Gov't takes steps to ease regulations in bid to attract foreign investment

UTHAUNG TUN, the Union Minister for Investment and Foreign Economic Relations and the Chairman of the Myanmar Investment Commission, attended the second day of the Invest Myanmar Summit 2019 in Nay Pyi Taw, and re-affirmed plans to establish standard operating procedures (SOPs) and a Land Bank to ease investment procedures.

The setting up of the Ministry of Investment and Foreign Economic Relations, which was formed recently to attract foreign investment, is among the significant changes being made in Myanmar, said the Union Minister.

The ministry's MyCo System is offering online registration to companies, he added.

He also stressed the important role played by the youth in the Fourth Industrial Revolution, appreciating the aptitude displayed by Myanmar youths who achieved success in the Robot Olympics.

"Myanmar's enviable geographical location makes the country a strategic place as it is sitting between China and India, and both countries are developing at the highest pace. Understanding the importance of the Belt and Road Initiative, Myanmar is making the necessary investments to improve its infrastructure," said U Thaug Tun.

MPs to discuss committee proposal for constitutional amendments

THE third day of the 11th Regular session of Pyidaungsu Hluttaw was held yesterday at 10 am in the Main Hall of the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw.

An urgent proposal to form a joint Committee consisting of Hluttaw members in order to expeditiously implement the steps to be taken towards amending the 2008 Constitution

Pyidaungsu Hluttaw representative U Aung Kyi Nyunt from Magway Region constituency 4 submitted an urgent proposal to form a joint Committee consisting of Hluttaw members in order to expeditiously implement the steps to be taken towards amending the 2008 Constitution.

U Aung Kyi Nyunt stated that amending provisions of the 2008 Constitution is an important task for the people of Myanmar in the current situation. This task needs to be noted by and decided by the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw. He stated that when a review is made of the 2008 Constitution it is found that there are provisions in the Constitution which are not in conformity with democratic norms, inconsistent provisions within the Constitution, provisions that would impede the implementation of a genuine democratic Federal Union which is a sine qua non to establish internal peace.

In addition, U Aung Kyi

Nyunt stated that there are also provisions in the Constitution which impede the establishment of a multiparty democracy, that unbalances the checks and balances required in the three pillars of democratic governance as well as provisions that do not provide for the equal protection of the laws of its citizens and also provisions which impair the holding of free and fair elections.

The best way to protect the Constitution is to draft a Constitution where the aspirations of the citizens and the indigenous people are implemented in the future State. In order to smoothly work towards such an outcome the main duty falls on the Legislative branch which is the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw, U Aung Kyi Nyunt stated.

He continued to say that this is a time where under the auspices of the 21st century Panglong Conference to establish perpetual peace and national reconciliation it has already been agreed that the Union must be based on Democracy and Federalism. In order to smoothly implement such tasks and to achieve mutual confidence it is necessary to amend the Constitution.

U Aung Kyi Nyunt stated that he is making this solemn proposal in conformity with the wishes of the entire people of Myanmar and in order to review the 2008 Constitution a joint Committee should be urgently formed with suitable representatives of the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw. That Committee could consider issues in

order to expeditiously implement the tasks of amending the Constitution. U Aung Kyi Nyunt explained that what he is proposing now does not involve or deal with Articles 433, 434, 435 in Chapter XII of the Constitution. He stated that he was not proposing a draft bill to amend the Constitution but only proposing a mechanism to systematically implement his proposal in conformity with Rule 66.

Afterwards, the representative of the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw from Thaketa constituency Dr Wei Phyo Aung spoke in support of the proposal. He stated that it has been over ten years since the 2008 Constitution was practised. Since more than a decade has passed since its implementation necessary changes should be made in order to keep up with the times. The people's representatives are conferred this duty under the democratic system and they should take into consideration the true wishes of the people and they would have the opportunity to do so in this era where it is now 'time for change'

and discussions and review of the Constitution should be made in the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw. He therefore supports the motion and urge the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw to discuss the proposal.

Representative from the Tatmadaw Brig-Gen Maung Maung stated that he was not asserting that the Constitution should not be changed. He agreed that it needs to be changed. Because of this agreement he was proposing that amendments should be made in conformity with the procedures. All of the representatives in the Hluttaw are here in accordance with the provisions of the 2008 Constitution. Procedural rule 135 states that a draft bill be first proposed that a joint committee of the Pyithu Hluttaw and Amyotha Hluttaw have to review the draft Bill. If a Committee were to be formed it would not be known which Articles or provisions of the Constitution would be reviewed, what would the Committee do and how expansively would the Committee consider such issues. Those in the Legislature should conduct their actions in accordance with the laws and procedures and Brigadier Maung Maung stated that this issue is not a task to be decided by votes.

After the Speaker of the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw stated that the statement of Brig-Gen Maung Maung is not accepted all the Tatmadaw personnel in the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw stood up in protest.

The Secretary of the Joint Bill Committee Dr Myat Nyanna Soe stated that at this moment it is not the case that a Bill to amend the Constitution is being submitted. Since a multiparty system is being practiced if a representative, or a group of political parties were to submit such a proposal it could have deviated from the wishes of the majority of the people, citizens and the indigenous people. This proposal could be discussed by all political parties (representatives) in the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw including the Tatmadaw personnel. Hence it is in conformity with the laws, by laws and rules of the Hluttaw and therefore he solemnly requested the Speaker to put into effect that this proposal be decided by the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw. The Speaker of the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw asked the views of the Hluttaw Members as to whether the proposal should be considered through the electronic voting system. There were 394 votes for, 17 against and 3 abstentions. As more than 1/3 of the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw members supported the proposal the Speaker announced that the Hluttaw has agreed to discuss the proposal.

The Speaker also stated that those Hluttaw representatives who wish to discuss the proposal can put forward their names.

It is learnt that the fourth day of the 11th regular session of the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw will be held on 1 February 2019. ■



When it comes to making and receiving investments, a win-win situation is important for both sides, and all need to work together to achieve it, he said.

OPENING ceremony of Mekong-Lancang Cultural Exchange Youth Camp jointly hosted by Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture and National University of Arts and Culture (Mandalay) was held at Mandalay Hotel Shwepyitha yesterday morning.

The event kicks off with playing of the Lancang-Mekong theme song. In his opening remark Union Minister Thura U Aung Ko said Cambodia, Laos, Myanmar, Viet Nam, Thailand and China were depending on and living together in the Mekong-Lancang basin since years past and member countries were still facing challenges in constructing basic infrastructures, raising industrial works and sustainable development works in economy and social.

As cooperation mechanism among the six member countries need to be raised as soon as possible, meeting of artistes from the six countries was being held. Furthermore, at this age, it is important to strengthen and

As such this project is being initiated with an aim to establish a Mekong-Lancang cultural exchange region through cooperation of cultural groups and youth artistes from six member countries of Mekong-Lancang region. When Mekong-Lancang region countries conduct projects with Mekong-Lancang special fund, drawing up of the projects and requesting of funds are done according to three pillars and

five cooperation sectors of Sanya Declaration.

The three pillars are public policy and security; economic and sustainable development; and social, cultural, and people-to-people exchanges and the five cooperation sectors are connectivity; expand production capacity; cross border economic cooperation; cooperation in sustainable water resources management and utilization; and cooperation in agriculture and poverty reduction.

Assessing in a broader aspect on the ethnic nationalities in shaping into a nation, we are related to each other that could be seen in the chronicle of the Union.

Geographical situation

In the recorded history of the world, the people moved to new places where the grass is greener and have comfortable landscape. Naturally, people loved good soil and fresh water with fine weather where abundant harvests prevail, and called it home.

Large population moved to such places and settled down, and that Myanmar is one of the lands that people rushed in for settlements. Since the ancient times, the population to become Myanmar people had moved to that place, and the landscape of the whole areas is stable and secure for habitation in terms of geographical situation until today.

To be noted

At the southern end of the harbor lies the beautiful cape, named for King Bayint Naung, a Burmese monarch, and that Khakaborazi Snowcapped Mountain is believed to be Myanmar's highest mountain in the north, and with its height of 5,881. The peak is enclosed within Khakaborazi National Park.

Maungdaw is a town in Rakhine State, in the western part of Myanmar, and that Kyaing Tong is far from the rest of Myanmar in the heart of the Golden Triangle in the far east of Shan State. Kyaing Tong is set in the far east of the country.

Location

Myanmar is situated in Southeast Asia and located between latitudes 09 32'N and 28 31'N and longitudes 92 10'E and 101 11'E.

Kyaing Tong is situated near Mekong River, and that Tropic of Cancer runs near Ma Bane, Kut Khaing, Ta Gaung and Tiddim. The East Longitude 96 degree is the most remarkable line, where



the time of noon in Myanmar is being slotted on.

Geography

The country covers an area of 677,000 square kilometers (261,228 square miles) ranging 936 kilometers (581 miles) from the east to west and 2051 kilometers (1275 miles) from north to south.

It is a land of hills and valleys and is rimmed in the north, east and west by mountain ranges forming a giant horseshoe. Enclosed within the mountain barriers are the flat lands of Ayeyawaddy, Chindwin and Sittaung River valleys where most of the country's agricultural land and population are concentrated.

The Myanmar Standard Time, taken as on East Longitude 97 degree 30', is 6 hours 30 minutes ahead of Greenwich meantime.

Country with spacious land

Myanmar is the second largest country in South East Asia with (167) million acres of land, larger than Japan and double the size of Britain. The country accommodated her people with comfortable land spaces for many years.

Myanmar has a long coastal line of (1,385) miles from Naff River to King Bayunt Naung Cape in the south. The country is bordered by China to the north and northeast,

Laos to the east, Thailand to the southeast, the Andaman Sea and Bay of Bengal to the south and southwest, Bangladesh to the west, and India to the northwest.

It has international boundary of (3800) miles.

Adorable Structure

Myanmar consists of 14 states and regions; or 7 states representing the areas of 7 main ethnic nationalities and 7 regions. All 7 states 1, whilst the regions are mainly plain areas with the exception of Sagaing, Bago and Taninthayi Regions.

States and Regions are structured as follows.

Ayeyawaddy Region; Bago Region; Chin State; Kachin State; Kayah State; Kayin State; Magway Region; Mandalay Region; Mon State; Rakhine State; Shan State; Sagaing Region; Taninthayi Region; Yangon Region; Nay Pyi Taw Area.

Looking at states in clockwise, we can see Rakhine State; Chin State; Kachin State; Shan State; Kayah State; Kayin State, and Mon State in a horseshoe shape. Up and inside, we can find Sagaing Region; Mandalay Region; Magway Region. We can see Bago Region; Yangon Region; Ayeyawaddy Region, down and inside, and Taninthayi Region in the lower part of the country. On the world map, it is like a human form of the head, the body, the waist line, and the limbs.

Good Feature

Geographical structure and physical condition of Myanmar is very much resembled like a human being, and moreover; the

heart and soul of the nation has all the natural functioning capacities of the anatomy of an individual.

Being defended by mountains as well as high lands, they are like the natural warriors of the country with the Bago Yoma Mountain standing tall in the middle.

The famous and mighty Ayeyawaddy River is flowing as the life blood of the nation with the sister rivers namely Chindwin

We have different types of landscape such as that of dry-zone, plain, wetland area, mountain, mountain range, cliff, coast, littoral zone, shrub-land, forest, rainforest, woodland walks, jungle, moors and rough lands.

The Shan Hills, also known as Shan Highland, elevated (3,000) to (5,000) feet, is a vast mountainous zone that extends through Yunnan to Myanmar and Thailand. The whole region is made up of numerous mountain ranges separated mostly by narrow valleys as well as a few broader intermountain basins.

Inle Lake is in the Shan Hills of Myanmar. At its southwestern edge, Phaung Daw Oo Pagoda with gilded Buddha statues. In the hills, near the market town of Insein, the Shwe Inn Dein Pagoda resembles a field of gold spires.

Myanmar Leg-Rowers are seen at Inle Lake. With an acrobat's alertness, an Intha fisherman stands upright with one leg locked around a beautiful long oar and the other foot firmly gripping the flat bed of his boat as he rows along the lake.

There are many mountains in Myanmar coming down from Himalayan Mountains standing tall as defence columns with the

sources. Forests cover about 40% of the total land area. They are traditionally classified into two categories such as reserved forests and unclassified (or public) forests. Forest exploitation is controlled by law, but the government allows rural communities to use various forest products.

The sea in the southern part of Myanmar has abundant resources and creates fine weather to the country.

With regard to Myanmar gemstones, the first thing that springs to mind is high quality rubies and sapphires from Mogok in the Mandalay Region.

The jade trade in Myanmar consists of the mining, distribution, and manufacture of the variety of jade, called jadeite, which is produced in the nation.

As Myanmar still have plenty of vast lands in the country, it could provide its people with space of comfort without the worrisome of food, clothing and shelter.

By fully utilizing the natural resources with modern technology, the nation is poised for development.

Stability

The boundary demarcations of Myanmar and the geographical condition of the country indicate the fine and secured sovereign status, as a nation requires solid and firm grounds of her territorial integrity. The adorable geographical condition must remain intact for the sovereignty and independence of a nation.

One heart one soul

Sovereignty is the power of a state to do everything necessary to govern itself, such as making, executing, and applying laws; imposing and collecting taxes; making war and peace; and forming treaties or engaging in commerce with foreign nations.

Therefore, the notion of 'one heart, one soul, one nation forever; one aim, one goal, one determination for all' must be deeply ingrained in the minds of all the citizens of the country. Let us united and save the beauty of our nation and land from vulnerability so that we stayed on in the land of awesome wonder in the spirit of Union.

In order to prevent and eradicate the dangers of narcotic drugs and psychotropic drugs, the Office of the President has formed the **Drug Activity Special Complaint Department** on 26 June 2018 to systematically accept and respond to reports on drug abuses and other related cases from the general public.

4. In addition to the investigations and arrests conducted on drug related complaints mentioned above, the Tatmadaw and Myanmar Police Force have also carried out separate investigations on drug complaints, search and arrests at border gates, and searches of vehicles acting upon given information.

During the previous week, multiple arrests were made in the border regions and joint-surveillance gates.

In Myothit Ward, Myitkyina Tsp, Kachin State, one man was arrested with 41963 stimulant tablets, 1796 g of heroin and a car. FDA conducting surprise checks every month on drinking water plants in four townships

THE Department of Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has been carrying out surprise inspections at drinking water plants in four townships of Yangon Region every month, said Dr. Min Wun, the head of FDA (Yangon).

"The plan is expected to cover the whole region, so, the FDA is inspecting factories in four townships in the four districts of Yangon Region. We are checking three or four factories in each township. The inspection is not concerned with any complaint. We are just making surprise checks on factories," he said.

During the inspections, officials with the FDA have been checking whether factories are producing drinking water in line with good manufacturing practices (GMP). Factories which are

failing to follow GMP are being disqualified and production is being temporarily halted. The factories are being permitted to resume business once they pass an assessment and are found complying with the standard guidelines.

"We inspected around 16 factories this month. We have not made the monthly report yet. Some factories have been terminated. Some businesses changed their production process, bringing it in line with purification procedures and GMP guidelines, and then, they were permitted to restore production," said Dr. Min Wun.

Additionally, acting on complaints from the public, the FDA inspected two drinking water factories namely Kaung Kaung and Shwe Myanmar brands. The officials found the some factories

were running without production certificates and were not complying with GMP guidelines.

"The unlawful factories were directed not to distribute their water. If they are found to violate rules and regulations, action will be taken against them under the existing laws," according to Yangon Region FDA.

At present, the Yangon FDA has increased the frequency of inspections to clamp down on unregistered factories. Consumers are also being encourage to buy only FDA-certified drinking water and lodge complaints against it if they find any unlicensed businesses. "We can easily detect legal and illegal distributors. For example, if a water bottle is tagged with the FDA certificate number on the label, it has been approved by the FDA. Illegal distributors do not mention their

business address on the label, while some labels include only a phone number and a brand name. Consumer must check how clean the water bottle is, and avoid using water bottles without proper labels. The public must file a complaint if they find unlicensed manufacturers running their business in the market," said Dr. Min Wun.

The FDA Yangon inspected 16 drinking water factories in December and found two were running their businesses without a licence. Of the remaining factories, 11 were disqualified for not following GMP guidelines and were temporarily shut down, while three cleared the inspection, according to data from FDA Yangon.

There are about 400 drinking water enterprises approved by the FDA in Yangon.

Bat cave conservation area is home to 1.1 mln bats, 99 bird species: research

AN estimated 1.1 million bats and 99 species of birds have been registered in the bat cave conservation area in Kanbalu Township of Sagaing Region, according to a research paper.

The Forest Department teamed up with the Wildlife Conservation Society (Myanmar Program) to carry out research on the population size of bats dwelling in the bat cave conservation area.

The count was conducted between 16 and 19 January.

The research found the bat cave conservation area is home to an estimated 1.1 million bats. Additionally, 99

species of birds, including rare and endangered species, have also been recorded in the area. Bats generally eat insects,

while some can eat flowers and fruits.

They play a significant role in controlling insect pop-

ulations and contribute to the ecosystem. —Nyi Tu

Over 360 people killed in road accidents in Magway in one year

A TOTAL OF 367 deaths were reported in road accidents in Magway Region in 2018, according to the region's traffic and road safety council.

According to the council's report, 386 people were killed and 2,844 injured in 1,602 road mishaps in 2017, while 367 peo-

ple died and 2,799 were injured in 1,610 accident cases reported in Magway Region in 2018.

"When we analyse the accident records, we found that in most cases people were driving vehicles after consuming alcohol and flouting traffic rules. In some cases, we found

people were not using helmets while driving their motorbikes. To reduce the number of road accidents, the traffic police are conducting awareness talks regularly and distributing pamphlets to the public," said U Tin Nwe Oo, the Minister of Construction and Transporta-

tion in Magway Region. The traffic police have filed charges against suspected reckless drivers at any time under sections 279, 337, 338 and 304 (A) of the Penal Code.—Zeyatu (Magway)

Domestic gold price hits record high tracking positive global trend

WITH the price of the yellow metal strengthening in the global markets, domestic gold prices too have registered an increase to touch a record high of K1,059,000 per tical (0.578 ounce) on 28 January, said U Ohn Myaing, the general secretary of Myanmar Gold Entrepreneurs Association.

“As a consequence of the rising global gold price, the price of domestic gold has also increased. But we are lucky that the US dollar rate has remained cool in the local market, although the global gold price is on

the rise. Otherwise, the price of domestic gold could have crossed K1,060,000 per tical,” said U Ohn Myaing.

The price of domestic gold has been gradually increasing in the local market since mid-December on the back of the positive trend in global gold prices.

The domestic gold price reached a record high of K1,050,000 per tical on 4 January, and touched another record of K1,059,000 per tical on 28 January, according to gold traders. “Now, the global gold price is skyrocketing. Currently, the gold price is set at over US\$1,300 per ounce in the global market. The rise in



domestic gold price is due to the increase in the global gold price. An increase of one dollar in the global gold price translates to an average increase of K180-200

in domestic prices,” said U Myo Myint, the Chairman of the Yangon Region Gold Entrepreneurs Association.

Moreover, there is a high demand for gold in

the local market, he added. The price of domestic gold reached K1,040,000 per tical on 31 October from a low of K969,000 per tical on 1 October.

The price of local gold declined to K1,027,100 per tical on 30 November from K1,044,500 per tical on 2 November. The price of gold increased to K1,043,000 per tical on 29 December from Ks987,000 per tical on 4 December, according to a gold dealer.

Starting from 21 July, 2017, domestic gold price has remained above K900,000 per tical. With the rise in the global gold price, the domestic price also peaked at K1,047,700 million on 20 September, 2017, after touching a high of K989,000 in August the same year.

Muse rice depot to close during Chinese New Year

THE Muse rice depot will be closed for 12 days when merchants stop purchasing rice from Myanmar during the Chinese New Year.

“The Muse rice depot will be temporarily closed from 1 to 12 February. The export of rice will completely stop because there are no Chinese traders to purchase rice from Myanmar. They have already returned to their native regions. The only thing we can do is store the bags of rice at warehouses,” said U Min Thein, vice chairman of the Muse rice depots association.

“Myanmar mainly exports some agricultural products to China via the Muse border trade camp along the Myanmar-China border. During the Chinese New Year, exports of rice, sugar and corn, which are mainly exported to China, will be completely stopped”, he added.

Although there will be regular sales of rice in the market, the price of rice is likely to decline because of the three year imposition of taxes on exported rice by the European Union, said U Than Oo, secretary of the Bayintnaung commodity depot.

“There will be no sale in the market during the New Year holidays. On the other hand, the price of rice has been declining since Myanmar was faced with economic sanctions imposed by the EU. Therefore, the merchants are only storing rice by purchasing it at a lower price,” said U Than Oo.

The volume of rice exports has declined since October 2018 because of the intensified crackdown on Myanmar’s exported rice in China, according to the Myanmar Rice Federation.

From April to December 2018, Myanmar exported over 1.7 million tons of rice to China, a decrease of over 800,000 tons of rice compared to the same period last year, according to the official statistics released by the Myanmar Rice Federation.

Last year, Myanmar exported over 3.6 million tons of rice, nearly half of which were exported to China through the border gate.

LOS ANGELES (United States) — M Night Shyamalan’s latest thriller “Glass” bested the competition at the North American box office for a second straight weekend, taking in \$18.9 million, industry figures showed on Monday.

The film unites the narratives of the director’s “Un-

breakable” (2000) and “Split” (2016), and stars Bruce Willis, Samuel L Jackson and James McAvoy.

The second and third spots at the box office remained unchanged from last weekend.

Buddy drama “The Upside” — starring Bryan Cranston as a wealthy quadriplegic

who hires ex-convict Kevin Hart as his caretaker — earned \$11.9 million.

Superhero flick “Aquaman,” starring Jason Momoa as the underwater king, hauled in another \$7.3 million.

It has now generated \$1.09 billion in global box office revenues, making it the largest DC

Comics adaptation of all time, according to industry tracker Exhibitor Relations.

A new release from Fox, “The Kid Who Would Be King,” placed fourth with \$7.2 million for the three-day weekend.

That would be a “potentially disastrous result for a film that cost over \$60 million” to make, according to Variety.

The movie stars Louis Ashbourne Serkis (son of Andy Serkis, Gollum in the “Lord of the Rings” trilogy) as a boy living in modern times who stumbles upon King Arthur’s legendary sword Excalibur. It has drawn largely positive reviews.

In fifth spot — and hanging strong in its seventh week out — was Sony’s “Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse,” with takings of \$6.1 million. The film is the favourite to win an Oscar for best animated feature next month.

“Green Book” (\$5.5 million)

Chris Brown’s accuser files complaint after police photo leaked

PARIS (France) — A woman who accused US singer Chris Brown of rape has filed a new complaint in France after her police photo was leaked on the internet, a judicial source said on Monday.

The 25-year-old woman, identified in media reports as “Karima”, alleges that the image, taken by police as she filed the complaint, was posted on social media.

An investigation for violation of judicial secrets, violation of a professional secret and distribution of images or information on the identity of a victim of sexual aggression, has been launched by the Paris prosecutor’s office, the source said.

The woman’s lawyer, Jean-Marc Descoubes, said the photograph in question was taken by police to be used only in connection with the investigation.

“We have reasons to believe that someone took a photo of the photo of my client during a detention or a hearing and it is circulating on social media,” Descoubes told AFP.—AFP ■

Russian scientists test world's first aluminum engine

NOVOSIBIRSK — Scientists of Novosibirsk State Technical University have tested the world's first internal-combustion engine fully made of aluminum. The test results will enable scientists to design a smaller engine, Professor of the Aircraft-and Helicopter-Making Chair at the University's Aircraft Faculty Ilya Zverkov told TASS on Monday.

As was reported earlier, the University's scientists designed the world's first engine fully made of aluminum and weighing about 200 kg. The engine that uses standard automobile gasoline was expected to be mounted on Yak-52 two-seat planes whose old engines have used up their potential.

"During the trials, flaws were detected in the engine's design and, considering these faults, we will design a new engine smaller by its dimensions. We do not give up the basic ideas and the task is to obtain the stated characteristics by the [engine's] capacity and firmness," Zverkov said, adding that the improved engine would

be designed and tested in the summer of this year.

The use of aluminum instead of steel has enabled scientists to cut the engine's weight by 30-40% compared to the standard steel engines of the comparable capacity. At the same time, the new engine's rated capacity has risen by 40 horsepower to 400 hp while fuel consumption has dropped by about 15%

The engine's development is being financed using the Domestic Aviation Revival Fund. Novosibirsk State Technical University is also receiving scientific and technological assistance from the Institute of Theoretical and Applied Mechanics at the Siberian branch of the Russian Academy of Sciences.

iPhone FaceTime bug lets callers eavesdrop

SAN FRANCISCO (United States) — A newly discovered FaceTime bug lets people hear and even see those they are reaching out to on iPhones using the video calling software, sparking privacy fears.

The bug, initially outlined by Apple product and review website 9to5Mac.com, was reported by several media outlets.

A video posted at Twitter account @BmManski showing how simple it is to take advantage of the flaw and listen in on an iPhone being called using FaceTime logged nearly two million views

and was shared 14,000 times by late evening in California.

Some Twitter users offered advice to disable the FaceTime application until a fix was in place.

An Apple support page listed Group FaceTime calling as "temporarily unavailable" as of 7:16 PM here (03:16 GMT) due to an ongoing "issue" that was not specified.

An Apple statement quoted in US media said the iPhone maker was aware of this issue and has "identified a fix that will be released in a software update later this week."

When a phone number is dialed on FaceTime — the iPhone's internet-based voice and video calling feature — the caller can swipe up from the bottom of the screen and tap an option to add a person, according to video demonstrations.

If a caller enters their number as also being the added caller, a group call begins even though the person being called has not answered yet.

The caller can then eavesdrop on the person being called, and in some demonstrations peek through the front-facing camera. Declining a call breaks the connection. "Disable FaceTime for now until Apple fixes," Twitter co-founder and chief executive Jack Dorsey advised in a tweet.

Dorsey's message included a forwarded post by technologist Andy Baio. "Want to see a really bad bug?" Baio asked in his post.

"You can FaceTime any iOS device running 12.1 and listen in remotely—WITHOUT THE OTHER PERSON ANSWERING THE CALL."

Apple did not immediately respond to requests for comment.

FaceTime software enables voice or video calls using iPhones, iPads, iPod Touch, and Macintosh computers.—AFP ■

Scientists find why feathered dinosaurs in China cannot fly like birds

WASHINGTON — Chinese and American scientists found that Anchiornis, one of the earliest feathered dinosaurs, cannot fly like modern birds due to lacking of a kind of protein in its feathers.

The study published on Monday in the journal *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences* showed that a protein called beta-keratin gave modern birds special bio-mechanical properties to fly, such as flexibility, elasticity and strength, but the Anchiornis lacked those properties.

Pan Yanhong from Nanjing Institute of Geology and Palaeontology of the Chinese Academy of Sciences and American researchers examined fossilized feathers using high-resolution microscopy and determine the molecular composition of those feathers.

They found that Anchiornis feathers were made mainly of thicker alpha-keratins rather than thinner beta-keratins, although they contain some of the molecular structures of

beta ones.

The modern bird feathers are composed primarily of flexible beta-keratins and at certain time during the evolution of feathers, one of the beta-keratin genes was deleted, making the protein slightly smaller, according to the researchers.

Anchiornis, a small, feathered, four-winged dinosaur that lived in China around 160 million years ago, is a key link as dinosaurs transformed into birds.

The gene deletion, according to the researchers, happened around 145 million years ago, millions of years later than Anchiornis lived, so this kind of feathered dinosaurs had no shortened protein form to give them functional flight feathers.

"The data also give us more information about how feathers evolved to enable flight," said the paper's co-author Mary Schweitzer, professor of biological sciences at North Carolina State University.—Xinhua ■

Korean 'Monster' Kim signs for Beijing despite Watford bid

SHANGHAI (China) — South Korean defender Kim "Monster" Min-jae on Tuesday snubbed interest from the Premier League and the advice of his team-mates to sign for Beijing Guoan in China.

The 22-year-old centre-back, whose club Jeonbuk Motors said they had received a bid from

Watford reported to be about \$8 million, instead plumped for the Chinese Super League (CSL).

Guoan, who finished fourth in the CSL last season after falling out of the title race, announced Kim's signing but did not disclose the size of the transfer fee.

Coached by Germany's Roger Schmidt, Guoan will be hoping

the established international can stiffen a leaky defence that conceded 45 goals in the CSL last season.

Kim missed the 2018 World Cup because of injury but is a stalwart of the South Korean side and was in the team for their surprise 1-0 loss to Qatar in the Asian Cup quarter-finals last week.

Kim, whose "Monster" nickname stems from his powerful physique, had put all talk of his next move off while at the tournament in the United Arab Emirates.

But team-mates had encouraged him to take his chance and follow in the footsteps of Tottenham Hotspur's Son Heung-min, who has excelled in the Premier League.

Even Korean players plying their trade in the CSL had told the defender to go to England.

"I thought that he was going to China but then I heard good news and I hope he can make the better choice," said Kwon Kyung-won, who plays for Tianjin, after Watford's interest surfaced.

China is attractive to Asian players because of its high wages and proximity to home.—AFP ■

Keane links up with O'Neill at Nottingham Forest

LONDON (United Kingdom) — Roy Keane will once again link up with Martin O'Neill to become Nottingham Forest assistant manager, the Championship club announced on Monday.

The 47-year-old was part of the backroom staff during O'Neill's five-year spell in charge of the Republic of Ireland between 2013 and 2018.

Keane, like O'Neill, is a favourite at the City Ground as a former player. He made more than 100 appearances for the club between 1990 and 1993 before moving to Manchester United, where he won seven Premier League titles.

"Obviously, I had great memories of my career here as a player; the club gave me my chance and I will always remember them for that," Keane told the club's website. "But it is a different challenge now and I am in a different position coaching the players. I am looking forward to it, a huge

challenge ahead and 20 years out of the Premier League. It will be tough but I am looking forward to it." Keane joins with Forest four points off the playoff places in ninth after a first victory under O'Neill, who was appointed as manager earlier this month, over Wigan on Saturday. The former Ireland captain has experience of working in the Championship as

he guided Sunderland back to the Premier League during his first season in charge at the Stadium of Light in 2006 before resigning in December 2008 and then went on to manage Ipswich from 2009 to 2011. However, his most recent role was working under O'Neill as Ireland reached the last 16 of Euro 2016 but failed to qualify for last year's World Cup.—AFP ■

LONDON (United Kingdom) — Defending champions Chelsea will host Manchester United in the fifth round of the FA Cup, while fourth-division side Newport County could meet Manchester City.

Only seven top-flight sides remain in contention, with Crystal Palace handed a trip to Doncaster and Watford away to Portsmouth or QPR, while Wolves and Brighton face fourth-round replays.
