Pyidaungsu Hluttaw approves Union Supplementary Budget Allocation Bill

THE Pyidaungsu Hluttaw convened its 5th-day meeting yesterday, and approved the Union Supplementary Budget Allocation Bill for 2019-2020 financial year after discussions of ministers and deputy ministers of the Union Government.

International Fund for Agriculture Development

Deputy Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation U Hla Kyaw explained the Eastern States Agribusiness Project (ESAP) which is financed by the Loan and Grant provided by the International Fund for Agriculture Development (IFAD) and partial cost sharing of the Government of Myanmar.

With US\$56.73 million loan and \$1.5 million grant of IFAD for the period from 2018-2019FY to 2023-2024FY, the project area covers Taunggyi, Hopong, Hsihseng and Kyauktalangi in Shan State, and Hpa-an, Hlaingbwe, Kawkareik and Thandaunggyi in Kayin State for promoting livelihoods of low-income rural people and small-scaled farmers, while sustaining forests and agricultural lands.

The MoALI has proposed supplementary budget of K7.667 billion for 2018-2019FY, excluding international aid and grants.

Budget for Advance Metering Infrastructure (AMI)

Deputy Minister for Electricity and Energy U Khin Maung Win explained the replacement of Class 2 analog electricity meters with the system of digital off site meter reading in 2014 as the Remote Hand Held Unit (HHU) of this method can read the electrical units more accurately before collecting the data into computer system.

He added the ministry will

set a certain budget to use the Advance Metering Infrastructure (AMI) under the new digital system.

Prioritizing edible oil crops in export strategy

Deputy Minister for Commerce U Aung Htoo discussed implementation of State project on prioritizing edible oil crops in the export strategy of the country. He added the project requires fertile lands, seeds, input items, techniques and investment, and his ministry is working together with the MoALI, the Myanmar Edible Oil Millers Association (MEOMA).

Myanmar exported 50,000 tonnes of ground nuts in 2017-2018FY and has shipped about 70,000 tonnes of this edible crops up to 15 May of 2019-2020FY; the export of sesames increased from 90,000 tonnes to 100,000 tonnes in the corresponding period, while the cultivation of other edible crops is rising in the country to substitute imported cooking oil and byproducts.

EDCF's \$20 million loan

MP U Myint Lwin from Twantay constituency, MP U Ohn Khin from Palaw constituency, MP U Aung Thike from Seikpyu constituency and MP Dr Sein Mya Aye from Dala constituency discussed the \$20 million loan from the Economic Development Cooperation Fund (EDCF) of the Republic of Korea for the expansion of the Myanmar-Korea Friendship Bridge (Dala) project.

Union Minister for Health and Sports Dr Myint Htwe and Deputy Minister for Planning, Finance and Industry U Maung Maung Win discussed the \$30 million loan proposal, tabled by the President, from the ADB, for capacity-building of health workers to handle global pandemic like the COVID-19.

Euro 33 million loan from Unicredit Bank

The Hluttaw representatives also discussed the proposal of no-interest loan of Euro 33 million, presented by the President, from the Unicredit Bank of Austria for the project to register population with electronic system which will be carried by the Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population.

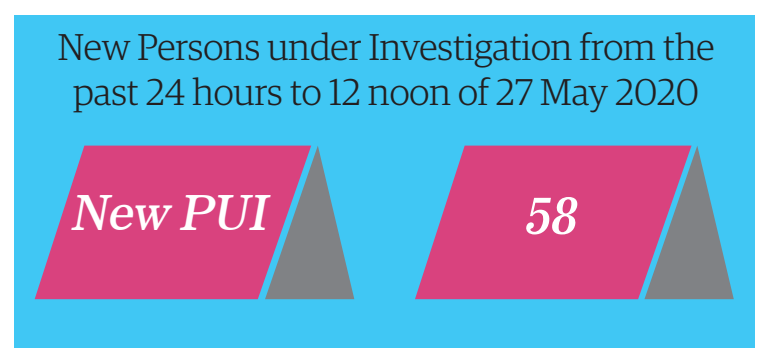
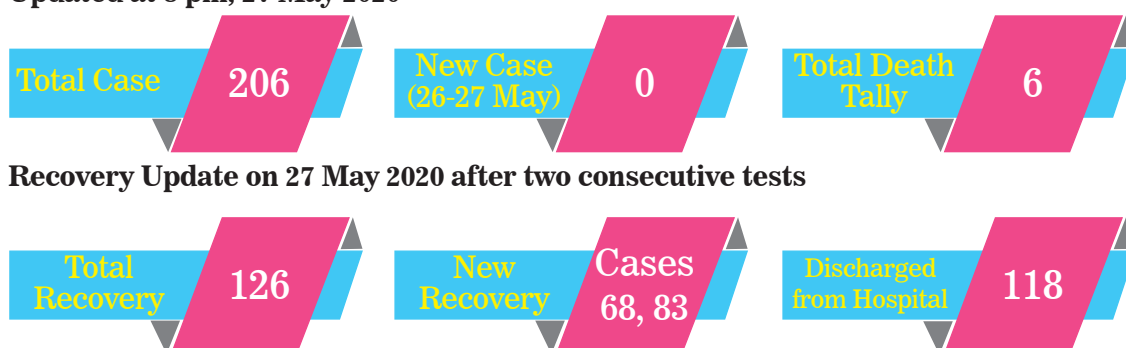

“People are the key”

State Counsellor meets first prize winners of homemade cotton mask competition online

Daw Kyi Kyi Win from Wundwin Township explained her main reasons for entering the competition; free distribution of her homemade cotton masks; mask design and raw materials used in making the masks.

In her response, the State Counsellor said that the most challenging problem in relation with COVID-19 was social distancing as this lifestyle was not practical in daily life; a doctor has to treat not only physical but mental needs; it was necessary to understand the mental needs to be able to treat the physical condition; presently thousands of returnees came back through the Myawady border town; according to available information, tens of thousands of Myanmar migrant workers were expected to return home from this route; the returnees who came back through the border crossings had to be transported to their respective states and regions; it was difficult to conduct medical tests on all of them, but they were held in quarantine facilities in their areas; there would be a huge challenge for the country in the coming two or three months; medical tests must be carried out thoroughly and care must be taken in controlling the disease and giving treatments to the positive cases; and that it would be difficult for the returnees once the monsoon sets in.

The State Counsellor added that it was earlier planned

to give only one award in this competition and that all of the more than 20,000 participants should get a prize; however, arrangements were being made to send them souvenir cards; the categories of the award in this competition were the Most Liked by the Public award, the Most Interesting Idea award, the Best Creation award and the Best Serving the Public Interest award.

She continued to say that the reason society did not accept the “single mother” concept was related how the community placed a value on it; she had encountered this problem in her childhood; that she had never been taught to discriminate; they should not

feel inferior and she hoped that the community would not look down on them; the real problem was not the problem itself, the problem was not being able to find a solution.

She added that most Myanmar people could not afford to use disposable face masks, and that was why people were encouraged to make their own masks; as it was not known how long the disease was going to last, as these masks could be reused, just by having three or four of these masks would serve the purpose; masks should be worn systematically; patients should be given treatment with sympathy, and discipline should be maintained with metta (loving-kindness).

At the village and ward levels, she wished that COVID-19 preventive measures would be carried with the participation of everyone.

In her concluding remarks, the State Counsellor said that she frequently remarked that public participation was essential for the success of any work, and that people must have community spirit without becoming too egoistic; COVID-19 was a huge challenge for all; she wanted Myanmar citizens to become united as a result of this challenge; future plans should be formulated correctly; the current situation had allowed Myanmar to show more clearly what kind of a country Myanmar was to those who had

been giving pressure on Myanmar due to many reasons; every citizen of Myanmar could help in overcoming COVID-19 by making a mask; that was why each person was important; she was very happy and encouraged to have this online meeting; she wanted to urge everyone to continue the cooperation; it was necessary to teach children at an early age how to cultivate “metta”, to understand each other, and to have compassion and goodwill.

Finally, she said she wanted everyone to participate and cooperate in this programme to overcome COVID-19.

Police officer from Hline Township charged with corruption

THE Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) received a report that a defendant had to pay one million kyats to associate township judge and police officer from Hline Police Station to get guarantee, according to the ACC.

The ACC investigated into

the matter and discovered that Police Captain Thein Swe Myint of Hline Police Station, Yangon Region (who is now Acting Police Major, head of Hopan Township Police Station) exploited one million kyats from daughter of the defendant who charged with criminal case No

1051/2017, penal code section 295(a) on 5 March 2018. The ACC opened the file at the Hline Myoma Police Station on 25 May against Police Captain Thein Swe Myint under Section 57 of the Anti-Corruption Law.

80 Myanmar citizens arrive back from India by relief flight

THE relief flight of Myanmar National Airlines landed at the Yangon International Airport yesterday afternoon, carrying 80 Myanmar citizens stranded in Gaya and nearby areas of India due to suspension of international flights.

On arrival at the airport, officials from the Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population, the Ministry of Health and Sports, and the Yangon Region government helped for their 21-day quarantine period at designated places in line with the regulations of immigration and medical checks. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs is currently arranging flights to bring back the

citizens in coordination with Myanmar Embassy in the capital of India and relevant ministries of Myanmar under the directives of National-Level Central Committee on Prevention, Control and Treatment of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19).

Previously, a total of 95 Myanmar citizens from New Delhi and its surround areas arrived back home by a special flight on 19 May and 123 persons from Chennai on 24 May.

A total of 298 Myanmar citizens have been repatriated from India by relief flights so far.—MNA

1,434 Myanmar returnees come back home through Myawady border on 27 May

A total of 1,434 Myanmar citizens returned home from Thailand through Myanmar-Thai Friendship Bridge (2) of Myawady border town in Kayin State yesterday.

Among them, the 483 persons entered Myanmar by 21 buses under the arrangement of Thai government and Myanmar embassy, the 52 persons who were released from punishments in Thailand and the remaining 899 persons returned from different areas of the Kingdom in their own schedules.

Myanmar local officials helped them with medical tests

and other supplies.

Myanmar migrant workers have been repatriated from Thailand since 1 May, and a total of 6,611 persons have arrived back home until now.

The latest group of returnees included 3 from Kachin, 26 from Kayah, 195 from Kayin, 144 from Mon, 70 from Sagaing, 438 from Bago, 151 from Magway, 45 from Yangon, 95 from Mandalay, 58 from Nay Pyi Taw, 49 from Shan, 24 from Thaninthayi, 36 from Rakhine and 100 from Ayeyawady respectively.—Htein Lin Aung (IPRD)

Number of YBS commuters increases four-fold in May

THE number of YBS commuters has increased fourfold in May compared to that of last month. On 25 May, more than 500,000 commuters used YBS buses, according to the announcement of the Yangon Region Transport Authority (YRTA).

The daily figure of YBS commuters was about 200,000 in April. However the number has increased to over 500,000 on

25 May, using more than 3,000 buses in 124 YBS bus lines.

Before the pandemic period in Myanmar, the YBS operated more than 4,000 buses in Yangon region daily, commuting 2.5 million passengers. This rising number of YBS passengers is less than the number in a normal situation.

During the coronavirus disease prevention and control

period, the increasing number of YBS passengers is one of the serious issues, according to the person in charge of YBS bus lines.

"With the increased number of passengers, more YBS buses have to be operating. In fact, the large number of commuters is disrupting the pandemic prevention and control activities," he added. Although

more YBS buses are operating in this situation, the owners of YBS buses could not make any profit from delivering service because of fewer passengers compared to previous periods. Therefore, YRTA and the bus line owners have requested the government to reduce the price of CNG as a measure of government subsidy. —Aye Maung

Growers turn to produce dried mango flakes amid low demand from China

WITH the decline of mango demand from China because of difficulty in road transportation caused by coronavirus disease, the production of the dried flakes of mango pulp is rising, according to the dried sheet of mango pulp makers.

"Although mangoes are purchased from China, the demand for mango has declined

this year compared to last year. Previously, we can go to China in one night. Now, we have to go to China in two days. When we reached China, the mangos are already ripe. Also, entering China has been difficult these days and the price of mango has also declined. The local mango growers are thus making the dried sheet of mango pulp.

This year, they make the more dried sheet of mango pulp. If the mango could not reach the market, we have to make the dried sheet of mango pulp. The mango growers also make the green mango as pickled mango and sour pickled mango," said Ma Su Su, the dried sheet of mango pulp maker from Gaidton village, Hse Taung vil-

lage-tract, Patheingyi Township. Before we make the dried sheet of mango pulp, we have to clean the mango and peel it. Then, we have to circumcise the mango skin. Then, we have to blend the mango by setting fire to it to get the mango paste. When we get the mango paste, we have to oil the plastic and put the mango paste on it. Then, we have to sundry them.

"This year, we will get the more dried sheet of mango pulp. Last year, there were only 100 or 200 visses. We cannot send the mango to other places. So, the mangos are overripe. So, we have to make the dried sheet of mango pulp. The mango growers cannot wait for road transportation to become normal," she added.

The dried flake mango pulps are sent mostly to Yangon region as well as to other regions. The dried sheet mango pulps are treated as a snack. If the dried pulps are kept in a cool and dry place, the flakes can be eaten the whole year. —Htet Htar Naing (IPRD)

Labour scarcity hinders sterculia gum production

WITH the scarcity of labour in Mohnyin Township, Kachin State during coronavirus period, the local wild almond tree (biologically named sterculia versicolour wall) growers could not produce the gum from the tree although it is time to tap the gum, according to the township wild almond tree growers.

"We can tap the gum from the tree in April. There is no skilled labour to do this job. Last year, we hired skilled labour from other regions. This year, we could not hire them

because of restrictions imposed on movement caused by the outbreak of viral infection period," said U Taik Sein, a local grower, who planted about 800 wild almond trees.

"The price of the wild almond tree is varied. The high-quality gum is sold for K20,000 per viss while the normal gum, for K15,000 per viss. But, we don't have the demand. We have to send the gum to Mandalay depot but this can cost higher transportation charges," he added.

There are a total of 43 acres

Insufficient stock hampers black bean export quota to India

WITH the changes in India's policy on bean importation, Myanmar is unlikely to export the entire quota (400,000 tonnes) of black bean (which is called urad in India) for 2021 Fiscal Year to India within three months as there is inadequate stock in the domestic market, said Secretary U Min Ko Oo of Myanmar Pulses, Beans and Sesame Seeds Merchants Association.

Earlier, India set to import 400,000 tonnes of black bean for the next fiscal year by March 2021. It changed policy and narrowed the import deadline to three-month period, according to its recent notice.

"The changes of policy reflect on the unguaranteed market for the domestic growers. The sudden change in policy burdens the growers, raising confusion," he added.

At present, the country has around 250,000-300,000 tonnes of black bean stocks. It is un-

likely to export the entire quota of 400,000 tonnes to India, he continued.

Furthermore, it is impossible to ship all of them to India's port within three months. India can grant import licence to Indian traders in June, the association stated.

The supply chain of Myanmar's beans -- the growers and traders are facing hardships due to short period of rapid change. The market needs to be closely observed.

"The country lays down policy for its national interest. India's move is possible to protect their farmers as India's beans will be harvested in September. This is why they shrank the deadline to August-end 2020. If the yield is not good in September, they will surely make an extension for the import period. If not for poor yield, the import period will end as scheduled," he stated.

The prevailing price of black bean stands at K960,000

per tonne, while pigeon peas fetch K770,000 per tonne, a market data showed.

Myanmar is the top pro-

ducing country of black bean that India demands. Besides Myanmar, other beans such as pigeon peas, green grams and

yellow peas, are also grown in Australia and Africa, the association stated.

Green gram sells well in Monywa market

WITH the abundant supply of green gram, about 3,000 bags of green gram are reaching the bean trading market in Monywa town daily and about 2,000 to 3,000 bags of green gram are being sold to China and India every day, said general secretary U Zaw Moe of Monywa green gram depot.

"Around 3,000 bags of green gram are entering Monywa depots daily. The price of green gram is around K36,000-K37,000, which is the normal price. The green grams are demanded by China and India. The traders from Monywa town purchase the green gram from the local farmers and send them back to Chi-

na and India. The green grams are sent to China via Mandalay route and to India via Yangon route. Around 2,000 or 3,000 bags of green gram are being sold daily in Monywa town. Although Monywa could not supply the green gram to meet the full demand, the green grams from Shwebo, Pakokku and Ayeyawady regions can supply enough to meet the market demand," he added.

The red peanuts, white peanuts, green grams and sesames, which has grown with the irrigation system, are entering the Monywa market as well. The current price of green gram is ranging between K36,000 and

K37,000 while the peanut price is K3,000-K3,200 per viss in the market.

"Pigeon peas and chickpeas are also marketable beans. But they are not newly harvested beans. Some buy the pigeon peas and chickpeas because they like the price or they need them. Now, the green grams are newly harvested beans and they are reaching in thousands of the bags to the market daily," said U Tin Ko, a bean trader from Monywa town. With a high demand for green grams from China, the price of the green gram which has been declining previously is now rising starting from 20 May.

To be able to reopen the Monywa commodity depot closed temporarily because of the coronavirus pandemic, the market committee has already submitted a proposal to Sagaing region coronavirus prevention and response committee. The Monywa commodity depot will reopen after they have taken necessary measures.

"The Monywa commodity depot is conducting the coronavirus prevention and control activities and has already kept the masks, water and soaps and hand gels," stated the general secretary of Monywa green gram depot. — Myo Win Tun (Monywa)

FDI crosses \$4.18 bln as of 22 May

THE foreign direct investment flowing into Myanmar exceeded US\$4.18 billion between 1 October and 22 May in the 2019-2020 financial year, including the expansion of capital by existing enterprises, according to the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA). The total figure includes investments of \$91.85 million in the Special Economic Zones, under the Special Economic Zone Law.

Myanmar set an FDI target of \$5.8 billion in the current fiscal, but we cannot measure the impact of coronavirus pandemic at present, said MIC Secretary and DICA Director-General U Thant Sin Lwin.

"The enterprises operating with imported raw materials will be affected to a certain extent. Sure, enterprises with a big labour force will struggle amid the coronavirus outbreak," he said.

According to a press statement issued recently by the DICA, 175 foreign enterprises have obtained permits from the MIC and endorsements from regional and state Investment Committees in the current fiscal and brought in

the capital of over \$3.15 billion. Those enterprises will execute electricity, manufacturing, agriculture, livestock and fishery, transport and communication, real estate development, hotels and tourism, and other services businesses.

"Myanmar is trying to attract foreign investment by providing tax relief, tax incentives, investment opportunities, and fast processing of proposals. However, the Ministry of Investment and Foreign Economic Relations is inviting only responsible businesses to the country," he added.

"The Myanmar Investment Promotion Plan (MIPP) has been drawn up with the assistance of the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) and is in the process of being implemented. As per the MIPP, Myanmar aims to attract FDI of \$200 billion in 20 years," said Union Minister U Thaug Tun of the Ministry of Investment and Foreign Economic Relations.

In the 2018-2019FY, FDI of \$4.5 billion flowed into Myanmar, falling short of the \$5.8-billion target by around \$1.3 billion.— GNLM

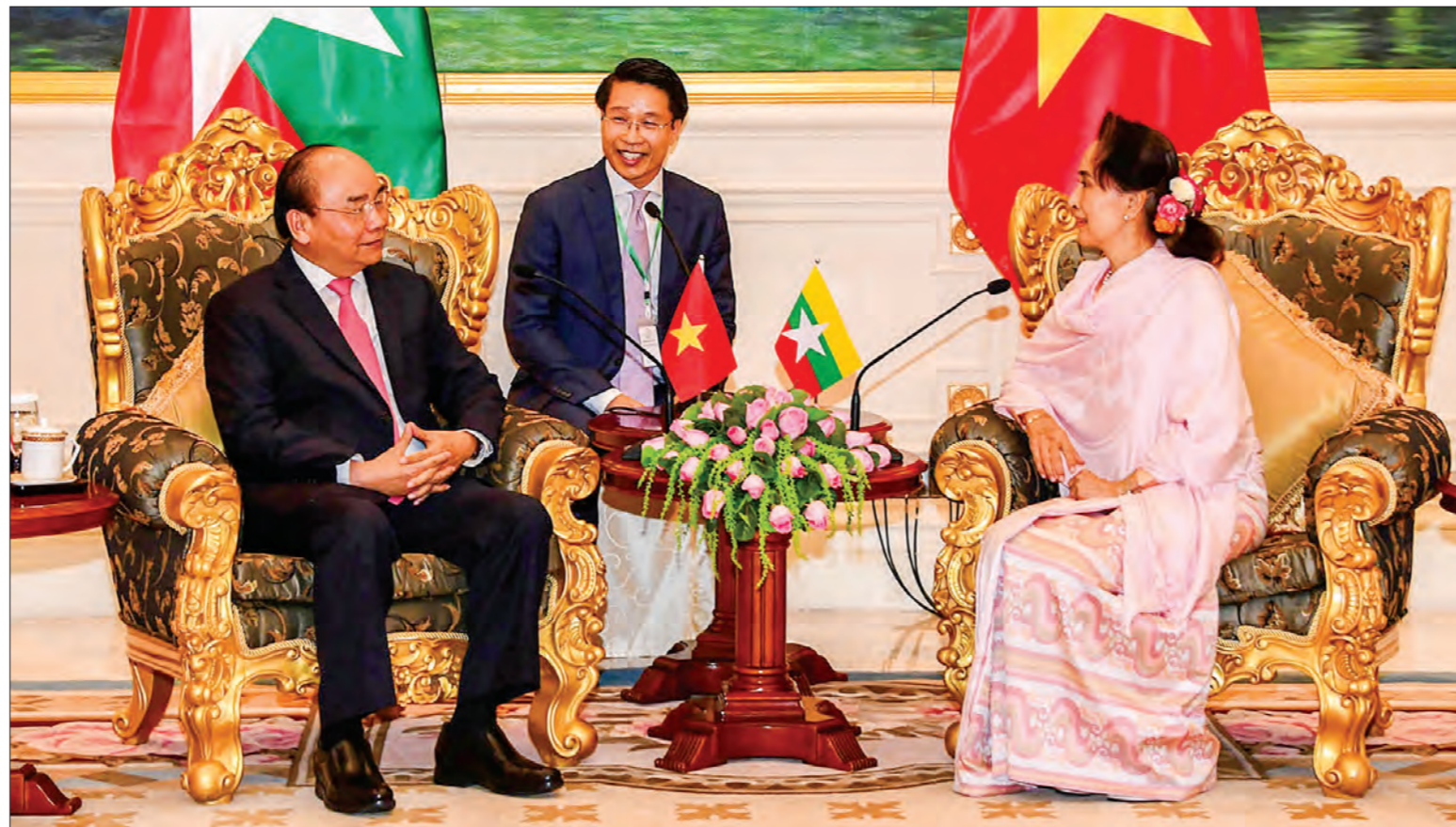
Before Myanmar began its reform a decade ago, Viet Nam - Myanmar bilateral relationship was traditional and cordial. Thanks to the welcomed, and very significant reforms that were introduced by U Thein Sein government - including important economic reforms that have helped reduce poverty by more than 40 per cent -today, Viet Nam and Myanmar are close and trusted partners, bilaterally and multilaterally. Our relations have expanded and deepened in all fields. Our trade today is the biggest it's ever been, and is bound to continue on its upward trajectory. Our exchanges, in culture, in tourism, and in ideas have flourished. Our cooperation within ASEAN, at the UN, and other regional bodies have also taken off, helping us both to achieve the shared goal of prosperity and sustainable development.

Political ties:

Over the past 45 years, our relations have grown in all respects, bringing benefits to both our peoples. Our political relations have expanded and deepened, as evidenced by the growing exchange between our leaders - both bilaterally and at multilateral forums. Within the past 4 years, we have had 4 top-level delegations visiting each other¹, and our Heads of Governments frequently meet at regional and international forums, including ASEAN, the EAS, ARF and the UN. These visits and meetings have laid historic milestones, set new directions and created significant momentum for the further development of relations.

Today, our relations is a "Comprehensive Cooperative Partnership" - known as the CCP framework. This agreement was inked by both sides in August 2017 during the State visit to Myanmar by Vietnamese General Secretary Nguyen Phu Trong. The CCP framework helps to promote and strengthen existing bilateral cooperation mechanisms, realize signed agreements and seek new opportunities for cooperation in line with the principles of the UN and ASEAN Charters, the Treaty of Amity and Cooperation in Southeast Asia and universally recognized norms of international law... It focuses on accelerating the five pillars of cooperation between our two countries: i) Political Relations; (ii) Defense and security cooperation; (iii) Economic cooperation; (iv) Cultural, social, people exchange and other areas of common interest; (v) Cooperation at regional and international forums.

During his official visit to Myanmar in December 2019, Vietnamese Prime Minister Nguyen Xuan Phuc also signed 4 important documents including the Plan of Action for implemen-

tation of the Viet Nam-Myanmar Comprehensive Cooperative Partnership for the 2019-2024 period². These significant documents are instructions for the development of the relationship between the two countries with a long-term vision and increasingly deep and durable cooperation.

As part of the realization of this Plan of Action, exchange of visits at ministerial and vice ministerial levels have stepped up, taking place not only among Ministries, but also between Parliamentary Committees, and social organizations, including such organizations as the Viet Nam Union of Friendship Organizations, the Women's Union, or the Farmers' Association.

Defence and security cooperation have also been enhanced and deepened as a result. Discussions currently are underway to hold defence policy dialogue at the Deputy Minister of Defence and Chief of General staff levels; expansion of cooperation in potential areas such as strengthened cooperation in combatting crimes related to national security at na-

tional and regional levels are also in the pipeline. In addition, both sides have agreed to promote and maintain bilateral cooperation mechanisms such as the Joint Commission for Bilateral Cooperation, the Joint Sub-Committee on Trade, and the Political Consultations at Deputy Foreign Minister level.

In order to fruitfully implement the CCP Plan of Action, culture and religion cooperation could be prioritized which in turn can further foster bilateral relations, upgrade and strengthen the CCP. With that in mind, the Vietnamese embassy in Myanmar will include cultural activities and exchanges in this year's functions such as the 75th National Day of Viet Nam reception in September; commemoration of the 45th Anniversary of Establishment of Diplomatic Relations among others.

Commercial relations:

Our trading relations has also seen much growth. Our trade has grown to 953 millions USD in 2019, from just 860.1 million USD in 2018. Viet Nam is currently the

7th largest investor in Myanmar, with over 2.1 billion USD invested in over 25 projects. There are now over 200 Vietnamese companies doing business in Myanmar, and I hope they will be successful, making responsible, sustainable investment and business decisions here in Myanmar just as they are encouraged to do so in Viet Nam. We look forward to working with Myanmar counterparts to continue to create favourable environment for Vietnamese investors to explore potential cooperation opportunities in Myanmar and strive to reach the target of bilateral trade turnover of 1 billion USD in the near future.

Today, Viet Nam has trading relations with over 200 countries

and territories. It is among several ASEAN members taking part in new, next-generation FTAs, including the CPTPP, the EVFTA, and is also party to the current RCEP negotiations. Thanks to the developmental state mindset of its current administration, the ratification and implementation of these important FTAs have created new drivers for growth, generated further economic reforms, and increase the competitiveness of its economy. The World Economic Forum currently ranks Vietnam's competitiveness at 67/141 countries and territories.

In the post Covid-19 era, the government has also identified 5 key breakthroughs for the economy: promotion of domestic investment, exports, public investment, domestic consumption, and

FDI attraction. In 2019, Viet Nam attracted over 38 billion USD in FDI, and saw export surplus of nearly 10 billion USD.

Socio-cultural exchange:

Our people to people relations has been on the rise as well. We saw the increasing number of Myanmar tourists, students and investors coming to Viet Nam, and roughly 48,000 Vietnamese visitors to Myanmar in 2019³. As Myanmar is undergoing a comprehensive reform, steadily moving towards a modern state that is peaceful, democratic, prosperous and open, Viet Nam firmly supports Myanmar's path of development most appropriate to its national conditions. Viet Nam looks forward to and is ready to assist Myanmar in keeping its development momentum of political stability, economic development and social harmony and that Myanmar can achieve national peace and reconciliation as soon as possible.

The Buddha has taught us: "However many holy words you read, however many you speak, what good will they do you if you do not act on upon

them?" As a dominantly Buddhist country, Viet Nam has showcased this teaching in a substantive and timely manner most recently through its assistance for Myanmar during the initial outbreak of Covid-19. Viet Nam has shown her support and solidarity to the Asean nations amid Covid-19 pandemic by giving her assistance of medical equipment, such as, medical masks, ventilators, test kits, and of finance support to the Association members. ASEAN has a track record, and has proven the critical role that international/regional organizations play in maintaining, peace, security and stability in the region and the world. It is Viet Nam's goal to continue to carry on this tradition, and practice it in reality.

The bilateral relation has been time tested. Viet Nam and Myanmar has got an invaluable friendship and trust. Both countries have common things to advance forward for peace, stability, prosperity and development.

MASSIVE RESCUE PLAN

Europeans continue to heal economic wounds, infections top 2 mln

As markets and industries lick their wounds from the impact of the coronavirus crisis, European governments are turning their focus to reopening and rescuing the battered economy.

France on Tuesday unveiled a major recovery plan to revive the country's auto industry, which has been crippled by the loss of sales and production during the coronavirus pandemic and the lockdown aimed to limit the spread of COVID-19.

Meanwhile, an online dashboard maintained by the WHO European Region showed that 2,044,870 confirmed COVID-19 cases had been reported in 54 countries, with 175,184 deaths as of 10:00 am CET (0800 GMT) on Tuesday.

"HISTORIC PLAN" IN FRANCE

Following a visit to a Valeo car parts factory in northern France, President Emmanuel Macron announced an 8-billion-euro (8.78 billion U.S. dollars) rescue plan to help the recovery of the auto industry.

"The state will provide more than eight billion euros in aid to the sector," Macron said.

The president, who met with industry bosses early in the day, said the "historic plan", which aims to "face a historic situation," was based on a support package and a scrappage scheme to shift towards less polluting vehicles.

"We need to defend our industry and make France Europe's top producer of clean vehicles," with an output of one million electric and hybrid cars per year by 2025,

said Macron.

"Bankruptcies should be avoided at all costs," he said. To help promote clean cars, he also announced a higher state bonus for the purchase of a clean vehicle by individual consumers and businesses, from 6,000 euros to 7,000 euros.

According to figures released by the French Automobile Manufacturers Committee, sales of French vehicle brands plunged by 84.2 per cent in April.

France's massive rescue plan came one day after

Deutsche Lufthansa AG said the German government's Economic Stabilization Fund (WSF) has approved a 9-billion-euro rescue package for the airline.

Lufthansa said the WSF would provide up to 5.7 billion euros in the form of "silent participation" in the company's assets, of which nearly 4.7 billion euros would be classified as equity in accordance with related financial rules.

Lufthansa was operationally healthy and profitable before the pandemic and has good prospects for the future, but it came into an existential emergency due to the coronavirus crisis, the WSF Committee, which consists of representatives of several federal ministries, said in a statement.

EASING BORDER CONTROLS

In a phased approach, European countries are cautiously easing their border controls, as part of their efforts to reopen the tourism industry, which is one of the hardest-hit sectors and accounts for about 10 per cent of the European Union's economic output.

On May 13, the European Commission had offered a tourism and transport package, recommending that EU member states with "similar overall risk profiles" on the pandemic should open to tourists from each other's countries. Two days later (on May 15), Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania became the first EU nations to reopen their shared borders. — SOURCE: Xinhua

Scientists fight online virus misinformation war

PARIS — With cat photos and sometimes scathing irony, Mathieu Rebeaud, a Swiss-based researcher in biochemistry, has nearly tripled his Twitter following since the coronavirus pandemic began.

With 14,000 followers, he posts almost daily, giving explanations on the latest scientific research and, in particular, aims to fight misinformation that spreads as fast as the virus itself.

He is among a growing number of doctors, academics and institutions who in recent weeks have adapted and amplified their scientific messaging in hopes of countering what has been termed an infodemic — a deluge of information, including widespread false claims, which experts say can pose a serious threat to public health.

To cut through the noise however, it is imperative to work quickly and maximize social media engagement to get simple prevention messages across to the public, according to researchers and specialists.

“In the case of the COVID-19 pandemic, conspiracy theories provide complete, simple, seemingly rationalistic and watertight explanations,” Kinga Polynczuk-Alenius, a University of Helsinki researcher, said.

“This is in stark contrast to the available scientific knowledge — complex, fragmented, changeable and contested — and to the actions of political decision-makers and state authorities, which appear haphazard and self-contradictory,” she added.

In February, British medical journal *The Lancet* warned that “the rapid dissemination of trustworthy information” was needed most during a period of uncertainty.

This includes transparent identification of cases, data sharing and unhampered communication, as well as peer-reviewed research, it said.

Rigorous and time-heavy scientific studies and publications, however, compete with the immediacy of social media and a public often demanding firm and

definitive answers.

“How do we communicate in this context of radical uncertainty?” asked Mikael Chambru, a scientific communication specialist at France’s University of Grenoble Alpes.

No choice

Jean-Francois Chambon, a doctor and director of communications at the Pasteur Institute in Paris, said he had no choice but to forcefully deny a widely shared video in March accusing the institution of having “created” the new coronavirus.

“We must go to any lengths” to debunk the lies, he said.

The institute created a web page dedicated to educating the public about the virus, Chambon said.

“We realized that there was a lot of ‘fake news’ on the subject,” he added.

The Pasteur Institute currently has a combined 16,000 new subscribers a month on its social media networks, he said, compared with 4,000 before the

pandemic.

Jean-Gabriel Ganascia, chairman of the ethics committee at France’s National Centre for Scientific Research, agreed that the scientific community must counterattack in such situations.

“We don’t have a choice,” he told AFP.

Earlier this month, the Red Cross launched what it said was the first global network of social

media influencers to battle misinformation and spread lifesaving content about the pandemic.

The World Health Organization, meanwhile, has entered into an agreement with Facebook to transmit information directly to users via personal message services.

But it is often individual doctors and researchers who can have a strong influence online.—AFP

Virus sparks record drop in energy investment: IEA

PARIS — The energy industry is set to suffer a record drop in investment due to the coronavirus fallout, the IEA said on Wednesday, and while renewables are likely to fare better than oil, any swift economic recovery could create a global fuel crunch.

In its annual report on energy investments, the Paris-based International Energy Agency (IEA) estimated the plunge will be of the order of one-fifth from 2019 levels, or almost \$400 billion, as firms slash spending amid slumping demand for energy.

Shale oil producers that catapulted the United States to the world’s top crude nation stand to suffer the worst decline, the IEA said.

“All the energy sectors — oil, gas, renewables — everything is affected but the biggest impact is on shale oil,” the agency’s director Fatih Birol told AFP in an interview.

“Total oil investments we expect to decline one third this year whereas the shale industry will see a decline of about 50 per cent.”

However, spending in renewable power projects is expected to fall by only around 10 per cent for the year, the report said.

“Even though this ‘clean’ spending is set to dip in 2020, its share in total energy investment is set to rise,” it noted. But it noted “these investment levels remain far short of what would be required to put the world on a more sustainable pathway,” estimating that spending on renewable power would need to double by the late 2020s.—AFP

Indian drones pursue locusts as swarms destroy swathes of crops

NEW DELHI — Huge swarms of desert locusts are destroying crops across western and central India, prompting authorities Tuesday to step up their response to the country’s worst plague in nearly three decades.

Drones, tractors and cars have been sent out to track the voracious pests and spray them with pesticides. The locusts have already destroyed nearly 50,000 hectares (125,000 acres) of cropland.

“Eight to 10 swarms, each measuring around a square kilometre are active in parts of Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh,” the government’s Locust Warning Organization’s deputy director K.L. Gurjar told AFP.

The insects caused massive damage to seasonal crops in both states, devastating many farmers already struggling with the impact of a strict coronavirus lockdown.

They destroyed harvests in the agricultural heartlands of neighbouring Pakistan in April, before entering Rajasthan.

Smaller swarms are also active in a handful of states

across India, Gurjar said.

A swarm of 40 million locusts can eat as much food as 35,000 people — or six elephants — according to UN’s Food and Agriculture Organization.

Residential areas in the state capital Jaipur were overwhelmed by the insects as bewildered locals banged on pots and pans to try and ward off the insects.

Experts warn the situation could worsen with more expected to reach India via Pakistan from the Horn of Africa in June.

Heavy rains and cyclones enabled unprecedented breeding and the rapid growth of locust populations on the Arabian peninsula early last year, according to the United Nations.

India has not seen locust swarms on this scale since 1993 when it experienced a widespread plague, the warning centre said.

Locusts destroy crops in some parts of Rajasthan close to the border with Pakistan most years, but it is rare for the insects to move further into the state.—AFP

Montenegro woos tourists to Europe's 'corona-free' corner

KOTOR (Montenegro) — Less than two months after detecting its first infection, Montenegro is the first country in Europe to declare itself coronavirus-free, a success story the tiny country hopes will lure tourists to its dazzling Adriatic coast this summer.

For weeks hotel staff have been raking empty beaches as the pandemic kept away visitors who would normally be arriving by plane, cruise ship and car this time of year.

But finally, there is a sliver of hope after Montenegro announced it no longer has any active cases of COVID-19.

Tourism operators have already seized the opportunity to brand Montenegro as "Europe's First COVID-19 Free Country" in videos promoting its

stunning natural beauty, with beaches snaking along the south and rugged mountains in the north.

In picturesque Kotor, a medieval walled city nestled in a mountain-ringed bay, locals have been

spared the virus entirely, with no known cases reported.

While tour agencies are still expecting a tough season, there is hope this sterling health record will soften the blow on an industry that accounts for

more than a fifth of GDP and 19 per cent of the workforce.

"Safety is something people are looking at the most," said Ana Nives Radovic, director of the local tourism organization in Kotor. —AFP

Renault-Nissan-Mitsubishi deepen their alliance

PARIS — Struggling automakers Renault, Nissan and Mitsubishi unveiled Wednesday a plan to deepen their alliance, a top global producer of cars, that only months ago seemed on the verge of breakup.

The announcement comes as the industry faces an existential crisis from the coronavirus pandemic, which has caused sales to plunge as governments have forced citizens to stay at home to slow the spread

of the virus.

The three companies announced what amounts to a push towards an integrated entity, something that political sensitivities over job losses had previously made difficult.

The carmakers said they will adopt a "leader-follower scheme to enhance efficiency and competitiveness" which involves each of them taking the lead in every region of the world. —AFP

EU unveils unprecedented 750 bn euro recovery plan



European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen has won the backing of Germany and France to raise 500 billion euros on financial markets to deal with the economic impact of COVID-19. PHOTO: AFP

BRUSSELS — European Union chief Ursula von der Leyen on Wednesday proposed a 750-billion-euro post-virus recovery fund for Europe and urged sceptical member states to back it.

The global coronavirus outbreak has already thrust the EU into its deepest ever recession, and Von der Leyen's proposal would help the worst affected countries.

If passed, the proposal would be the biggest EU stimulus package in history

and could see Europe-wide taxes on plastics, carbon emissions and big tech — a major power boost for Brussels. "This is Europe's moment," Von der Leyen told a session of the European Parliament as she announced the plan.

"We either all go it alone; leaving countries, regions and people behind .. or we walk that road together," she said.

"Let us put aside the old prejudices," she urged. The virus has killed

more than 173,000 people in Europe and put its economy in a deep freeze, with businesses only slowly reopening and tight controls on borders still stifling travel and trade.

Officially called "EU Next Generation", the plan comes following pressure from Italy and Spain, Europe's first victims of the outbreak that are too burdened with debts to rebuild their economies alone.

If member states accept the deal as drafted,

Italy would receive 81.8 billion euros in direct aid over the next few years, and 77.3 billion euros would go to Spain.

"Just to put this into context, this means additional EU expenditure in Italy worth roughly 5 per cent of GDP," tweeted Lucas Guttenberg of the Dolors Institute in Berlin.

"We can safely say that the EU graduates to a small-but-serious macro player today," he said.—AFP

French economy making 'cautious' virus lockdown recovery

PARIS — Economic activity in France is making a clear if cautious recovery after lockdown measures were relaxed earlier this month but the country is still heading for a roughly 20 per cent contraction this quarter, the national statistics agency said Wednesday.

INSEE said that the French economy was currently running "at roughly four-fifths of its pre-crisis level" compared to two-thirds during the lockdown period.

France ordered non-essential businesses closed and people to stay at home in mid-March, or nearly at the end of the first quarter, in order to slow the spread of the new coronavirus.

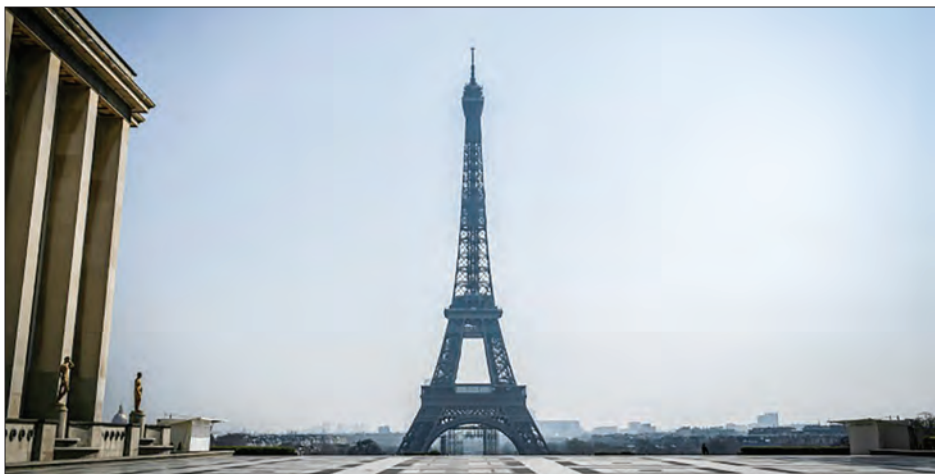
The full impact of the measures which stifled economic activity will only be seen this quarter, which lasts through June, although the restrictions began to be eased on May 11.

INSEE said it expects gross domestic product

(GDP) — the broadest measure of economic activity in a country — to fall "around 20 per cent" this quarter.

That would be "the severest recession since the creation of the national accounts in 1948", said INSEE, which warned that the forecast should be considered with caution given the uncertainty about the pace of economic recovery in the coming weeks.

France's GDP fell by 5.8 per cent in the first quarter.—AFP

Don't let patent rows hamper search for virus vaccine: UN agency

GENEVA — The UN patent agency has hailed the push to create a coronavirus vaccine and make it globally available, but warned against allowing copyright rows to overshadow and delay the process.

"What we need in the first place here is innovation," Francis Gurry, the head of the UN's World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO), told reporters in a virtual briefing.

World Health Organization member states last

week adopted a resolution recognizing that extensive immunization against COVID-19 would be a "global

public good", and pushing for any vaccine to be equitably and fairly distributed to all.—AFP

Japan's Cabinet approves biggest-ever extra budget amid pandemic

TOKYO — Japan's Cabinet approved Wednesday a draft second supplementary budget for fiscal 2020 of 31.91 trillion yen (\$296 billion) to finance measures to mitigate the impact of the novel coronavirus pandemic.

The largest-ever extra budget will help cover a package of projects worth about 117 trillion yen, centring on support for small businesses reeling from the outbreak of the novel coronavirus and front-line medical staff, which will also be funded by loans from government-affiliated financial institutions and the private sector.

The Cabinet's approval came less than a month after the enactment of the 25.69 trillion yen first extra budget for the fiscal year that started in April.

Prime Minister Shinzo Abe told a meeting of government

officials and ruling party lawmakers earlier in the day that Japan's economic package will total more than 230 trillion yen when combined with measures covered by the first supplementary budget.

The Abe administration aims to have the fresh budget clear the Diet by June 12, be-

fore the current parliamentary session ends on June 17, according to the officials.

"Through the measures, the world's biggest in size, corresponding to 40 per cent of (Japan's) gross domestic product, I'll defend the economy against this once-in-a-century crisis," Abe said—Kyodo News

South Korea sees biggest jump in virus cases in seven weeks

SEOUL — South Korea reported its biggest jump in coronavirus infections in seven weeks on Wednesday, driven by a fresh cluster at an e-commerce warehouse on Seoul's outskirts, as millions more pupils went back to school.

The country has been held up as a global model in how to curb the virus and has rushed to contain new infections as life returns to normal.

But officials announced 40 new cases Wednesday -- taking its total to 11,265 -- with most new infections from the densely populated Seoul metropolitan area.

It was the largest increase since 53 infections were announced on April 8.

An outbreak at a warehouse of e-commerce firm Coupang in Bucheon, west of Seoul, has seen 36 cases so far, the KCDC added.

"It is suspected that the basic regulations were not enforced at the warehouse," said vice health minister Kim Gang-lip.

"If quarantine rules are not implemented at workplaces, it could lead to a dreadful result of a mass infection."

But officials said the possibility of parcel recipients being infected was low.

Social distancing rules have been relaxed in South Korea and facilities such as museums and churches have reopened while some professional sports -- including baseball and soccer -- started new seasons earlier this month, albeit behind closed doors.

More than two million students returned to classes on Wednesday, as part of the phased reopening of schools.—AFP

Empty Japan stadiums could soon hear the sound of applause

TOKYO — A new Japanese smartphone app will allow fans to send virtual cheers and jeers to sports stadiums in the hope of creating atmosphere at matches played behind closed doors due to coronavirus.

Instrument maker Yamaha said its remote cheering system will let users tap buttons on the app to deliver cheers — or boos — via dozens of speakers placed inside grounds.

Event organizers can pre-set various types of cheers and jeers, and change the intensity levels depending on the number of users pressing their buttons -- aiming to replicate the roar when

a goal or home run is scored.

Even when a live audience is permitted, fans may still use the app to prevent potentially coronavirus-laden droplets flying through the air through shouting.

They can pick which side of the stadium to send their chosen cheer or jeer, and can remotely join chants that only designated users can begin.

The company originally planned to launch the app in later this year, but accelerated its development after the coronavirus forced sporting events to be cancelled or played without fans.

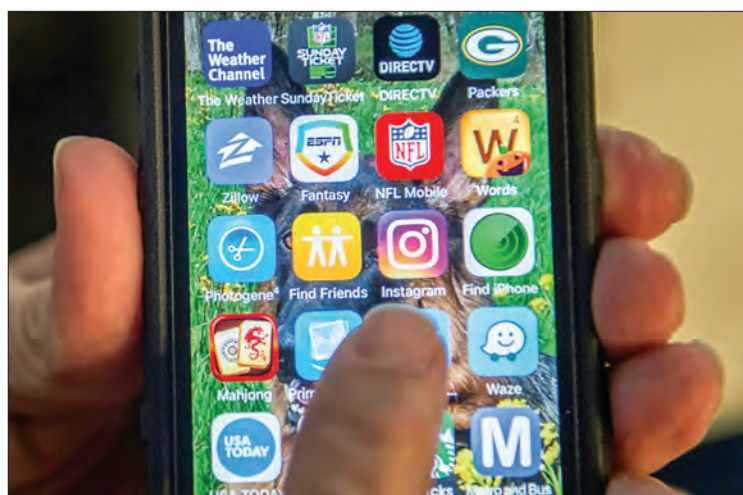
Yamaha said a recent test of

the system at a 51,000-seat stadium produced a sound similar to that of a live crowd.

The firm deployed 58 speakers at the Ecopa Stadium and invited officials from football teams Jubilo Iwata and Shimizu S Pulse to send in remote cheers and boos.—AFP

Hundreds protest in Hong Kong against Chinese anthem law

HONG KONG — Hundreds of people gathered for protests in Hong Kong on Wednesday to oppose legislation that, if passed, would outlaw abuse of China's national anthem.

Protesters were urged online to surround the Legislative Council at the government complex in Admiralty on Hong Kong Island, in a bid to disrupt the third reading of the National Anthem Bill scheduled to be passed next week.

Police fired rounds of pepper balls to disperse the crowd in the busy Central business district as they gathered at lunchtime, while in the shopping area of Causeway Bay, about 100 people were detained as police chased away a crowd.

People also gathered in the Mong Kok district in Kowloon across Victoria Harbor, blocking roads with debris and obstructing traffic.—Kyodo News

Nepal postpones scheduled discussion on constitutional amendment to update map

KATHMANDU — The discussion to amend Nepal's constitution to update the country's map, earlier slated for Wednesday, now has been taken out of schedule. Nepal's House of Representatives was scheduled to hold the discussion in the Parliament for the amendment, which has already been delayed for some time as parties decided to seek a national consensus on the matter.

As per schedule published by Parliament Secretariat regarding the meeting on Wednesday, Law Minister Shivamaya Tumbahamphe will table the proposal at 2 pm (local time).

The government had registered an amendment proposal in Parliament on May 22 after releasing a new political map of Nepal depicting Kalapani, Lipulekh, and Limpiyadhura as its territories on May 18. The map was released in response to New Delhi opening a road to link India via Lipulekh with the Tibet Autonomous Region of China.—ANI

Rouhani urges Iran MPs to cooperate as parliament opens

TEHRAN — President Hassan Rouhani urged Iranian lawmakers to “cooperate” with his government in a speech on Wednesday during the inaugural session of the new parliament following a February election swept by conservatives.

The parliament, a legislative chamber that shapes debate in Iran, had been closed for six weeks until April 7 as part of measures aimed at curbing the spread of the novel coronavirus.

Iran has been hit by the Middle East’s deadliest outbreak of the virus. Its toll stands at more than 7,500 dead and nearly 140,000 infected. “I hope that in the year that remains for this government

we will be able to cooperate and work together,” Rouhani said in the address before the newly formed parliament, or Majles.

Iran held a legislative election on February 21 and is scheduled to hold a presidential poll in around 12 months. The 11th legislature since the Islamic revolution of 1979 opened as the country’s economy gradually returns to normal from the virus outbreak.

In a sign that the fight against the virus is still far from over, however, a seat was left vacant between each deputy.

But many of the elected representatives wore no masks.

Rouhani, who is in the final year of his second and final term,

called on MPs, collectively and individually, to place the “national interest above special interests”, “party interests” or “constituency

interests”.

The moderate president defended the performance of his government, which has faced

criticism from its conservative and ultra-conservative opponents who now form a majority in the parliament.—AFP

French power couple lose money laundering appeal

PARIS — A French political power couple lost their appeal Wednesday against a money laundering conviction, capping a fall from grace spurred by accusations they illegally pocketed millions of euros in public funds while in office.

Patrick and Isabelle Balkany, right-wing politicians who for years governed the chic Paris suburb of Levallois-Perret, were

sentenced to prison terms of five and four years respectively.

But they were not ordered behind bars immediately pending an appeal to France’s highest court. Patrick Balkany had been released to house arrest in February because of health problems.

The two had already lost in March an appeal against tax fraud convictions after they were found guilty of using offshore accounts

to hide at least 13 million euros (\$14.4 million) in assets from the tax authorities, including luxury villas in the Moroccan city of Marrakesh and in the West Indies.

On Wednesday, the appeals court confirmed the seizure of assets as well as the payment of one million euros (\$1.1 million) in damages, saying the couple had implemented a system of “persistent fraud”. Patrick Balkany, 71, who appeared in the Paris courtroom without his wife, made no comment after the decision.

His lawyer Romain Dieudonne said he had five days to decide on a further appeal, while his wife’s lawyer Pierre-Olivier Sur told reporters the ruling was “excessive.”

The jail terms handed down last year — extremely rare for French politicians — were widely heralded as proof that the legal system no longer shirks from holding the powerful to account.—AFP

Officers sacked after black man dies as policeman kneels on neck

MINNEAPOLIS — Four police officers in Minneapolis were sacked Tuesday as a video showing one of them kneeling on the neck of a handcuffed black man who later died sparked street protests in the midwestern US city.

Protesters, many wearing face masks because of the coronavirus outbreak, held signs saying “Justice for George Floyd” and “Black Lives Matter” during a rally near the scene of Monday’s death in custody.

In the video filmed by a bystander, a shirtless Floyd—thought to be in his 40s—is pinned on the ground by a white officer who kneels on his neck for more than five minutes. “Your knee in my neck. I can’t breathe... Mama. Mama,” Floyd pleaded.

Floyd slowly grew silent and motionless, unable to move even as the officers taunted him to “get

up and get in the car.”

He was taken to hospital where he was later declared dead.

After firing the four officers involved, Minneapolis Mayor Jacob Frey expressed outrage as calls rose for them to be prosecuted for murder.

“What I saw was wrong at every level,” he said of the video.

“For five minutes, we watched as a white officer pressed his knee into the neck of a black man,” Frey added.

“Being black in America should not be a death sentence.”

Civil rights attorney Ben Crump said he had been retained by Floyd’s family.

In a statement, Crump said Floyd had been stopped by police over a forgery accusation, a charge often used for writing bad checks or using fake banknotes for purchases.—AFP

Africa’s confirmed COVID-19 cases surpass 115,000: Africa CDC

ADDIS ABABA — The number of confirmed COVID-19 cases across the African continent surpassed 115,616 as the death toll from the ongoing pandemic surged to 3,479 as of Tuesday afternoon, the Africa Centre for Disease Control and Prevention (Africa CDC) said.

The Africa CDC, in its latest continental situation update report issued on Tuesday, said that

some 46,630 people who have been infected with the COVID-19 have recovered across the continent as of Tuesday afternoon.

Figures from the Africa CDC also showed that amid the rapid spread of the virus across the continent, the highly COVID-19 affected African countries include South Africa with 23,615 confirmed cases, Egypt with

17,967 confirmed cases, Algeria with 8,503 confirmed cases, Nigeria with 8,063 confirmed cases, and Morocco with 7,556 confirmed cases.

The Africa CDC said that the Northern African region is the most affected area across the continent both in terms of positive COVID-19 cases, as well as the number of deaths.—Xinhua

Sport halls changed as quarantine sites to combat pandemic

TO combat, control and treatment of COVID-19 pandemic, sport halls and sport centres across Myanmar are being used as quarantined facilities this month, according to the Sports and Physical Educa-

There are a total of seventeen quarantined centres to be used as quarantined sites for suspected patients of COVID-19 from different

regions and states.

The sport halls quarantined centres were launched across Myanmar starting from 28 March and there were a total of 1,566 quarantined persons arrived and

1,379 were successfully discharged from the sites and 187 left according to the this week's data released by the department.

A total of 17 Sport centres from Kayah State, Chin State,

Mandalay Region, Rakhine State, Bago Region, Magway Region, Kayin State, Shan State, Mon State and Yangon Region helped COVID-19 suspected persons to control the pandemic.—Lynn Thit (Tgi)

Lifting Premier League trophy in empty stadium would be 'strange', says Henderson

LONDON — Liverpool captain Jordan Henderson says playing at an empty Anfield and winning the Premier League title with no fans present would be "pretty strange".

Liverpool were 25 points clear of 2019 champions Manchester City and on the verge of their first English top-flight crown for 30 years when the league was shut down by coronavirus in March.

Clubs returned to training in small and socially distanced groups last week ahead of a proposed restart in June.

Henderson lifted the Champions League trophy in a packed

stadium in Madrid last June but is preparing for a different experience this year.

"Of course it would feel different because if you win any trophy and receive it without any fans there, it would be pretty strange," he told the BBC.

The 29-year-old England international midfielder said the title race was still not over.

"We still have work to do and we still need to perform at a high level right the way until the season finishes because we want to finish as strongly as we can to make sure it is a full season," he said.—AFP

Serie A meeting Italian Government to discover fate of season

ROME — Serie A hopes of following Germany and Spain back onto the pitch will be decided on Thursday during a meeting with the Italian government which will determine the fate of the season in football-mad Italy.

Sports Minister Vincenzo Spadafora will tell Italian football federation and Lega Serie A bosses if the health conditions are right to return after nearly three months.

The Italian season has

been on hold since March 9 amid the coronavirus pandemic which has killed almost 33,000 people in the country.

Football clubs returned to group training on May 19 but competitive action remains suspended until mid-June.

Indications are that Spadafora and the government's Scientific Technical Committee will agree to both the health protocol proposed and to start the season again.

In the case of a favourable decision on Thursday, Lega Serie A have scheduled a meeting for Friday morning to examine "the different calendar hypotheses" for the remaining Serie A and Italian Cup matches.

Lega Serie A bosses want competition to resume on the weekend of June 13-14, starting with four postponed fixtures — Atalanta-Sassuolo, Verona-Cagliari, Inter Milan-Sampdoria and Torino-Parma.—AFP

Solskjaer counting on Pogba, Rashford for restart

LONDON — Manchester United manager Ole Gunnar Solskjaer said Tuesday he is confident of having Paul Pogba and Marcus Rashford fit should the Premier League season restart next month.

Pogba has missed the majority of the campaign with an ongoing ankle injury, while Rash-

ford seemed set to miss the rest of the season when he suffered a double stress fracture in his back in January.

United returned to training in small groups last week and preparations are expected to be ramped up further for a return to action when Premier League clubs vote on resuming contact

training on Wednesday.

"Hopefully now we've proved we can do this safely and we can move to the next step. It's been really enjoyable being on the training ground again," said Solskjaer.

"They (Pogba and Rashford) are looking good, they've joined training now and they've done

everything the other boys have been doing. No reaction so far, touch wood.

"When we get started, it looks like we can have a full squad to choose from."

The return of both players could be a major boost to United's hopes of ending the season on a high in three competitions.

Solskjaer's men were three points off the top four in the Premier League when play was halted due to the coronavirus pandemic in March.

The Red Devils are also still in the hunt for silverware in the FA Cup and Europa League, which UEFA hopes to complete in August.—AFP
