State Counsellor highlights protecting nature, traditional textiles on Chin State trip

State Counsellor meets with local people in Haka, Falam, Tiddim

STATE Counsellor Daw Aung San Suu Kyi continued her tour of Chin State yesterday, attending a ceremony to inaugurate the Chin traditional archway in Haka and meeting with people in Falam.

First, the State Counsellor unveiled Haka City View Point Tower offering scenic views of Haka and the Chin traditional archway with Union Ministers Lt-Gen Kyaw Swe, Lt-Gen Ye Aung, U Min Thu, Dr. Aung Thu, and U Htalar Ha Ye, a representative of local people. Afterwards, she visited the No. 2 Basic Education High School in Haka and met with school children.

She also visited the Haka College and observed teaching and learning methods at the campus before proceeding to Falam.

Democracy needs close relations between government and people

The State Counsellor met with local people at the town hall and expressed her eagerness to meet with locals whenever she travels in the country, saying that a democratic system requires close relations between the government and the people.

“I attach a high value to such close meetings with the people,” said the State Counsellor, recounting her experience of meeting with villagers when she

“We are not owners of land and water resources. We are caretakers. So, we have to understand that we have to conserve them and pass them to the next generation in good condition,” said the State Counsellor.

“Even more important is the socio environment, and all the national brethren of Myanmar have to take responsibility for their attitude, because the current generation has an opportunity, to a certain extent, to influence the attitude the next generation adopts,” she said.

“I would like to urge the current generation to make the best of use of opportunities to cultivate the next generation,” said the State Counsellor.

We must support the eager Chin youth

“We arrived at a basic education high school in the morning, and also Haka College. I saw that the youth of Chin State have a strong desire for education. Something rather unique was that they also show interest in working in the education, agriculture and administration sectors. This factor puts it a little ahead of the other states and regions I have been to. It is also a positive sign for the youth to want to work in those areas because we need to nurture our younger generation in those sectors.”

“I urge the elders to instill a sense of nationalism for the benefit of the State and ethnic races in the minds of your children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews. Teach them to consider not just themselves and their families, but also the entire Union.

It is more important to instill a sense of altruism in the children who wish to become teachers, because each one of them will be responsible for thousands of students.”

Chin blankets, traditional outfits should be encouraged

“If you have anything you would like to tell me, feel free to do so. I would also like to share with you some thoughts I had while on my way here. When I was younger, blankets from Chin State were the most valued, and they were really of good quality too. I remember each of us were given a Chin blanket each and no matter how old and worn out it got we didn't want to throw it away. Growing up, I only used two blankets and I still have the Chin blanket my father received

as a present. That's how much we value them.”

“I want to revitalize the market for Chin blankets. In our modern age we don't need to make the entire blanket out of wool but I want to bring back the Chin blankets woven with

Chin people are also attractive. I want the traditional weavers to be protected from fading away. The southern Chin use natural thread for their fabric and they enjoy moderate success in turning it into a business. The end product is expensive but the

traditional outfits for years. I think the children here need to grow a bit more. It's important for them to have sufficient nutrition. That's why I want the State government to educate the people on nutrition. Please be mindful of your children's health. I am overjoyed that the parents here greatly encourage their children's education. Please continue to do so. The government will continue to support you in education and healthcare.”

The local people then submitted the requirements for their regional development, and officials replied to them. The State Counsellor then handed over 100 sacks of rice and 100 viss of edible oil to the local people and cordially greeted them.

To Tiddim Township

In the evening, the State Counsellor and entourage travelled by military helicopter to Tiddim Township and met with local people at the town hall.

The State Counsellor said she saw numerous signboards with the words 'The brave are successful' and considers this a representation of the Chin people because it takes considerable bravery to live up in the mountain range. She acknowledged the fact that the weather can be harsh and the

geography of the area makes travel more precarious than other states, implying that the Chin people are capable of living in these conditions.

The State Counsellor said the Union government always has plans to prioritize development in Chin State. She said one of the two requests she has received is to assimilate Tiddim and Tonzang townships and expand it into Tiddim District. She said this will take time and must be done step by step.

The State Counsellor said the other request is to install

a major power grid in Tiddim Township in the 2019-2020 fiscal year. She said the relevant ministry has proposed to complete this request in the same fiscal year, and she hopes this answer is satisfactory.

Opening new educational institutes

Regarding education, the State Counsellor said there are also requests to open a government technical high school and a government technical institute

(GTI) in Tiddim. She said there is already a technical high school in the area and another one is slated to be opened in Paletwa Tsp. She said it will take some time to open a GTI in Tiddim.

The State Counsellor said there were children sitting in the front row listening to her speeches during her campaigns in Chin State. Children should be involved in community discussions as it concerns their future as well, said the State Counsellor. She said the children may not fully understand everything but the discussions are a matter pertaining to everyone. She said we must instill the idea that democracy concerns everyone from a young age, no matter if they are young or old, healthy or disabled. She said this also encourages discipline as it teaches children to be respect the rules and be civilized during discussions.

The State Counsellor told the local people they can talk about their aspirations and inquire about the government during her brief meeting with them. She said she will try her best to answer all their questions.

The local people then submitted the requirements of the region and officials replied in accordance with their respective sector. The State Counsellor provided suggestions where necessary and greeted the local people with warmth and affection. —MNA ■

India suspends border bridge with Reedhorda in Chin State

India suspended travel through the border gate at Reedhorda in Chin State on 21 and 22 January and will also suspend travel on 25 and 26 January, according to local authorities.

The bridge was suspended on 21 and 22 January when India's Lt-Gen Sangwan, Director General of the Assam Army of India, was visiting the area. The bridge will be suspended again on 25 and 26 January while India is celebrating their 70th Republic Day.

U Kyin Lin Khaing, Head of Reedhorda General Adminis-

tration Office, confirmed the information yesterday. He said, "A border trade camp on India's side was temporarily closed due to a trip by India's high ranking officer. India will temporarily close the border gate on 25 and 26 January because they will celebrate the Republic Day."

When asked about the temporary closure of the border gate, a director of the Directorate of Trade replied that his ministry has not yet received an official notice. —Han Lin Naing *(Translated by Myat Thandar Aung)*

Proposals to use township wise Pyidaungsu Hluttaw related development funds were informed to be submitted at the latest on 31 January 2019. To date 262 townships had made submissions and permissions were granted to 196 townships. Townships that had made submissions made without specified documents were requested to submit the required documents and townships that hadn't made submissions yet are to submit it within the specified time.

Furthermore, the assessment and inspection report of development works in 2017-2018 by office of the Union Auditor General still contain weaknesses and shortcomings of last year and township implementation groups are being informed further to conduct according to related law, processes and regulations.

Coming together from the constituencies to Nay Pyi Taw where the Hluttaw is situated is to attend and the Hluttaw regular sessions on behalf of the constituents and to attend, participate and discuss in related committee meetings as

Roundtable on ways and means of carrying out research activities by students

The MRTV broadcast round table discussion on the ways and means being carried out at the research activities by the students. The panelists are Dr. Than Htaik Soe, Principal of BEHS (11) in Aung Myay Thar San Township, Mandalay Region; Dr. Ni Ni Than, Chemistry Department of Yangon Arts and Science University; Rector Professor Dr. Theingi, Technological University (Thanlyin); Dr. Than Than Win, Deputy Director-General of Higher Education Department; Dr. Hpyu Hpyu Win, Deputy Director-General, Department of Research and Innovation; Dr. Thair Maung Maung, Professor (Head of Department), Department of UAV Research, Myanmar Aerospace Engineering University (MAEU).

Moderator: Please explain the subject of today's discussion.

Dr. Than Than Win: Today, we will discuss how the research activities are being carried out by the students from the basic education level to the higher education level. We will also discuss how to draw their interest and how to inject good habits over the research activities covering basic education schools as well as the research activities at the universities.

Moderator: Kindly explain the ways and mean in drawing their interest in the research activities.

Dr. Than Htaik Soe: At the moment, we are conducting and imparting small skill concept and practical activities. In fact, the advantage of the latest small skill concept does not actually require the large practical halls.

The teachers and the faculty members could carry out the task in their own lecture rooms by dividing the students into small groups, resulting with the teaching methodology more dynamic

and vibrant.

Moreover, the students at the basic level have gained the experience of practical approach along with the mindset of research activities, which is the basic paradigm of standard education.

Moderator: Inspiring the concept of research, what are the steps in nurturing the students?

Dr. Than Htaik Soe: In our basic education system, we have the subject on environmental education, and we invited skillful persons for the activities, where they instructed in drawing green map in Mandalay. Students went outdoors and draw green maps on the schools, the environments, the towns and villages, which embedded their souls with the love of the environment as well as the research activities. When they enrolled at various universities, they could be transformed as the professionals.

Moderator: We learned that the new science subject has been written with the concept of exploration. Please elaborate.

Dr. Ni Ni Than: In the science subject being prescribed for kindergarten to class (12) level, they are written on activity base approach. We want the students to understand the lessons well and also wished them to have interest in the research activities. In this way, they would understand the lessons very well instead of rote learning.

We will provide the students with the observation skill along with the knowledge of science process at each and every level of classes.

At this juncture, we would like to advice the teachers to take in all the students in divided groups in the participation of the research activities based on the new curriculum. Demonstrations and competitions events on science are to be conducted with the

participation of the students from middle schools and high schools.

Moderator: Please clarify the ways and means in enhancing the research work.

Dr. Ni Ni Than: Each and every year, our universities conducted many events in terms of high competitions on science subject, beginning from first year to the doctorate status with the participation in groups for presenting projects prepared by themselves.

The competitions are awarded with many prizes by the authorities as well as by Arts and Sciences Association. Moreover, the research papers and thesis are also awarded every year. With these backdrops, we found that the student have been highly inspired with the interest on research activities.

Moderator: What should be supplemented for research activity at university levels?

"The curriculum for university students should be arranged and prepared according to research based on theory and outside knowledge. Students must be assigned more projects that help them develop the approach and mindset for research."

Dr. Theingi Perhaps, the references from the library would be necessary along with the utility of ICT in the research work, and above all, the adequate funds must be provided.

Regarding supervisors, they must have ample understanding on research methodology, the research management, the research training, and therefore, the teachers have been imparted and infused with training courses including post graduate degrees in the country as well as abroad being arranged by the British Council and the JICA with the

students through assessment and analysis. When the analysis is carried out over the level of the students, we would come to know on the fact that of the students actually acquired the knowledge, that of in reality understand the lessons, that of the applicability in real life, and that of embracing into creative thinking. When the faculty members could impart the students with certain level of understanding, then they would be able to roll smoothly into research activities.

approval of the Ministry of Education.

The most important factor is the "research active" which stands as the correct ethic and moral philosophy. Higher Education Institutions generally define a "Research Active" individual as someone who conducts research on an ongoing basis and ensures it is a significant focus of their academic activity.

Moderator: What are the requisite for successful researchers?

Dr. Theingi: For the development of research works, it is necessary and important to carry out continuously, and certain competitions and demonstrations are to be arranged for the students and the researchers with the subsequent presentations of awards and prizes.

The Ministry of Education has been organizing paper reading sessions in all universities in the context of research nature in addition to the printing of research papers and the publication of research journals.

The budget allocation for education is rising year on year, and therefore, the relevant universities are conducting necessary research works such as that of local and regional necessity, that of relevant research to the state, and that of the significant research on international aspects.

All the necessary research activities are to be carried out in cooperation among the students and the faculty members.

Moderator: Please explain whether the research work is related only with science subject.

Dr. Than Than Win: Most of the students from the basic education as well as from the university thought and took it for granted that all the works done at the practical halls are the research work.

In fact, the popular subjects for arts are also taken up as re-

search works and come under the purview of the research nature, which only a few people understand about it.

The subjects for arts are taken up into research works and given as assignment not to get the students bored in the study. The arts subjects are given out as assignments and rolled out into discussions to get the arts subject into interesting items.

The economic matters under the arts subjects could be taken up as research study without the practical halls or laboratory. Through the economic domain, the social matters and affairs could be taken up for research activity, and the assessments and the evaluations could be utilized for the development of the nation. This is the message that all the students must understand and convinced regarding the research sphere.

Moderator: Without the practical halls, what are the other subjects that could be taken up for research activities?

Dr. Than Than Win: The arts subjects that do not require practical halls could be handed out as assignment after the lectures, and that the assignments could be extracted from the libraries as well as from the E-Book, which could be exchanged and discussed as the observations in the class rooms followed by knowledge sharing.

This is the start of a study and a research activity that could be developed into the finer habits and characteristics of research program. It could also take up as interesting art subject transforming into research category, and adopt and nurture the good habits of using libraries for the development of research works for the greater good of the nation.



Sagaing Region attracts over 190,000 travellers in 2018

OVER 190,000 local and foreign travellers visited Sagaing Region in 2018, according to official statistics provided by the Sagaing Region's Directorate of Hotels and Tourism.

A total of 133,371 travellers, including 114,199 local visitors and 19,172 international tourists, visited Monywa zone;

about 353,50 travellers, including 30,179 local visitors and 5,171 international tourists, visited Kalay zone; about 14,948 travellers, including 13,568 local visitors and 1,380 international tourists, visited Sagaing zone; a total of 4,304 travellers, including 4,098 local visitors and 206 international tourists, visited Shwebo

zone and; and about 8,945 travellers, including 8,663 local visitors and 282 international tourists, visited Katha zone.

In 2017, Sagaing Region welcomed 168,102 visitors, with 118,353 travellers heading to Monywa zone, 22,894 travellers to Kalay zone, 11,711 travellers to Sagaing zone, 5,976 travellers

to Shwebo zone, and 8,168 travellers to Katha zone, according to the region's Directorate of Hotels and Tourism.

To increase the number of tourists, the authorities have been conducting promotions, marketing, and awareness campaigns.—Win Oo (Zeyartaing)

Border trade through ITCs tops K16 bln in Q1

BORDER trade with the use of Individual Trading Cards (ITCs) exceeded K16 billion as of 4 January in the current financial year, according to statistics provided by the Ministry of Commerce.

Of the total trade of K16.5 billion, exports amounted to K3.1 billion, while imports topped K13.3 billion.

Among the border gates,

Myawady reported the largest volume of trade valued at over K8 billion.

The value of trade via ITCs at border points was: K1.8 billion at Tamu trade camp, K19 million at Muse, K44 million at Tachilek, K3.4 million at Lwejel, K594 million at Kanpikete, K755 million at Kawthoung, K54 million at Reed, K4.8 billion at Mawtaung, and

K279 million at Kengtung, according to statistics provided by the Ministry of Commerce.

The total trade value with ITCs stood at K45.94 billion in the 2017-2018 FY. The Ministry of Commerce permitted 292 ITCs in the 2012-2013 FY, issued 261 cards in the 2013-2014 FY, 317 cards in the 2014-2015 FY, 146 cards in the 2015-2016 FY, 248 cards in the 2016-2017

FY, 168 cards in the 2017-2018 FY, 92 cards between 1 April and 30 September in the interim budget period, and 67 cards between 1 October and 4 January.

The Trade Department launched ITCs to boost border trade and has issued a total of 1,591 ITCs so far.—Zwe

Yangon records over 35,000 traffic violations in 2018

THE Yangon Region government initiated legal action in over 35,000 cases involving violations of traffic rules and regulations in 2018, according to the Yangon Region Transport Authority.

"A total of 21,594 cases were reported by six teams formed by the YRTA, while

6,576 cases were reported by ten teams comprising traffic police. The remaining 7,020 cases were reported by the traffic police. The cases were mostly reported in January, February, and May," said an official with the YRTA.

A total of 230 cases involving traffic accidents caused

by buses were reported in the Yangon Region in 2016, 102 cases in 2017, and 155 cases in 2018.

According to the official statistics, the number of traffic accidents declined by 128 in 2017 compared to the previous year. In 2018, however, the number of accident cases

has increased. The traffic police have filed charges against suspected reckless drivers under sections 279, 337, 338, and 304 (A) of the Penal Code. The traffic police are conducting regular awareness talks and distributing pamphlets to reduce road accidents.—GNLM

Myanmar oil millers body targets FDA certification for 150 mills by 2020

THE Myanmar Edible Oil Millers Association (MEOMA) will help millers in the entire supply chain get approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), according to the Myanmar Trade Promotion Organization (MYAN-TRADE).

This move is aimed at eradicating illegal sales in the market and ensure a firm market for producers, said an official with MEOMA.

In 2019-2020, the association will make efforts to increase the number of FDA-recognized oil mills to about 150. At present, about 50 mills hold the FDA certificate.

The move will also help millers earn the trust of consum-

ers and place them in a better position to compete with other oil brands being sold in the domestic market, said Mandalay oil millers.

Several types of imported edible oil such as soybean oil, sunflower oil, and vegetable oil enjoy a market share in the domestic market. These cooking oils have certificates and an approval logo and their fair price attracts more consumers than locally-produced edible oil of high quality, said millers.

“Imported edible oils have certificates only from their country of origin and lack FDA testing. However, local millers cannot compete with them, as marketing and good advertising

ensure they sell well,” said an oil miller.

“As a result, local groundnut oil millers are suffering, and have been prompted to re-

duce the purchase price of raw groundnut. However, groundnut growers may feel the pinch from reduced prices,” he added.

In 1989, there were over

3,000 oil mills across the country. Now, only 10 per cent remain, and even those that have survived are struggling. — GNLM (Translated by Ei Myat Mon) ■

Chinese New Year draws near, cattle exports to China fall

With the Chinese New Year approaching, the volume of cattle exports to China is on the decline, said Mandalay cattle exporters.

Only some companies that have made purchase agreements in advance have conducted trade in recent days. Most export companies have suspended trade. The demand this year is seen higher than last year. A large cow is selling for over K 2 million, while small cow are priced below K 2 million.

According to the 2018 cattle census, there are a total of 11.5 million heads of cattle in the country. Local consumption

is 0.4 million heads, while production surplus is 0.7 million heads per year.

Livestock exports are forecast to rise as trading of livestock was allowed in late 2017. Myanmar has earned US\$260 million from export of over 200,000 cattle since the announcement permitting live cattle exports was made a year ago. Additionally, Myanmar is exploring new export markets for cattle. The exported cattle are more than five years old and are sold with the required vaccination certificates, health certificates, and farming registration certificates. — GNLM (Translated by Ei Myat Mon) ■

Value of imports shrinks to \$100 mln in Q1

THE value of imports between 1 October and 11 January in the 2018-2019 fiscal year totalled US\$5.09 billion, a decline of \$100 million compared with the corresponding period of the previous FY.

The import values of consumer, capital, and intermediate goods registered a slight fall in the October-January period.

Myanmar imported consumer products such as pharmaceuticals, cosmetics, and palm oil worth \$952 million in the

current fiscal year. The value of consumer goods imports by both the private and the public sector saw a decrease of \$77 million compared with the corresponding period of the previous FY. Meanwhile, imports of capital goods such as auto parts, vehicles, machines, steel and airplane parts, amounted to \$1.66 billion, a decrease of \$73.4 million compared with the same period in the last FY.

Intermediate goods make up most of Myanmar’s imports, with

petroleum products and plastic raw materials being the main import items. The country’s raw material imports stood at \$1.87 million, dropping \$48.9 million against the same period in the previous fiscal year. Additionally, Myanmar also imported raw materials worth \$606.4 million for the CMP (Cut-Make-Pack) garment sector. Imports for this sector showed an increase of \$99.8 million against the previous FY. — Ko Htet (Translated by Ei Myat Mon) ■

Dec hit by highest inflation rate

THE average inflation rate in Myanmar, based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI), was the highest in December at 6.86 per cent and the lowest in March at 4.03 per cent, according to statistics provided by the Central Statistical Organization (CSO).

The annual average inflation rate in December showed a small increase from November, when the rate was 6.66 per cent, according to a report released recently by the CSO, under the Ministry of Planning and Finance.

In December 2018, the CPI showed an increase for non-food group, tobacco and beverages group, household goods and maintenance group, other commodities group, clothing, health,

education services, recreation and culture, and housing groups.

The Myanmar currency depreciated against the US dollar in December compared to November. Therefore, the price of imported fuel slipped, leading to a decline in consumer prices. Food group indicated a sharp decline in December on account of smooth freight movement and harvest time of rice and fish.

The year-on-year inflation rate in December hit a high of 6.85 per cent.

In November, Mandalay City recorded the highest inflation rate at 11.53 per cent, followed by Rakhine State at 10.68 per cent, and Magway Region at 9.66 per cent. The year-on-year inflation

rate fluctuated with a maximum rate of 10.53 per cent in Magway Region, and a minimum rate of 4.34 per cent in Kayah State.

Earlier, the inflation rate was evaluated based on a 2006 survey and then, the base year was changed to 2012.

The Central Statistical Organization conducted a Household Income and Expenditure Survey in 82 townships in November 2012. To reduce the inflation rate, the authorities have made efforts on the basis of policies on finance, currency, trade and foreign currency control, according to the second five-year National Development plan. — Htet Myat (Translated by Ei Myat Mon) ■

Complaints and Appeals committee

Next Pyithu Hluttaw Deputy Speaker U Tun Tun Hein read about the duties, responsibilities, rights and terms of Complaints and Appeals Committee and Pyithu Hluttaw Speaker informed the Hluttaw of planning to form 16-member Complaints and Appeals Committee with U Myint Lwin of Pazundaung constituency and U Saw Thalay Saw of Shwegyin constituency as chairman and secretary.

Asterisk marked questions

U Myint Lwin of Twantay constituency raised the first asterisk marked question on whether there is plan to publish a biography of Bogyoke Aung San. Deputy Minister for Information U Aung Hla Tun said the question will be explained together with an answer provided by Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture.

At the moment Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture, Department of Historical Research and National Library is planning to publish Bogyoke Aung San biography (1915-1947) and a draft was

already written according to information provided by the ministry. The biography will have 6 chapters. Chapter 1 cover the youth period from 1915 to 1932. Chapter 2 covers the university student period from 1932 to 1938. Chapter 3 the Thakhin period, Chapter 4 preparation for armed insurrection (1940 to 1941), Chapter 5 the War Minister period from 1942 to 1945 and Chapter 6 the national leader period from 1945 to 1947 explained the Deputy Minister.

Responding to a question raised by Daw Cho Cho of Ottwin constituency on plan to turn the suspended pulp factory at Bant Bwe Gon Village, Ottwin Township into a garment factory under a BOT (built, operate and transfer) system Deputy Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation U Hla Kyaw said the factory was not fully operational due and was rented to a private company under a thirty year lease starting from 1 January 2013 at an annual rent of K 8 million. However, the private company was unable to run the pulp factory due to difficulty in obtaining raw materials and was also unable

to produce quality product for export and thus was at an inoperable status.

The company had proposed changing the investment into some other factory that'll be beneficial for the country as well as the people. The consideration includes the garment factory pointed out by the Hluttaw representatives as well as some other forms that are equally or even more beneficial and there are plans to submit to the Union Government economic affairs committee for decision and implementation explained the Deputy Minister. Similarly questions raised by U Myo Zaw Aung of Kawlin constituency, U Sai Ngaung Hsai Hein of Maukmai constituency, U Nyan Hein of Thanbyuzayat constituency, U Nyunt Aung of Monywa constituency and Dr. Daw Khin Sithu of Loikaw constituency were answered by Deputy Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation U Hla Kyaw and Deputy Minister for Commerce U Aung Htoo.

Hluttaw agrees to discuss motion on seed sector development

Following the asterisk-marked question session, U Aung Kyi Thein of

Chaungzon constituency tabled a motion urging the Union Government to increase momentum of seed sector development effectively and practically as it is the main source of agriculture development in the country and explained further about the reason for tabling the motion.

Pyithu Hluttaw Speaker U T Khun Myat announced the Hluttaw's agreement to accept and discuss the motion after obtaining the decision of the Hluttaw and also announced for Hluttaw representatives who want to discuss the motion to register their names.

Fire in Myitkyina guts two buildings; losses pegged at K9.6 mln

Q & A Session

In the question-and-answer session that followed, asterisk-marked questions raised by U Win Maung of Magway Region constituency 6, U Kyaw Kyaw of Rakhine State constituency 4, U Ye Myint Soe of Yangon Region constituency 7, U Pyu Lwin of Magway Region constituency 12, U Saw Sein Tun of Kayah State constituency 4 were answered by Deputy Minister for Electricity and Energy Dr. Tun Naing and Deputy Minister for Construction U Kyaw Lin.

Road upgrading projects

Afterwards, U Win Maung of Magway Region constituency 6 asked if the Union Government plans to implement the rural

road upgrading projects in Salin Township, Magway Region, and which would be commenced from 2019-2020 FY to 2021-2022 FY.

Strategy for rural road development 2030

To this query, Deputy Minister for Construction U Kyaw Lin replied that the Ministry of Construction has set up a strategy for rural road development 2030, which aims at upgrading a total of 81 streets that covered 263 miles and 5 furlongs long, and that can be used for the whole year, moreover efforts would be made to complete the number one priority road which aimed at completing in the tenure of the present government. The Ministry of Construction had planned to complete the number two priority road in the 2024-2025 FY;

the number three priority road from 2025-2026 FY to 2030-2031 FY, according to the strategy for rural road development 2030.

The construction of 20-mile-long earthen road would be conducted in 2018-2019, and plans are under way to upgrade the earthen road into a 16-mile long rural laterite one, the gravel road into a 2-mile-long tarred road in Salin Township, Magway Region. Plans are under way to upgrade the earthen road into laterite road for 15 miles, laterite road to gravel road for 7 miles, earthen road to concrete road for 3 miles with the use of the Union Fund from 2019-2020 FY to 2021-2022 FY.

Moreover the Ministry of Construction has planned to upgrade earth-

en road into laterite road for 26 miles, earthen road into concrete road for 2 miles, and rough road into tarred road for 29 miles with the use the Region Government Fund. As for the Ministry of Construction, master plans are being laid down to upgrade the rest roads in the 2029-2030 FY.

The road upgrading projects

U Kyaw Kyaw of Rakhien State constituency 4 asked the Union Government if it plans to carry out the road upgrading projects for Ppinyin-Nantat @ Partaw Inter-village road, MyaukU Township, Rakhine State.

Union Minister for Construction U Kyaw Lin replied that the construction project would be carried out, using the allot-

ment of the Rakhine State government's fund in the 2019-2020 FY.

Similarly, Deputy Minister for Electricity and Energy Dr. Tun Naing and Deputy Minister for Construction U Kyaw Lin replied the queries raised by U Ye Myint Soe of Yangon Region constituency 7, U Pyu Lwin of Magway Region constituency 12 and U Saw Sein Tun of Kayah State constituency 4.

'Hugely excited' England boss Southgate cools Man Utd talk

LONDON (United Kingdom) — Gareth Southgate insisted on Sunday his work as England manager was far from done as he indicated he had no interest in taking charge at Manchester United any time soon.

A recent report in Britain's *Sunday Telegraph* said Southgate was on a shortlist being drawn up by Old Trafford chiefs as they sought a permanent replacement for the sacked Jose Mourinho.

But with Ole Gunnar Solskjær, the caretaker manager, having won his first seven games in charge of United, the Red Devils may have a ready-made successor in their former striker.

In any case Southgate, who last year in Russia took Eng-

land to their first appearance in a World Cup semi-final since 1990, and has since guided them to qualification for the inaugural Nations League finals, has unfinished business with the Three Lions.

The former England centre-back made that clear when, at a Football Writers' Association dinner in London on Sunday he was asked, following the United speculation, if he felt fulfilled by the England post.

'Job is not done'

"I'm the England manager and it's a privileged position to be in," Southgate told Sky Sports.

"We've had the best year for 28 years and we've got a semi-final this summer and a European

Championship that's predominantly at Wembley, providing we take care of business to qualify.

"So it's a hugely exciting time with the team. I don't think we've progressed as far as we can yet. I think there's room for us to grow."

The 48-year-old added: "I am still a young coach. I've managed less than 200 matches, so, for me, it's an honour to be in the role I'm in and I thoroughly enjoy it."

As for Sunday's event, staged in honour of Southgate, his England squad and staff, he said: "When you're having tributes, you're thinking, 'Well, the job is not done for us yet, there's a lot for us to go for and a lot of improvement for us to make.'"

England captain Harry Kane, the Golden Boot winner in Russia, has been a key member of Southgate's side. But Kane has been ruled out until March after suffering an ankle injury during Tottenham Hotspur's 1-0 loss to Manchester United last weekend. While

saddened to see Kane injured, Southgate said his absence could yet benefit both club and country. "I'm sure they (Spurs) and England will get a player that's refreshed from that little break and stronger again, and hungry to go," Southgate said. —AFP ■

Serena muscles past top seed Halep into Open quarters

MELBOURNE (Australia) — Serena Williams subdued a stubborn fightback from world number one Simona Halep to take her quest for a record-equalling 24th major into the Australian Open quarter-finals on Monday.

The 37-year-old American beat the Romanian top seed 6-1, 4-6, 6-4 in an epic three-setter to line up a last eight clash with Czech eighth seed Karolina Pliskova.

It was Williams' first match against a world number one since returning after having a baby in September 2017 and the American showed why many already regard her as the greatest

of all time.

She unleashed an early onslaught and Halep was in danger crumbling before the French Open champion regrouped for a stirring comeback.

"It was an intense match and there were some incredible points," Williams said.

"She's the number one player in the world and there's a reason why... (but) I'm such a fighter, I just never give up."

Williams won her 23rd Grand Slam Down Under two years ago while two months pregnant and is the bookies' favourite to claim an eighth Australian title, despite being seeded 16th. —AFP ■

Messi surprise substitute as Barcelona take on Leganes

BARCELONA (Spain) — Lionel Messi started on the bench on Sunday as Barcelona looked to restore their lead at the top of La Liga to five points by beating Leganes.

Barca had not reported any injury to their star striker before kick-off at the Camp Nou. Ernesto Valverde may have opted to rest the Argentinian in the middle of a busy period of the season.

After Leganes, Barcelona face two midweek games against Sevilla in the Copa del Rey quarter-finals, either side of

league fixtures against Girona and Valencia. It is only the third time this term that Messi has not been named in the team, after Barca drew the previous two matches against Athletic Bilbao and Tottenham. Ivan Rakitic was also a substitute against Leganes as Thomas Vermaelen and the 21-year-old Carles Alena were handed starting spots. Defender Clement Lenglet was left out of the squad. The Frenchman is suffering from muscle fatigue, according to reports in the Spanish press. —AFP ■

Iran reach Asian Cup quarter-finals after early scare

ABU DHABI (United Arab Emirates) — Title-chasing Iran survived a first-minute penalty in a chaotic start to beat Oman 2-0 and reach the Asian Cup quarter-finals on Sunday.

Beanpole goalkeeper Alireza Beiranvand saved from the spot before goals from Alireza Jahanbakhsh and Ashkan Dejagah in Abu Dhabi sent Iran through to face China, who beat Thailand 2-1 in an early kickoff. Beiranvand

saved a Cristiano Ronaldo penalty at last year's World Cup and he plunged to his right to brilliantly deny Oman captain Ahmed Al-Mahajri and prevent Oman taking a shock lead just moments into the game. Iran, who are looking to end a 43-year-old Asian Cup title drought, broke through after 32 minutes when Brighton forward Jahanbakhsh latched onto a hopeful long ball to poke the ball past Oman goalkeeper

Faiyz Al-Rusheidi. "Team Melli" captain Dejagah lashed home a penalty four minutes before the break after Mehdi Taremi had been brought down. Beiranvand produced an acrobatic save to keep out Muhsen Al-Ghassani's long-range strike just before the half-time whistle. Sardar Azmoun — dubbed the "Iranian Messi" — twice fluffed his lines after the interval when it looked easier to score. —AFP ■
