Myanmar, Thai open second friendship bridge

MYANMAR and Thailand officially opened the second friendship bridge that crosses Thaungyin River, linking Myawady Township of Kayin State with Mae Sot district of Tak Province yesterday morning.

The opening ceremony of the

bridge began with video clips on the project, followed by the explanations of the Director general of Road Department of Thailand.

Director General of Bridge Management Department U Shwe Lay briefed on the construction of bridge.

Union Minister for Construction U Han Zaw delivered an opening remark of the bridge, emphasizing bilateral relations of the two neighbouring countries, bilateral trades, tourism sectors, investment and labour issues. The surge in border trade volume

has led to traffic congestion on the Myanmar-Thai Friendship Bridge 1. The second one was built with the help of Thailand. The completion ceremony of the bridge was held on 19 March this year, and attended by State Counsellor Daw Aung San Suu Kyi and Thai Prime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha.

After the extended greeting of Thai Transport Minister Mr Saksayam Chidchob, Union Minister for Construction U Han Zaw, Union Minister for Planning and Finance U Soe Win, Union Minister for Commerce Dr Than Myint, Kayin State Chief Minister Daw Nan Khin Htwe Myint, Myanmar Ambassador to Thailand U Myo Myint Than, Thai Transport Minister Mr Saksayam Chidchob and officials cut the ceremonial ribbon to officially launch the Myanmar-Thai Friendship Bridge-2 (Thaungyin River). They observed crossing of vehicles on

the bridge.

During the second session of ceremony, the Director-General of Road Department and the Deputy Director-General of Department of East Asian Affairs of Thailand explained the Border Control Facilities (BCF) and its equipment.

U Ohn Lwin, the Director-General of Road Management Department under the Ministry of Construction, presented the works of development of transportation. Union Minister U Han Zaw and Thai Transport Minister Mr Saksayam Chidchob opened the monument of BCF, and Myanmar accepted its facility.

The Myanmar-Thai Friendship Bridge-2 (Thaungyin River) is 760-meter long and 17.2 meter wide. It is a box girder bridge with two traffic lanes, border control facilities and traffic changeover.—MNA

First Mandalay jade emporium sells K30 bln worth of jade lots

THE first jade emporium using Myanmar Kyats as the default currency in Mandalay Convention Center was held from 23 to 29 October and sold 1,867 jade lots with a combined total exceeding K30 billion.

U Aung Win Oo of the organizing committee’s information

group said it is the first event of its kind to be held in Mandalay and while they didn’t have enough time to organize properly it still turned out to be successful.

Jade sellers had to pay 11% as sales tax and 2% to the emporium as service charge while buyers had to pay 5% on their

purchase. This will ensure the nation receives the correct tax revenue, companies receive the raw material they need and workers in that industry will have jobs.

Organizing committee chairman U Kyaw Zaw Aung said 0.5% will be deducted out of every 2% service charge and donated as CSR funds for the region. He said there may have been shortcomings since it’s their first time organizing this sort of event but they will try even harder next time.

Mandalay City has the largest demographic of jade entrepreneurs and workers. The open tender system used in the emporium offered a transparent purchasing opportunity for domestic jade businesses.—Khaing Set Wai

Additional statistical bulletin on drug seizures, acting on information

1. In order to prevent and eradicate the dangers of narcotic drugs and psychotropic drugs, the Office of the President has formed the **Drug Activity Special Complaint Department** on 26 June 2018 to systematically accept and respond to reports on drug abuses and other related cases from the general public.
2. With orders from the Office of the President, the Drug Activity Special Complaint Department relayed information on reports on drug-related offenses up to 26 October 2019 to the Ministry of Home Affairs to take action, as displayed below:

A case has been opened against him with MaMaSa(Kyaukse) MaYa (Pa)44/2019 under Section 19(a) of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law. Similarly, police searched the house of Ma Nyo Ma (a) Gyoma, 30, daughter of U Twar Shin, who lives in the same village, and arrested her together with ‘88/1’ stimulant tablets. A case has been opened against her with MaMaSa(Kyaukse) MaYa (Pa)45/2019 under Section 19(a) of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law.
4	Information received of Maung Maung Lwin (a) Thar Nge who lives in No 6 Ward, Intaw Township, Shan State (south), distributing and selling illegal drugs.	On 20 October 2019, police searched the house of Maung Maung Lwin (a) Thar Nge, 44, who lives in No 6 Ward, Intaw Township, but he absconded from his house. Police seized ‘WY’ stimulant tablets from there. A case has been opened against him with NaMaSa(Intaw) MaYa (Pa)17/2019 under Section 19(a) of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law.

3. Out of the information sent to the Drug Activity Special Complaint Department, so far a total of 813 cases have been opened files as of 26 October 2019. A total of 1258 people, including 1,055 men and 203 women had been arrested with 7,049.1394 g of heroin, 1,341.92 g of ICE, 39,914.11 g of opium, 329.6 g of low-quality opium, 52934.92 g of speciosa powder, 7,833.19 g of speciosa, 2.5 liters of liquid speciosa, 351,149 stimulant tablets, 8,363.22 g of marijuana, 0.1 liters of opium tincture, 513.26 g of opium blocks, 60 g of poppy seeds, 29.15 g of crushed stimulant tablet powder, 0.001 g of crushed ecstasy powder, 18 firearms, different kinds of 257 cartridges and one grenade. Efforts for fighting the drug trafficking has been stepped up and the department will report on further exposed cases.

To seize further drugs and to arrest drugs dealers, people are urged to inform the Ministry of Home Affairs, region and state governments and to inform huge cases of drug trafficking and other suspicious cases directly to the Drug Activity Special Complaint Department of the Office of the President via following contact numbers:

THE Yangon Region Investment Committee gave the green light to 11 foreign projects from China, Hong Kong, China (Taipei), the British Virgin Islands, and the UK, and one domestic enterprise at a meeting held on 30 October.

The projects have an estimated capital of US\$22.35 million and K880 million.

The enterprises will be engaged in the manufacturing sector and are expected to create over 6,000 jobs, according to a press release issued by the YRIC.

The manufacturing sector attracted the most foreign investments in Yangon Region, for enterprises engaged in the manufacturing of pharmaceuticals, vehicles, container boxes, and Cutting, Making, and Packing (CMP) garments.

Since its establishment, the YRIC has approved more than 200 domestic and foreign projects in the sectors of manufacturing, hotel services, and other services from China,

Singapore, Japan, Hong Kong, the Republic of Korea, Viet Nam, India, China (Taipei), Malaysia, the British Virgin Islands, and Seychelles.

Among the regions and states, Yangon Region absorbs 60 per cent of investments, while Mandalay attracts 30 per cent. The other regions and states get only a small share of investments, according to statistics released by the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration.

To simplify the verification process of investment projects, the Myanmar Investment Law allows the Region and State Investment Committees to grant permissions to local and foreign proposals, where the initial investment does not exceed K6 billion, or \$5 million.

Myanmar shows improvement in five areas; moves up 6 spots in Doing Business 2020

MYANMAR has moved up in the Ease of Doing Business ranking to the 165th spot from a lowly 171 last year after the initial report of the World Bank, according to U Thant Sin Lwin, the director-general of the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA).

The World Bank report pointed out that Myanmar showed substantial improvements in five areas of doing business—starting a business, dealing with construction permits, registering property, protecting minority investors, and enforcing contracts.

Myanmar launched an online company registry platform, merging several procedures and reducing the need for in-person interaction. It also enacted the Myanmar Companies Law, in which directors’ stipulated duties and changes in shareholding are embodied.

In terms of construction permits, Myanmar strengthened construction quality control by imposing stricter qualification requirements for architects and engineers and making building permit requirements available on-

line. Myanmar also improved its water and sanitation infrastructure and made the process of obtaining building permits more efficient by introducing service quality standards.

In addition, Myanmar made property registration faster by streamlining deed registration and appraisal. It also improved the quality of its land administration system by publishing the fee schedule, official service standards, and statistics on property transfers for the previous calendar year.

Myanmar strengthened minority investor protection by mandating greater disclosure of transactions with interested parties, increasing director liability, and seeking greater corporate transparency.

Finally, Myanmar made enforcing contracts easier by publishing performance measurement reports.

Myanmar has been ranked as one of the top 20 improvers in Doing Business 2020 by the World Bank, based on the number of reforms and the degree by which the country’s ease of doing business score has improved in five initiatives, two of which are directly related to

the DICA. Myanmar expects an under-100 ranking in Doing Business 2021, said U Aung Htoo, the Deputy Minister for Commerce, who is also a part of the Improving Ease of Doing Business Ranking working group.

Myanmar was ranked 171st among 190 countries in the World Bank’s Doing Business 2018 report. The country remained 171 in the 2019 report.

The Myanmar Investment Commission under the Ministry of Planning and Finance is targeting a rank of 100 in 2020, 80 in 2025, 60 in 2030, and 40 in 2035, according to the Myanmar Investment Promotion Plan.

The World Bank has determined ease of doing business rankings based on 12 indicators: starting a business, dealing with construction permits, getting electricity, registering property, getting credit, protecting minority investors, paying taxes, trading across borders, enforcing contracts, resolving insolvency, employing workers and contracting with the government, all of which have been incorporated in the indicators in the 2020 report. —GNLM (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

MAB offers K 57 bln in loan to five microfinance businesses

THE Myanma Apex Bank (MAB) is providing SME loans of K57 billion to five microfinance businesses, said U Kyaw Ni Khin, MAB’s chief business officer during the signing of the loan agreement with the microfinance businesses on 30 October. The signing was done at the MAB office on the first floor of Tower B of the Union Financial Center in Yangon.

The Fullerton Finance (Myanmar) Company Limited, Proximity Finance Microfinance Company Limited, Vision Fund Myanmar Company Limited, Early Dawn Microfinance Company Limited, and Pact Global Microfinance Fund signed the loan agree-

ment with MAB. “Microfinance companies can help support Myanmar’s small businesses. SMEs play a crucial role in creating jobs. I am so glad that we can help assist SMEs through microfinance businesses,” said U Kyaw Ni Khin.

“Those businesses will lend a maximum of K10 million to SMEs. The loan term will be one to three years,” he added.

The microfinance businesses will take MAB loans at a certain interest rate, and they will offer loans to SMEs at an interest rate of 28 per cent per annum. The MAB is also offering two-step loans to SMEs.

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YBS to install card payment systems to first 1,500 buses in November

YANGON Bus Service (YBS) will install card payment systems in the first phase to its 1,500 buses in November, said U Min Naing, the director of Parami Bus Line operated by Bandoola Transport Co. Ltd. The equipment and systems are now ready for the first phase, and the installation and trainings will take 18 days commencing 1 November at Dagon University in the suburb of Yangon.

Some 500 buses of Yangon Urban Public Transport Public Company (YUPT), 500 buses of Yangon Bus Public Company Ltd (YBPC), 314 buses of Bandoola Transport Co Ltd and 88 buses of Shwe Taung Pine company will be installed with the system that is expected to be complete in December.

After the first phase, the installation will continue at 1,000 Fonton buses and 39 Scania buses in the second phase. The two sets of card payment system could be set

up to each of 2,539 buses in total of the two phases by 16 January next year. However, transport authorities are still discussing bus fares under the new payment system depending on the trips.

The Asia Starmar Transport Intelligent Co Ltd, the tender winner company for installation, said it will use advanced technology equipment for YBS buses. A total of 211 companies are operating over 4,000 buses in 100

routes in Yangon for about two million daily commuters, according to the figures of Yangon Region Transport Authority (YRTA).— Aye Min Thu

Putin visits close EU ally Hungary again

BUDAPEST — Russian President Vladimir Putin visits Hungary's nationalist Prime Minister Viktor Orban in Budapest Wednesday for trade and energy talks, the latest in a regular series of meetings with his closest ally in the EU.

The pair, who met twice in 2018, have held talks at least annually in the last five years, unsettling Western powers worried over Putin's proximity to an EU and NATO member state leader. Putin last visited Budapest in 2017.

Orban, a self-styled "illiberal" strongman and anti-immigration figurehead for nationalists around Europe and beyond, has adopted a policy of "Eastern opening" in recent years.

He has tasked his foreign ministry with sourcing trade

deals in countries such as Russia, Turkey and China, a strategy that has seen the 55-year-old maverick accused of cozying up

to autocrats and dictators.

"Orban presents himself as the bridge between the East and the West," said Peter Kreko, di-

rector of Budapest-based think tank Political Capital.

"Even if Hungary is a member of the Euro-Atlantic alliance, he opens to the East," he told AFP.

Last year during a visit to Moscow, Orban denounced EU sanctions on Russia over its annexation of Crimea.

Next week Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan visits Orban in Budapest, soon after praising the Hungarian for his "support" of Ankara's military operation in Syria.

Orban has argued that Hungary's national interest lies in allying with Turkey to avoid it sending millions of Syrian refugees currently in the country toward Europe.—AFP ■

Egypt, Germany agree on joint efforts to solve Libyan crisis

CAIRO — Egypt and Germany agreed on Tuesday to intensify their efforts to reach a comprehensive solution to the Libyan crisis.

Egyptian President Abdel Fattah al-Sisi discussed with visiting German Foreign Minister Heiko Maas a number of regional issues of bilateral interest, including the Libyan and Syrian conflicts, said Bassam Radi, spokesperson of the Egyptian presidency's office.

The two leaders agreed on "the need for a Libyan solution which would conserve the state's resources and its national institutions, and limit foreign interference and thus contribute in eliminating terrorism," Radi said. Sisi emphasized Egypt's stance on supporting a solution in Syria to preserve the unity and territorial integrity of the country.—Xinhua ■

British lawmakers say yes to 12 December general election

LONDON — Britain's House of Commons voted on Tuesday night for a snap general election on 12 December, which is set to send the country to go to the polls for the first time in December in nearly 100 years.

More than 46 million people in England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland will take part in what will be the first December parliamentary election since 1923.

A bill to pave the way for the election won by a vote of 438 to 20 after a day-long debate in the House of Commons with lawmakers backing British Prime Minister Boris Johnson's call for an election.

MAJOR VICTORY FOR PM

Johnson called for a 12 December, polling day, but an opposition Labour amendment wanted to bring election day forward to 9 December.

Labour lost their bid by 295 votes against 315, a major victory for Johnson, who has suffered repeated defeats in the House of Commons over his Brexit efforts since taking office in July.—Xinhua ■

Syria has little to lose at UN-backed talks: experts

DAMASCUS — Syria's government may be on board for the UN-brokered review of its constitution, but it will sink the Geneva talks opening Wednesday before agreeing anything that compromises its authority, experts have said.

Opposition negotiators and some analysts also fear that Damascus will use its participation as a bargaining chip to normalise relations with the West, and eventually get sanctions lifted.

UN envoy for Syria Geir Pedersen welcomed as a "sign of hope" the creation of the committee tasked with amending the constitution for a nation battered by eight years of war.

UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres agreed. The committee would be taking "the first step on the political path out of the tragedy of the Syrian conflict", he said in a statement. The committee's 150 members — includ-

ing government, opposition and civil society delegates — start work on Wednesday. But some

experts argue that it will merely offer yet another opportunity for President Bashar al-Assad's

government to appear open to UN-backed diplomacy without giving anything away.—AFP ■

London fire service criticised in high-rise tragedy report

LONDON — The emergency response to a 2017 high-rise fire that killed 71 people in London had "serious shortcomings", British media said on Tuesday, quoting an official report into the tragedy.

The long-awaited assessment into the Grenfell Tower fire is due to be published on Wednesday and indicated fewer people would have died had

London Fire Brigade been better prepared.

The June 14, 2017 inferno at the 24-storey residential block in west London was Britain's deadliest domestic fire since World War II and prompted widespread outrage.

Several media organisations said the report says the fire service's readiness for such a blaze was "gravely inadequate" and

that its response suffered from "systemic" failures.

It also accused LFB commissioner Dany Cotton of "remarkable insensitivity" after she told the inquiry she would not have done anything differently on the night.

"I identify a number of serious shortcomings in the response of the LFB, both in the operation of the control room and

on the incident ground," wrote inquiry head Martin Moore-Bick.

"It is right to recognise that those shortcomings were for the most part systemic in nature," he stated, according to the domestic Press Association news agency.

A public inquiry into the fire began in May 2018, led by retired High Court judge Moore-Bick, and is expected to take evidence in two phases.—AFP ■

Mullah on the march: Pakistan cleric takes on Imran Khan

ISLAMABAD — Pakistan Prime Minister Imran Khan faces the first major challenge to his leadership as a grey-bearded, orange-turbaned rival he calls “Maulana Diesel” marches to Islamabad with thousands of Islamists hoping to bring down the government.

Maulana Fazlur Rehman — one of the country’s most seasoned political operators — has dominated the airwaves in recent days with his calls to unseat his old adversary Khan.

The prime minister,

he says, did not win last year’s election, but was “selected” by the powerful security establishment — a suggestion denied by

Khan, but spread widely by Pakistan’s opposition since even before the July 2018 election.

“This movement will

continue until the end of this government,” Rehman told reporters ahead of the march.

“There is no other way... to bring Pakistan back on the democratic path.”

Rehman, who heads the Jamiat Ulema-e-Islam (JUI-F) — one of the country’s largest Islamist parties — has been leading supporters from across Pakistan for days on a “Azadi (Freedom) March” towards Islamabad, with tens of thousands expected to converge on the capital.—AFP ■

“Still no Amelia,” he wrote.—AFP ■

TOKYO —From crowded temples at Angkor Wat to queues to scale Everest, there’s no escaping the downsides to mass tourism but renowned writer Pico Iyer says the boom in world travel has brought positive changes.

Speaking to AFP ahead of his headline appearance at next month’s Hong Kong International Literary Festival, the au-

thor argues that people are sometimes “so aware of the bad things tourism brings, we forget the good things”.

“In many cases, in Rajasthan in India or Bali, the advent of tourists has woken people up to native customs and traditions that might have been falling away, and moved them to take care of their heritage and even expand it,” he says.—AFP ■

Furious Bolsonaro denies links to Brazil politician's murder

BRASILIA — President Jair Bolsonaro angrily denied links to last year's assassination of a prominent Brazilian politician on Wednesday, after reports that a suspect in the murder investigation visited his residence before the killing.

Marielle Franco, a popular leftist city councillor in Rio de Janeiro, was gunned down alongside her driver in March 2018 — a drive-by shooting that investigators described as a “summary execution.”

One of the two suspects in

the murder apparently published a photograph of himself alongside Bolsonaro on his Facebook account, since deleted.

Meanwhile the other lived in the same Rio de Janeiro residential complex as the president — links that the Brazilian police have dismissed as a “coincidence.”

On Tuesday night, TV network Globo reported that the first suspect visited the condominium building where Bolsonaro lived, telling the doorman he intended to visit the then-presidential

candidate.

The doorman then watched the man instead visit the home of the second suspect, the broadcaster's Jornal Nacional program reported, citing a leak from the police investigation.

Bolsonaro hit back forcefully at the report during a 24-minute live broadcast on YouTube early

Wednesday from Saudi Arabia, where he is currently on a diplomatic tour.

“I have no reason to kill anyone in Rio de Janeiro,” the president said, appearing agitated and at times shouting through the recording, and accusing Il Globo of “rotten and unscrupulous journalism”. —AFP ■

Chicago teachers' strike enters 10th school day

CHICAGO — A teachers' strike in Chicago moved into the 10th school day on Wednesday, as the teachers' union and district worked to resolve a contract deadlock over class sizes, support staff levels and pay at the bargaining table.

The strike is the second-longest in a wave of teachers' strikes that played out across West Virginia, Oklahoma, Arizona and California over the past few years, topped only by a three-week strike in June in Union City, California.

Classes will not be held as the teachers remain on strike, Chicago Public Schools (CPS) said late on Tuesday, hours after the Chicago Teachers Union (CTU) met with school officials to discuss negotiations, only to continue the stalemate.

“It's not too late,” CTU president Emerita Karen Lewis said in a statement, imploring Mayor Lori Lightfoot to make a deal.

“Our members have resolved and will not relent when it comes to the families they serve,” she warned Lightfoot, for whom the strike represents the first major political test since election in April. —AFP ■

Iraq PM's future on the line as demonstrators smell change

BAGHDA — The future of Iraq's embattled premier was in the hands of his onetime parliamentary backers Wednesday, as they deliberated over his ouster after mass anti-government protests that have left over 240 dead.

Massive rallies broke out in Iraq's capital and south this month against corruption and unemployment, spiralling into angry calls for a total overhaul of the political system.

By Wednesday, demonstrators were waiting to see whether the first fruit of their struggle — the ouster of Prime Minister Adel Abdel Mahdi — was finally

within reach.

“Isn't it the people who have

the power? Isn't it the people who put them all there?” asked pro-

testor Athir Malek, 39.

He had come from Diwan-iyah, 200 kilometres (130 miles) further south, to join the biggest rallies so far in Baghdad's Tahrir Square, where celebration was in the air. Youssef, 33 expressed optimism late Tuesday as he spent his sixth straight night in the square. “They said we wouldn't be able to do anything. But even if we change one name, now we have a voice,” he said.

Parliament has demanded that the premier appear “immediately” for questioning amid speculation he will face a no-confidence vote. —AFP ■

Australia's 'backpacker tax' illegally targets foreigners, court rules

SYDNEY — Australia's “backpacker tax” illegally targeted some foreign workers, a court ruled Wednesday, leaving people who spent time in the country on holiday working visas in line for tax rebates.

From 2017, Canberra applied a 15 percent levy for every dollar earned for two categories of working holiday visas linked to seasonal labour.

In a landmark decision Wednesday, a Brisbane court ruled the levy — dubbed the “backpacker tax” — cannot be applied to a British woman due to a double taxation treaty between Australia and the UK.

Similar agreements are also in place with the United States, Germany, Finland, Chile, Japan, Norway and Turkey according to international accounting firm

Taxback.com.

“That is a disguised form of discrimination based on nation-

ality,” judge John Logan said.

Australians begin paying tax once their annual income

exceeds Aus\$18,200. That was also the previous threshold for the working holiday visas.

The Australian Tax Office said it was considering whether to appeal the decision.

It added the ruling only affects a minority of working holiday makers “who are also residents, and only those from countries affected by a similar clause in the double tax agreement with their home country”.

In the case decided Wednesday, the British woman lived mainly in a Sydney sharehouse and stayed for the most part in the state of New South Wales — meaning she was considered a “resident” for tax purposes in Australia.

According to the ATO website, others — who travel from place to place — can be classed as “foreign residents” for taxation. —AFP ■

British family to sue American suspected of killing their son

LONDON—The family of a motorcyclist killed in a crash involving the wife of an American diplomat has announced it is planning to sue US President Donald Trump’s administration over an alleged cover-up.

Harry Dunn, 19, died on August 27 when his motorbike and a car driving on the wrong side of the road collided. In a statement issued through her lawyers and reported in US media, Anne Sacoolas admitted she was driving. She left Britain claiming diplomatic immunity before she was interviewed by police.

Dunn’s parents, Charlotte Charles and Tim Dunn, have urged US President Donald Trump’s administration to extradite Sacoolas to Britain, to no avail. “We are bringing claims against both Mrs. Sacoolas in the USA for civil damages as well as the Trump administration for their lawless misconduct and attempt to cover that up,” family

spokesman Radd Seiger said. “The Trump administration is not only hellbent on breaking international laws, rules and conventions on diplomatic immunity,” he added, “but they have no care or concern for the welfare of Harry’s family or any real intent on finding a solution.”

Seiger told AFP that the family’s ultimate goal is for Sacoolas to return to face the British justice system and to “uncover the misconduct of the US government” in allowing her back in the United States. The US government “brought her back to America so that she never faces trial,” Seiger said. With a US criminal trial out of question since the accident occurred in Britain, the family is pursuing a civil case, Seiger said, adding that it would seek “significant” damages. “In the US you can sue for millions of dollars if someone spills some hot coffee on your hand at McDonalds,” he said.—AFP ■

Rescuers hunt man missing after livestreaming Mt Fuji climb

TOKYO—Rescuers in Japan are searching for a man who appears to have fallen down part of Mount Fuji as he was live-streaming his climb up the country’s highest peak, police said Wednesday.

The man, whose name has not been made public, was live broadcasting from the snow-covered upper reaches of Mount Fuji on Monday afternoon when he appeared to slip and begin falling.

He could be seen tumbling downwards for several seconds before the stream cut out, and local media said people watching online first alerted authorities to the apparent accident.

A team of ten rescue workers began searching for the man early Tuesday, a spokesman for the local Shizuoka police told AFP.

The man had been complaining of freezing temperatures, deep snow, steep slopes and slippery surfaces in the final minutes of his broadcast.

Several viewers commented on the feed, warning the situation appeared dangerous, but he pushed on.

Footage of the climb and his fall have been taken down from the site he was using to live-stream.

Temperatures were well be-

low freezing near the top of the 3,776-metre (12,388-foot) volcanic mountain Tuesday night.

Every year hundreds of thousands of people climb Mount Fuji, regarded as a holy mountain in Japan.

The official climbing season runs from the start of July to the end of August. Outside this period, lodges and toilets are shut yet climbing is not prohibited.

But rescue team chief Kuniyasu Suzuki at the Shizuoka police warned that off-season weather conditions were severe.—AFP ■

Japan’s beer shipments to S. Korea dive 99% in Sept.: gov’t

TOKYO—Japan’s beer shipments to South Korea plummeted 99.9 percent in September from a year earlier to 588,000 yen (\$5,400), affected by a boycott of Japanese products in the neighboring country amid worsening bilateral ties, government data showed Wednesday. The campaign to boycott Japanese goods, including vehicles, has spread widely among South Korean consumers after tighter Japanese export controls were implemented in July on key materials used by South Korean chipmakers.

In the reporting month, exports of hydrogen fluoride, a chemical subject to newly tightened export controls, were also sharply down 99.4 percent to 3.72

million yen, according to the data compiled by the Finance Ministry.

The sharp drop in beer shipments in September followed a 92.2 percent plunge in August to

50 million yen. Export volume and value of the chemical material used to clean semiconductors stood at zero in August, the ministry data said.—Kyodo ■

Drug overdoses driving down US life expectancy

WASHINGTON—Drug overdoses have driven the first significant reduction in US life expectancy since the AIDS epidemic in the 1990s, an official report published Wednesday showed.

Americans have lost almost four months of longevity since 2014, the report by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) said.

“This is the first big drop since 1993, and the main driver behind that was the HIV epidemic,” Renee Gindi, a health statistician for the CDC’s National Center for Health Statistics told AFP.

An American born in 2017 can expect to live an average

of 78.6 years, compared to 78.9 years in 2014, according to the report which confirms previously published preliminary data.

Up until the 1960s, life expectancy was under 70 years.

The recent decline illustrates the devastating impact of the opioid crisis, especially synthetic opioids like fentanyl, which can be deadly even in minute quantities of a few milligrams.

Opioid overdoses killed 32,000 people last year, according to provisional figures.

The United States ranks 28th among OECD countries in life expectancy. Japan is highest at 84.2 years.—AFP ■

Messi fires in Barcelona demolition of Valladolid

BARCELONA — Lionel Messi made it clear he is fit and back to his scintillating best by tearing apart Real Valladolid on Tuesday in a thumping 5-1 victory for Barcelona.

Messi scored another spell-binding free-kick at Camp Nou after his sumptuous pass had already teed up Arturo Vidal for Barca's second. He then drove home his second late on before sliding through Luis Suarez to make it five.

Yet in truth his two goals and two assists were just the start of it, the defining moments of another mesmeric all-round performance that was dotted with flicks, passes and dribbles, not to mention two humiliating nutmegs.

"I don't know what more I can say," said Barcelona coach Ernesto Valverde.

"There were wonders coming out of his foot," said Valladolid's Michel. "You can only applaud and enjoy it."

Valladolid had threatened to make a game of it when Kiko Olivas benefitted from a rare Marc-Andre ter Stegen error to equalise after Clement Lenglet had struck in the second minute.

But with Messi in this sort of mood, the result never felt in doubt as victory sent Barcelona back to the top of La Liga after Atletico Madrid were held to a 1-1 draw by Alaves a couple of hours before.

Valverde's side has now won seven consecutive matches in all competitions, a run that began by beating Villarreal on September 24, when Messi returned from injury to make his first start of the season.

He has needed time, admitting earlier this month he was still short of sharpness even as goals flew in against Sevilla, Eibar and Slavia Prague.

But this display sent a resounding message that Messi is back to his best even if Valverde feels there is more to come.

"He is still getting back to full fitness," Valverde said. "But he is getting better and better."

Valladolid was perhaps unfortunate the 32-year-old was fresh after the postponed Clasico on Saturday meant Barcelona

and Real Madrid were given the weekend off.

It meant this was the first game at Camp Nou since violent protests broke out across Catalonia after nine pro-independence leaders were sentenced to imprisonment on October 21.

Giant yellow banners with 'Independencia' and 'Llibertat' written across them were unfurled before kick-off but there was no sign of unrest. Instead, the mood turned celebratory as Messi got to work.

It was his free-kick that Valladolid made a mess of clearing, as Sergi Guardiola lashed the ball against Joaquin Fernandez and Lenglet reacted fastest, his shot deflecting in before two minutes were on the clock. —AFP ■
