said that with so many vaccine candidates being worked on, backing just one or two could not be the best bet.

"We don't know which one will be the front-runner, which one will actually prove to be safe and effective," she said.

"We are encouraging countries to join a global facility, because you will have access to more candidates, and you have a better chance to have concrete access ... to procure one of the successful candidates."

The European Union said earlier on Thursday that it has reserved up to 400 million doses of a potential new coronavirus vaccine being developed by US giant Johnson & Johnson. On July 31, the European Commission said it had reserved 300 million doses

of another potential vaccine being developed by French firm Sanofi.

The coronavirus pandemic has killed more than 750,000 people and infected more than 20.7 million worldwide since it first emerged in China in December, according to a tally by Johns Hopkins University.

WHO emergencies director Michael Ryan warned that only a small proportion of the global population had actually been exposed to the virus.

"This virus has a long way to burn, if we allow it," he said. "The vast majority of people remain susceptible to this infection. We may be in the eye of the storm and we don't know it."

Meanwhile Maria Van Kerkhove, the WHO's Covid-19 technical lead, said there were examples from some countries suggesting that an individual may have been reinfected by the virus, but "it's still not confirmed". She said experts would need to look for false positive or negative cases, immune response after infection, and sequencing.

WHO says food safe from coronavirus

THE World Health Organization (WHO) on Thursday urged people not to fear catching the novel coronavirus from food, after Chinese testers found traces on food and food packaging.

THE World Health Organization (WHO) on Thursday urged people not to fear catching the novel coronavirus from food, after Chinese testers found traces on food and food packaging.

The virus was found Tuesday in the Chinese city of Shenzhen during a routine check on samples of frozen chicken wings imported from Brazil, city authorities said.

The authorities said they immediately screened people who had been in contact with the contaminated products, plus their relatives, and all the tests came back negative.

In China's eastern Anhui province, the mayor of Wuhu announced Thursday that the virus had been discovered on the packaging of shrimp imported from

Ecuador, which had been kept in a restaurant freezer.

The WHO said there was no need to panic – and there were no examples of the respiratory disease being transmitted through food.

"People are already scared enough and fearful enough in the COVID pandemic," WHO emergencies director Michael Ryan told a virtual press conference in Geneva.

"People should not fear food or food packaging or the processing or delivery of food.

"There is no evidence that food or the food chain is participating in the transmission of this virus.

"Our food, from a COVID perspective, is safe."

Maria Van Kerkhove, the

WHO's COVID-19 technical lead, said the United Nations health agency was aware of the reports and understood that China was looking for the virus on food packaging.

"They've tested a few hundred thousand samples of looking at packaging and have found very, very few, less than 10 positive in doing that," she said.

"We know that the virus can remain on surfaces for some time.

"If the virus is actually in food – and we have no examples of where this virus has been transmitted as a food-borne, whereas someone has consumed a food product – the viruses can be killed, like other viruses as well, if the meat is cooked."

Samanea Yangon wholesale market prepares to open in November

SAMANEA Yangon wholesale market is reported to open in November. The Samanea Yangon wholesale market is part of Phase-1 of Myanmar's biggest trading centre project, which is implemented at the corner of Bago river street and Yadanar street in Dagon Seikkan Township, Yangon Region. So far, the construction of the Samanea Yangon wholesale market is completed 100 per cent. The shops at the wholesale market are likely to open in November.

The wholesale market jointly developed by Singapore-based Samanea Group and Yangon based EI Company Limited is built on a 167-acre plot of land with the permission of Myanmar Investment Commission (MIC) and Yangon City Development Committee (YCDC).

The wholesale market includes 730 shops to be able to sell various kinds of items in a place. Each shop is 25 feet in

length and 15 feet in width. The trading centre Phase-1 project contains not only the wholesale market but also warehouse, apartments and logistics enterprise.

have been rented already, said U Aung Myo Oo, deputy general manager of Samanea Yangon.

The market has 50,000 square metres wide parking lot, which can accommodate up to over 1,000 cars. The market has also installed the CCTVs. The wholesale market authorities will also coordinate with YRTA to make YBS buses run

the wholesale market route.

The project for the construction of Samanea Yangon wholesale market was started to implement on 1 August 2019. The Phase-2 of the trading centre project will also be implemented very soon, according to Samanea Yangon.

Over 10,000 enterprises apply for COVID loans in second time

MORE than 10,000 enterprises have applied for the coronavirus emergency loans for the second time, said UMFCCI General Secretary U Aye Win.

To be able to provide the government's coronavirus emergency loans for the second time to the enterprises adversely affected by the pandemic, the applications are being accepted starting from 29 July up to 10 August. Over 1,500 applications were received through UMFCCI head office, over 7,600 through states and regions UMFCCI and over 800 through online.

This time, more than 10,000 enterprises have applied for the COVID emergency loans, and more applications were received compared to those of the first time. The first time, only over 4,250 enterprises used for emergency loans, he added.

Out of 10,000 applications, 25 per cent are from the Yangon region and the remaining 75 per cent are from other states and regions, he said.

The second time loans will be provided to agricultural, live-

stock and aquaculture sector, export manufacturing sector, import substitutes manufacturing sector, manufacturing sector involved in the supply chain from the domestic production to export sector, food production sector, overseas recruitment service sector and livelihood training school.

We do not know the exact amount of the emergency loans to the priority sector, he noted.

"The loans do not have limitations, including minimum and maximum amount borrowable. We will make a decision depending upon the application forms and their types of enterprise activities," the UMFCCI general secretary stated.

To be able to receive the emergency loans in time, the officials from UMFCCI started to scrutinize on 11 August together with the officials from SMEs Department, DICA, Myanmar Economic Bank, Myanmar Agricultural Development Bank, Ministry of Education, Trade Department (Ministry of Commerce), Fisheries Department, Livestock Breeding and Veterinary Department, Directorate

of Labour, Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation and other 20 UMFCCI-affiliated associations.

These loans are being spent from a relief fund of K100 billion, with K50 billion drawn from the country's revolving fund and the rest K50 billion drawn from its

social welfare fund. The enterprises can apply for the loans with one per cent interest rate for one year.

The Union Government will add K100 billion to its COVID Fund from 2019-2020 financial year budget surplus.

For the first time, a total of

3,393 enterprises have received loans out of over 4,250 applications. UMFCCI provided over K101 billion for seven times, according to the announcement of the Ministry of Investment and Foreign Economic Relations. ■

Rice export via land border drops by half

THE rice and broken rice export via land borders has dropped by half, according to the official statistics of the Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF).

Between October and July in 2019-2020 financial year (FY), Myanmar exported over 300,000 tonnes of rice and broken rice via land borders, which has dropped

from about 600,000 tonnes of rice and defective rice export in the same period of last FY.

Myanmar rice and broken rice via border generated an estimated income of US\$96 billion in this FY, which has dropped from \$173 billion in the same period of last FY, according to Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF).

Although the income of rice and broken rice export through

border route has declined, the revenue of rice and defective rice export via sea route has increased.

In 2018-19FY, Myanmar fetched over \$400 million from the export of 1.3 million tonnes of rice and broken rice via sea route. In the same period of this FY, Myanmar shipped over 1.9 million tonnes of rice and broken rice worth \$600 million.

Currently, MRF targeted to export 2.4 million tonnes of rice and broken rice in this FY. MRF is also arranging to enable the meeting of the rice export target.

At present, the country has already exported over 2.2 million tonnes of rice and broken rice via both sea and border routes. To meet the target, Myanmar is going to export 150,000 tonnes of rice this month and 100,000 tonnes of rice in September according to the decisions made at a coordination meeting led by the Ministry of Commerce on 26 June. The coordinating meeting discussed matters related to rice export and the country's rice reserve. ■

Domestic oil prices rise by K20 per litre

THE domestic fuel oil price, which has been stable for three months, is rising by K20 per litre on 13 August.

The price of fuel oil has been stable, starting from 22 July. However, the Yangon fuel oil stations charged K540 per litre for Octane 92, K650 for Octane 95, K590 for diesel and K600 for premium diesel on 13 August.

"The domestic oil price is directly related to the price prevailing in the global fuel oil market. The price of global fuel oil is also rising in the global market," said a local pump man from a fuel oil station.

On 13 August, the price of global fuel oil stood US\$43 per barrel, which is an increase of \$15 per barrel in two months. The domestic oil prices significantly dropped from January to May. The prices of fuel oil were reportedly rising again in June.

Myanmar imports 90 per cent of fuel oil and produces

the remaining 10 per cent locally.

Myanmar imports fuel oil primarily from Singapore with the monthly volume touching 200,000 tonnes for petroleum and 400,000 tonnes for diesel. There are 2,000 fuel stations and 50 oil importer companies in Myanmar.

The ministry has already issued licences for the opening of 2,704 fuel oil stations across the country including 95 fuel oil stations in Union Territory, 188 stations in Yangon, 658 in Mandalay, 213 in Ayeyawady Region, 271 in Bago Region, 196 in Magway Region, 245 in Sagaing Region, 30 in Taninthayi Region, 121 in Kachin State, 18 in Kayah State, 53 in Kayin State, 5 in Chin State, 138 in Mon State, 38 in Rakhine State, 58 in eastern Shan State, 195 in northern Shan State and 182 in southern Shan State. —Aye Maung ■

ASEAN: at 53rd and Beyond - Remaining Resilient and Relevant to the Shift of Global Landscape

On 8th August 2020, the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) virtually commemorated its 53rd Anniversary under the theme "ASEAN 53: A Cohesive Journey to Recovery". Against the backdrop of the COVID-19 pandemic, it marked the first-ever online celebration of the bloc since its establishment on the same day in 1967. At the virtual celebration, ASEAN Foreign Ministers issued a statement in which they highlighted eight points including, among others, maintaining peace, security, neutrality and stability in the region and remaining united, cohesive and resilient. The statement also acknowledged the growing uncertainties resulting from the changing geopolitical dynamics in the regional and global landscape and these may have detrimental ramifications for the region. It is pertinent to note that ASEAN vowed to put itself in a position of being neutral amid the growth of geopolitical and major power rivalries while reassuring its unity, cohesiveness and resilience.

2020 is the defining moment for ASEAN which calls for the exigency to review its procedural approach and expand its visions. The emergence of the unprecedented COVID-19 pandemic and its subsequent political and socio-economic ramifications, the rise of geopolitical fragmentation, major power rivalries and their potential shift of new approach towards ASEAN, the global economic down-turn as well as ongoing traditional and non-traditional security threats are the testaments or challenges to the said ASEAN's resilience, cohesiveness and responsiveness. These can probably be interpreted as the opportune and strong motivation for ASEAN to take on the challenge of realigning ASEAN's existing practices upon current demands as well as adjusting national and regional interest to fit the global context and remain resilient and relevant to the changing dynamics.

Looking back at the history of ASEAN, the founding fathers established the association with five-member countries in the course of Cold War- the time when major political rivalries

were mounting in the region. Since then, ASEAN has grown as a vibrant regional bloc with the enlargement of the group in 1999 making all ten countries in Southeast Asia to become the members of the association. In 2015, ASEAN proclaimed its establishment of ASEAN Community and subsequently envisioned ASEAN 2025: Forging Ahead Together- a forward-looking roadmap towards the realization of ASEAN Community through its Blueprints. The implementation of ASEAN Community Blueprints 2025 is now on the mid-way to completion. It is encouraging to see the progress made in the implementation of these Blueprints where the majority of action lines have been addressed.

Nevertheless, since the remaining action lines are to be carried out in long-term, ASEAN needs to sustain the current momentum to ensure that all these action lines are effectively and fully implemented within an established time frame. In the meantime, it is also equally important to have the adjustment in implementing the remaining action lines to meet the demand of the current situation, including but not limited to the impact of COVID19 pandemic.

Under the Chairmanship of Viet Nam, ASEAN has the important tasks of reviewing the ASEAN Charter, the Mid-Term Review of ASEAN Community Blueprints 2025 and the brainstorming discussions on the ASEAN Community Post-2025 Vision. These are the right time determinations that will accommodate ASEAN and its Member States to review and assess its next 5-year journey of the Community building process. This includes looking into the emerging issues of political, economic and socio-cultural dimensions and the strategic changes of a regional and global context.

In stretching out its relations with External and Dialogue Partners, the following questions may probably be noteworthy for ASEAN: How is ASEAN relevant to the world?; Where is ASEAN in the global stage?; How do ASEAN and its regional collaboration contribute towards the regional and international peace, security, stability and prosperity?; From regional to global, how will ASEAN connect and lead the world?; What are

the strengths and weaknesses of ASEAN?; How can the External and Dialogue Partners be supportive of ASEAN's objectives and community-building efforts?; and How can ASEAN and its Dialogue Partners mutually fulfil each other's needs and interests?.

With a clear view of its current standing and efforts to bolster its strength, ASEAN should continue to step forward proactively and invite the potential countries and organizations outside the region to join hands in ASEAN's initiatives and efforts. To this end, ASEAN may need to take a challenge to reconsider its existing moratorium which is currently imposed on the establishment of new external relations taking into account of its capability and the genuine interest and willingness of potential partners. At the same time, ASEAN Centrality should be considered in parallel with the review of a moratorium. Criteria stipulated for the relationship with external partners must be clear, valid and strong so that nothing can undermine ASEAN Centrality and its effective cooperation.

As regards to the regional issues, the South China Sea remains the most likely spot for geopolitical tension between or among major and rising powers. Even the amidst of COVID-19 pandemic, there were a couple of developments on the ground, including military exercises by two major powers.

On 13 July, the U.S. Secretary of State also issued a policy statement reflecting the U.S.' new position towards the maritime claims in the South China Sea. The statement was issued on the occasion of 4th Anniversary of the decision of the Arbitral Tribunal constituted under the 1982 United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS) over the territorial claims between China and the Philippines in 2016. Following this, China also took counter-position against the U.S.' statement.

In fact, South China Sea issue is multifaceted with divergent aspects that may roughly be categorized into three: (i) territorial disputes between and among the claimant states (or) issue of sovereignty, (ii) political and economic interests of non-claimant states in the region, and (iii) geopolitical rivalries between and

among major and rising powers outside the region (or) freedom of navigation and overflight in and above the South China Sea. The key factor and the important circumstance for ASEAN to stand united in the issue of the South China Sea are to deepen political will and mutual trust within ASEAN and with China. All parties involved in the negotiations and dialogues on the Code of Conduct in the South China Sea should participate with sincerity, exercise maximum flexibility and adopt results-oriented approaches taking into account of building trust, ensuring peace, stability and safety and freedom of navigation and overflight in and above the South China Sea in order to successfully complete the negotiation within the particular timeframe.

The existing principles of ASEAN (as set in the Treaty of Amity and Cooperation in Southeast Asia) (TAC) which includes mutual respect, non-interference, peaceful settlement of disputes and effective cooperation still remain essential and relevant to this aggressive world. Some may doubt the effectiveness of ASEAN's so-called approach of consensus and non-interference. However, what ASEAN has achieved thus far through the adherence of these fundamental principles should not be brushed out. Most importantly to note, these principles enforce cooperation rather than confrontation among the countries and that approach will pave the way and promote harmony in moving forward our community-building efforts and bringing peace, stability and prosperity in the region and beyond.

Furthermore, the increasing interest of countries outside the region to engage with ASEAN is a clear indication of the recognition of external parties to the important role played by ASEAN in the global arena as a well-institutionalized regional grouping. ASEAN also has tracked her record of facilitating regional security and political affairs. To give an example, Singapore and Viet Nam hosted the historic U.S.-DPRK summits in 2018 and 2019 to facilitate to decreasing the tension and hostilities between the United States and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea over the issue of denuclearization in the Korean Peninsula. These are the important

milestones of ASEAN's proactive initiatives towards regional peace and stability, and ASEAN should continue to maintain such efforts. ASEAN's existing mechanisms such as East Asia Summit (EAS), ASEAN Regional Forum (ARF) and ASEAN Defence Ministerial Meeting Plus (ADMM Plus) may also be considered as viable platforms for the security and strategic dialogues between and among major and rising powers of the world.

In the long run, ASEAN would need to press the bottom of inclusive, comprehensive and forward-looking approach in its community-building efforts and proactively engage with external regional groupings to expand its wings. It must be assured that the cooperative efforts are going beyond the numbers of high-profile meetings, declarations and statements. And these are practically interpreted into the direct benefits for the communities swiftly and effectively, especially in the times of crisis like the COVID-19 outbreak. Doing so will help in promoting the people's sense of belonging to ASEAN Community which was obviously lauded during Thailand's ASEAN Chairmanship in 2019. The consideration of practical measures such as the utilization of COVID-19 ASEAN Respond Fund, establishment of the ASEAN Regional Reserve of Medical Supplies for Public Health Emergencies and the establishment of more emergency response warehouses, in addition to existing ones in the Philippines and Thailand are remarkable in this regard.

For outward-looking, the agenda of ASEAN should not merely be the priorities of ASEAN but by being relevant to the rest of the world and benefitting from the emerging global trends. Standing as the united regional grouping to safeguard peace, security, stability and prosperity of its over 600 million people in the region, ASEAN should voluntarily be the main contributor to the world at large by setting up stronger and broader visions. Likewise, while remaining resilient and relevant to the shift of global landscape, ASEAN should also keep standing as a key facilitator in regional security and political affairs as well as the major contributor to the global supply chain. ■

German vaccine maker CureVac readies for Nasdaq debut

TÜBINGEN, Germany — German biotech company CureVac, whose development of a coronavirus vaccine reportedly drew interest from US President Donald Trump, is set to make its Nasdaq debut Friday after raising more than \$200 million in its initial public offering in New York.

The company is seen as one of the leading contenders in the race to develop a COVID-19 vaccine and received permission in June to start human trials.

CureVac, based in Tübingen in southwest Ger-

many, said on Friday that it raised \$213.3 million (180.6 million euros) in its share offering, at the higher end of its price target of \$14 to \$16 a share.

The company placed 13.3 million shares, giving it a valuation of around \$2.8 billion.

CureVac was thrust into the spotlight in March when media reports suggested that the Trump administration was looking to secure exclusive rights to its in-development vaccine.

The company and US officials dismissed the news as unfounded, but it

prompted Economy Minister Peter Altmaier to declare that “Germany is not for sale”.

In a move to shield

the firm from falling into foreign hands, the German government in June took a 23-per-cent stake in CureVac for 300 million euros.

At the time, Altmaier said: “We don’t know which company will bring the first workable vaccine to market. But we know that

CureVac is among those in the lead.” In July, British pharma giant GlaxoSmith-Kline paid around 143 million euros for a 10-per-cent stake in the company to work together on vaccine development.

CureVac, whose controlling shareholder is the billionaire co-founder of software giant SAP, Dietmar Hopp, develops therapies based on harnessing “messenger RNA” -- molecules related to DNA -- to treat diseases.

It employs more than 400 people in Germany and Boston.—AFP ■

Apple and Google pull ‘Fortnite’ from mobile app shops

NEW YORK — Apple and Google on Thursday pulled video game sensation Fortnite from their mobile app shops after its maker Epic Games released an update that dodges revenue sharing with the tech giants.

The latest version of Fortnite contains a pay-

ment system that lets player transactions bypass Apple’s App Store and Google’s Play, preventing the firms from collecting their typical 30 per cent cut.

Apple, which does not allow users of its popular devices to download

apps from anywhere but its App Store, booted the game from its online marketplace, followed later Thursday by Google.

Epic quickly filed a federal lawsuit against Apple, accusing the iPhone maker of wielding monopoly power.

The game-maker called on a federal judge to order Apple to stop its “anti-competitive conduct” and invalidate the tech giant’s rules requiring app developers to pay the company 30 per cent of transactions.

The suit said Epic is

not seeking favourable treatment, but is asking the court to order Apple to change its commission structure for all developers.

Apple said Fortnite was pulled after “Epic Games took the unfortunate step of violating the

App Store guidelines that are applied equally to every developer and designed to keep the store safe for our users.” Google followed suit and removed Fortnite from its Play store for mobile devices powered by its Android software.—AFP ■

Ancient stupas and temples in old Ahmyint city

ANCIENT stupas and temples can be seen in all parts of Myanmar where evidences on Theravada Buddhism have been found since the time of Pyu culture. Religious edifices in Pyu era such as Phayagyi, Bawbawgyi and Phayama as well as Laymyethna temple, Yahanta temple and Ashaezay temple are standing tall in ancient Pyu city Sri Kestra whereas many stupas and temples in Bagan era can be seen in Bagan region. Similarly, Buddhist religious buildings including stupas and temples are being preserved in ancient Myanmar cities such as Sagaing, Inwa and Amarapura.

Ancient stupas and temples are existing in some ancient areas such as Mwedaw Kakku, Paleik

and Mekkhaya till today in addition to Ahmyint Village in ChaungU Township of Sagaing Region.

ChaungU

Nwekhway Village where the fossil molar of early primate was found takes a position in north-east of ChaungU. The fossil molar was found on Dinga hillock of Shwemyintin mountain range, one mile northwest of Nwekhway Village, in 1981.

Myanmar Encyclopaedia stated NyaungU Saw Rahan built ChaungU Village surrounded by nine small villages on 4th ward of Tazaungmone, 287 Myanmar Era. While digging the pits for burying cabalistic diagram sheets at four corners of the city, a flame emerged from the

iron grub hoe, so the area was called Thantauk. Moreover, the name ChaungU was originated by starting point of creeks. As evidence, it was named the land of ChaungU in the stone inscription of Shwesikhon Pagoda in Khinmon Village.

Existing ChaungU Township shares border with Myinmu Township in the east, Salingyi Township in the west, Myaung Township in the south and Monywa Township in the north. The 188.57 square miles area of the town is 14 miles and four furlongs long from the east to the west and 13 miles and seven furlongs long from the south to the north. The township is formed with six wards and 89 villages in 26 village-tracts.

ChaungU Township at an altitude of 256 feet is home to 108,387 people. Among them, 108,298 people, accounting for 99.9 per cent, is Bamar ethnic people. Buddhists are 99.3 per cent of total population with some Christians and Islam in the township.

Local people are engaged in cultivation of paddy and other crops on 188,070 acres of farmlands which yield 1.6 million baskets of paddy, groundnut, sesame, sunflower, mung bean, green gram, pigeon pea, cotton and maize in 2017-18 fiscal year. They grow toddy, areca and mango as major perennial crops as well as marketable crops such as watermelon and muskmelon on 12,716 acres of land.

Nine basic education high schools and high school branches, ten middle schools and branches and 61 post-primary and primary schools are opened in the township for learning of local students. Likewise, ChaungU Township People's Hospital (25-bed), Ahmyint and Thonpanhla Station Hospitals (16-bed each) and 26 rural health branches are giving healthcare services to the local people.

Currently, 1,454 ancient

and new stupas and temples scatter in ChaungU Township. Among them, some pagodas in ChaungU, Khinmon, Ahmyint, Ahneint and Hmancho villages are the most eminent. Mingala Aungmyin Temple, Yoksone Pagoda, Aungmye Lawka Temple, Phatthad Pagoda, Maha Zawtikayama Monastery in Khinmon Village, MinO Chantha Cluster of Pagodas, Phatthad Cluster of

Pagodas, a pagoda from Minye Cluster of Pagodas, a pagoda from Yatthit Monastery Cluster of Pagodas, Thambula Pagoda, a pagoda near Pitakat Chamber of Tawya Monastery, four ChinthaeU clusters of pagoda, four pagodas of Yunkyaung cluster of pagodas, stone inscription chamber of Tawkyanggyi, cluster of Thonpanhla Pagodas, Shweguhtuk cluster of pagodas,

Ancient Ahmyint city

Ahmyint, the native land of journalist Oway U Nyo Mya (1914-1985), Naingngan Gonyi Grade-I Thakin Lay Maung (1910-1990) and Ayeetaung pickled tea industry owner U Kyaw Thein, takes a position on the bank of Chindwin River, 7.5 miles west of ChaungU.

Statues and biography stone inscriptions of those three honourable persons were erected in front of Nyo Mya Toh Village Library in Ahmyint.

Ahmyint city was ruled by Bagan King Htilo Minlo and Laungshe Queen, Inwa King Mingyi Swa Saw Ke and Min Latt Wah in Konbaung era.

Ancient Ahneint (now Thonpanhla Village), four miles south from Ahmyint, along Chindwin River bank is a native land of Sayadaw U Wisara. Ahmyint was a town assigned to recruit 800 soldiers for the royal palace and 200 in Konbaung era.

Some people assume Ahmyint was established in 224 Myanmar era. In his reign, King Narapatisithu of Bagan (1165-1201) renovated the moat of ancient Ahmyint city.

The area of ancient Ahmyint city comprised 336 stupas and temples, 11 monasteries and 63 stone plaques. The notes of Bon-sin Monastery abbot in Ahmyint mentioned the city was established together with 10 pagodas, nine god statues, nine caves, nine mounds, nine lakes and five water inlet channels.

Ten pagodas are inner Ethan and outer Ethan, inner Setlon and outer Setlon, inner Uti and outer Uti, inner Myintin and outer Myintin, inner Shwegu and outer Shwegu. Seven statues of gods were kept at six gates and three on Myodwinkon and Konkyaung.

Nine caves were named with different meanings. Nine mounds were Hlawga, Ngakhe, Pwaypin Khaya, Bon, Kalagyi, Thaphan, Talai, Wayauk and Thittabin mounds. Nine lakes were Shwepyar, Wetchi, Inpetlet, Hlawga, Khawathe, Kyaykhaung, Laythaung, Kansee and Ngakhe lakes. Five water inlet channels were named with Hteinchaung, Pauktaw, Shinthange, Ngasiky and Ayanwatar. Twelve city gates

were Sitha, Thudattha, Hsincha, Mingala, Mathar, Aungtha, Mathoe, Mahnyo, Tettoe, Eitha, Minma and Thazi gates.

Ten lacquerware Buddha images

People assume Bagan King Narapatisithu ordered to carve 10 lacquerware Buddha images—each of which was located at Shwelinpin Monastery in Sipoktara Village of KhinU Township, Kaunghmudaw Pagoda in Sagaing, Shwesakagyi Pagoda in Samon Village of Sagaing Township, Shwetasa Pagoda in Shwebo, Shwesakar Pagoda in Mingin, Shweyattaung Pagoda in Singu, Sakarhla Pagoda in Kalay, Shwesakargyi Pagoda in Kyahnyat, Shwekumyin Pagoda in Myedu and Amyint.

These lacquerware Buddha images were found from Shwetwinaung Pagoda between Ahmyint and Ahneint in 1256 ME.

Abbot U Pannavam who resided at the monastery donated by Magway Minister near Thawtapan Village found about five feet high Buddha image from the large pit in the precinct of Shwetwinaung Pagoda. As he saw the inscription carved by Bagan King Narapatisithu in 536 ME. So he conveyed it to Magway Monastery. The Buddha image was stolen. Three weeks later, it was found by Kon Monastery Abbot U Thila from the toddy palm plantations near Amyint city. Thieves took jewellery and gold from the face of the image. So, U Pho Toke and Daw Kyi renovated the image as original form. Kon Monastery Abbot handed over the image but Magway Abbot Bhaddanta U Pannavam did not

accept it.

The Buddha Pujaniya festival of the lacquerware Buddha Image conveyed from Kon Monastery to Magway Monastery has been held from the eve of Thadingyut to 1st waning for more than 90 years. When Kon Monastery was repaired, the Buddha image was moved to Gandakuti Chamber of Shwekyoriz Pagoda for public obeisance and then returned to Kon Monastery.

Visiting sites in Ahmyint

Travellers can visit Shwetwinaung Pagoda, the tunnel in the precinct of the pagoda, Shwekyoriz Buddha Image, Minye Monastery built with the use of 119 teak posts and pagodas in the precinct of Minye Monastery. Mingala Bonpyan Monastery built by long-life Minister Min Latt Wah of King Mindon in 1220 ME was formed with 12 buildings and four brick ladders with the use of 136 teak posts. Lattawya Buddha Image can be seen in the precinct of Kotawpyauk Pagoda.

Buddha Pujaniya festivals for Shwekyoriz, Kodawgyi, Shinpin Myittanan, Shwethalyaung, Minye Phayagyi, Shwetwinaung, Minpaungshin, Shinpin Metali, Thettawya, Minye, NanU, Yoetawpon, lacquerware Buddha image, Bonpyan and Shwetheindaw stupas and temples are held in Amyint the days of Sabbath from the full moon day of Waso to full

waning of Thadingyut.

Mural paintings can be seen on interior of a temple in the clusters of Minye pagodas. These are under maintenance of the Department of Archaeology and National Museum.

Although Ahmyint Village is a small village which is home to 2,613 people from 573 houses, it was an ancient city with prosperity. As evidences, old stupas and temples, collapsed ones and brick mounds can be seen in the village. Ancient Ahmyint city welcomes those wishing to search historical evidences.

People can observe rare manuscripts, documentary photos, manuscripts of veteran writers, newspapers and books collected by veteran journalist U Nyo Mya at Nyo Mya Toh Village Library opened in Amyint Village. A picture of Minister Min Latt Wah who governed Amyint city in Konbaung era is hung in the library.

Arsenal sign Willian on free transfer

LONDON — Arsenal completed the signing of Willian on a three-year deal on Friday after the Brazilian winger's contract at Chelsea expired.

The 32-year-old won two Premier League titles, an FA Cup, a League Cup and the Europa League during seven years with the Blues, but moves across

London on a free transfer with Chelsea unwilling to offer the multi-year contract he desired.

"I believe he's a player that can really make a difference for us," said Arsenal manager Mikel Arteta. "He has the experience of everything in the football world but to still have the ambition to come here and contribute to bring the club where it belongs. I have been really impressed with all the talks I have had with him and how much he wanted to come."

Willian sat out the FA Cup final when Arsenal beat Chelsea 2-1 earlier this month due to injury, but said the impact made by Arteta in his first season in management encouraged him to join the Gunners.

"I think that with Arteta, Arsenal have a great opportunity to fight again for titles in the Premier League and in Europe so I'm very happy because of that," said Willian.

"When I talked to Mikel, the conversation was good, he gave me confidence to come to Arsenal. He said a lot of good things to me and that's why I have come to Arsenal."

Although Arsenal will not have to pay a transfer fee, the move for Willian, who is reportedly set to earn £200,000 (\$261,000) a week, has been criticized just a week after the club announced they are planning to cut 55 jobs due to damaging economic impact of the coronavirus pandemic.—AFP ■

Unbeaten Benavidez defends super middleweight crown

UNCASVILLE, Connecticut — Undefeated American David Benavidez defends his World Boxing Council super middleweight world title for the third time on Saturday against Colombia's Alexis Angulo.

Benavidez, 22-0 with 19 knockouts, returns to action in the feature bout at Uncasville, Connecticut, some 11 months after stopping countryman Anthony Dirrell in the ninth round.—AFP ■

Serena rallies past Venus, builds confidence for US Open

WASHINGTON — Serena Williams rallied to defeat sister Venus Williams 3-6, 6-3, 6-4 on Thursday in a second-round matchup of Grand Slam champions at the WTA Top Seed Open.

Top-seeded Serena, a 23-time Grand Slam winner, said the victory will boost her confidence heading into the US Open as she improved to 19-12 in the 22-year-old rivalry with Venus.

"I wanted to win this for my game and my confidence," said Serena, whose only title as a mother came in January at

Auckland.

"I honestly didn't come here to win (a title) for the first time in my career. I just came here to get some matches. I haven't had this much time off since I had the baby."

Ninth-ranked Serena is one shy of matching Margaret Court's all-time record of 24 Grand Slam titles and she is preparing to chase a seventh career US Open singles crown at Flushing Meadows.

Serena smacked a cross-court forehand winner to break

Venus for a 2-1 lead in the third set, then dropped the next four games, only to break again in the seventh on another forehand cross-court winner, then hold to 4-4.

Serena zipped a backhand cross-court winner past Venus to break for a 5-4 lead and served out the match, aided by an umpire over-rule ace to reach 30-30.

Serena followed the call with her 14th ace and won after two hours and 19 minutes when Venus sent a forehand beyond the baseline.—AFP ■
