STATE Counsellor Daw Aung San Suu Kyi wrote on her Facebook page yesterday that just because we are battling against COVID, we should not forget other dangers such as dengue and chikungunya which happen during the rainy season.

This was what she wrote:

Monsoon has set in. As the word “monsoon” is derived from the Arabic word “season”, we should call it “seasonal wind”.

In Myanmar, we are now in the rainy season. However, it is nothing like the rainy season that we are used to as children. This is not to say “oh, when we were young it was not like this” as is the habit of elderly folks. This is just to point out the nature of climate change. What has not changed is the need to protect ourselves from seasonal diseases.

Just because we are battling against COVID, we should not forget other dangers such as dengue and chikungunya which happen during the rainy season. Having a fever reduces our immunity level. Especially at times like this, we need a high

immunity level. If fever develops, you should take it seriously and go to the nearest health department and receive treatment. However, there is no need to have excessive worries.

Due to COVID, programmes for giving regular vaccinations and oral administrations to children could not be done on time. These vaccinations are very important during the life time of children; for this reason, the Ministry of Health and Sports has initiated this programme even as we are preventing and controlling COVID. I want the parents to cooperate with us with special efforts.

Sometimes I wonder: The strenuous efforts that we have to make for the development of a country and make the lives of our people safe and secure, cannot be done like a seasonal wind with a time limit. It must be a wind that blows continuously at all times.

I pray that people will have spiritual strength and physical strength for all seasons.

Myanmar COVID-19 cases stand at 224 as 17 more cases reported on 30 May 2020

SEVENTEEN more cases of COVID-19 were reported in Myanmar on 30 May, making the country’s total tally 224. The latest cases are nine males and eight females who returned from India.

Out of the country’s 224 confirmed cases, six died, 130 persons have recovered and 124 have been discharged from hospitals, according to the report of Ministry of Health and Sports.—MNA *(Translated by Kyaw Zin Lin)*

A total of 1,152 Myanmar migrant workers from Thailand returned through the Myanmar-Thai Friendship Bridge (2) yesterday.

Of them, 504 returned under the repatriation programme arranged by Myanmar Embassy in Thailand, and 648 came back by themselves.

Kayin State Hluttaw Representative U Thant Zin Aung, District Administrator U Tayzar Aung, Deputy District Administrator U Aung Chan Nyein, Police

Lt-Col Thet Lin Oo, Township Administrator U Phyo Zaw Ko Ko, and officials checked the returnees' health conditions, and fulfilled their needs.

Out of them, the returnees arrived back on 13, 14 and 15 May, and 45 of 90 returnees on 17 May, and 52 of 1,434 returnees on 27 May are those who were freed from the prisons in Thailand. Therefore, Thai officials handed over them to the Myanmar authorities.

Yesterday's returnees include 45 from Kachin State, 7 from Kayah State, 200 from Kayin State, 157 from Mon State, 33 from Sagaing Region, 242 Bago Region, 93 from Magway Region, 32 from Yangon Region, 127 from Mandalay, 19 from Nay Pyi Taw, 120 from Shan State, 18 from Taninthayi, 19 from Rakhine State, and 40 from Ayeyawady Region. — Htein Lin Aung (IPRD)



Myanmar citizens come back home from Thailand via Kawthoung border

A total of 129 Myanmar migrant workers from Thailand, 70 males and 59 females, arrived back in Kawthoung via Ranong in Thailand by waterway yesterday.

Most of them returned home from Phuket under the arrangement of Taninthayi Region committee for receiving and repatriation of Myanmar migrant workers.

Members of District and

Township committee for COVID-19 prevention, control and treatment, departmental officials, and non-governmental organizations checked the returnees' health conditions, and fulfilled other needs for them.

Out of them, those who are from other regions and states were sent back to their native places. In their wards and villages, they will have to receive community-based facility quar-

antine for 21 days, and home quarantine for 7 days.

Those who are from Kawthoung were quarantined in community-based facility quarantine centres for 21 days, and will be quarantined at their homes for additional 7 days. Then, their swabs will be sent to the National Health Department.—Kyaw Soe (Kawthoung)

No one injured in veranda collapse at five-storey building in Yangon

A veranda of five-storey apartment building collapsed in Sangyaung Township, Yangon, yesterday evening, and members of Fire Services Department and rescue teams evacuated the residents.

“We noticed some concrete particles dropped from the upper level of apartment, and bigger concrete solids fell down before the collapse tonight,” said a woman living on the first floor of that building.

The damages occurred at the ceiling, front veranda and façade of the top floor.

Three family members were taken out from this apartment by the rescue members.

Regarding the incident, Yangon Mayor U Maung Maung Soe told the Myanmar News Agency that strength of the building has declined, and construction history of this building will also be investigated.

He added relevant organizations will help the residents with their temporary accommodation and their belongings and household items will be taken out from that building.—Zaw Gyi

Ministry of State Counsellor Office holds press briefing about handling of prevailing issues

THE Ministry of State Counsellor Office organized a video press briefing yesterday with local and foreign media about the internal issues and the government's handling of them.

Director-General U Zaw Htay spoke on the new 17 imported cases of COVID-19 from India, climbing the figure up to 224, while a total of 130 persons have been recovered from the disease and 122 persons have been discharged from the hospitals despite the death toll of 6; the National Central Committee for Prevention, Control and Containment of COVID-19 has issued an announcement to extend announcements, orders and directives of 28 May to 15 June.

The Ministry of Health and Sports removed the Stay Home restrictions from Bahan, South Okkalapa, Pabedan and Tamway townships of Yangon Region on 28 May, and the central committee also issued an announcement for the Union-level organizations, region/state governments and Nay Pyi Taw Council to resume daily duties of their staff commencing 1 June in line with the rules and regulations of the Ministry of Health and Sports; and to arrange ferry buses with only the half number of staff for each trip to ensure social distancing.

Local and foreign journalists raised questions about Myanmar's recent report to ICJ, legal actions against the responsible person in the Victoria case, ongoing and possible actions on holding a religious festival at the Botahtaung pagoda, situations of Myanmar citizens who were detained after participating in the Islam religious event in India, removal of squatters from the place where fire broke out in Sittway Township and assassination of ward administrative officer, investigation of arson attacks on the houses in Letkar village in MraukU Township, the warning of AA to remove all the administrative sectors and armed forces from Rakhine State, the COVID-19 assistance of Tatmadaw to the control areas ethnic armed groups, aid for internally displaced persons in northern Shan State, the amount of COVID-19 relief aid to public in the next round of assistance, the time for distribution and norms for selecting targeted people, detailed plans for reopening of school, plans for easing restric-

tions beginning 1 January, relocation of Kyauktalon IDP camp in Kyaukpyu Township, repatriation programme for Myanmar citizens from foreign countries, the latest purchase of helicopter, negotiations with ethnic armed organizations for holding peace conference, criticism of the government's handling of the COVID-19, shares of former military personnel in the military-owned businesses, preparation or holding the 2020 General Election and expenditures of loans for peace and development of ethnic areas.

In answering the questions, the Director-General said that it was reported that three police officers who are mainly responsible for investigating the Victoria case have been suspended from promotion; Myanmar citizens who took part in an Islamic religious event were intercepted by the Gaya immigration authorities, while trying to board a relief flight to Yangon, they were charged with the laws on communicable disease, natural disaster management and tourism, as they were detained at a hotel in Gaya, the India authorities also filed legal actions against the six religious leaders who organized the event, hundreds of persons from 34 countries are also facing legal actions in this case, the Myanmar embassy will closely watch the case of 22 Myanmar citizens and report back to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Myanmar.

As regards the government's measure in solving the problems of Kyauktalon IDP camp, the DG said the Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement is the organization mainly responsible for the Kyauktalon IDP camp. The country is drawing a

strategy in connection with the IDP camps, and consultation is carried out with the involvement of international organizations. The National Plan Strategy covering the whole country has been drawn, and the drawing of the region/state-wise action plan is underway.

He said, because of the regional diversity, a pilot program was first launched. IDPs staying at the Kyauktalon IDP camp have arrived there since 2012. It is a Closing Action Plan of the IDP camps in Rakhine State. Consultation was carried out by

among some IDPs. We will not use force in the resettlement programme. If the land reclamation is stopped, there will be inundation in the rainy season, and it may cause too much loss for the country. So, we are trying to complete the work. Officials of the Ministry of SWRR and Rakhine State government will carry out consultation again at the place. Moreover, the officials will meet with the IDPs and look into their requirements and help them overcome their fears.

The Kyauktalon camp is important as it is a pilot project,

The government had raised the issue of holding the Union Peace Conference: 21st Century Panglong. The Union Election Commission has already said that the elections will be held in the coming November.

Union Minister Dr Win Myat Aye and Chief Minister U Nyi Pu with the aim of conducting the resettlement programme after the consultation is done by the Union Minister and the Chief Minister level. Some want to return home. Normally, resettling them at their native place is a better idea. But we must study the situation. The plan is to arrange a better home for them. The Ministry of Border Affairs has already explained the matter at the parliament. Embankment is required, as without the embankment land reclamation will have to be done again in the rainy season. Such delays may cause misunderstanding

and the adoption of the action plan will be based on the lessons gained from the pilot project. According to our knowledge, some IDPs want to move to a new place and others want to stay at the camp. Only few IDPs want to return to their native place, as some had already sold their land. So, there will be no forced resettlement. The Ministry of SWRR will take coordinated measures.

The DG said the State leaders are giving guidance for the observance of the Union Peace Conference: 21st Century Panglong. The Government and the EAOs, the signatories to NCA, have held meetings for two times,

apart from holding frequent informal meetings. According to the consent, the part (3) of the Union Agreement will be signed at the conference. There will be three phases in signing the part. The NCA implementation framework includes 10 agreed points. They are agreed by the both sides. Another ten points are still under negotiations. Of them, an accord for four or five points can be reached between the Government and the EAOs through sharing views.

The stage by stage work programmes for post-2020 elections and phase by phase implementation work have eight major topics. Seven of them have been agreed and the last one is the security issue. The Tatmadaw and the Government want to proceed under the topic "security reconciliation". So it is still under negotiations.

The State Counsellor in her keynote speech at the fourth anniversary of the NCA said that the policy for the establishment of a federal had five points. EAOs have already accepted them, and the government has also agreed the points and made a proposal to present them. The EAOs also agreed the five points as the ones so supportive for the federal. The government had raised the issue of holding the Union Peace Conference: 21st Century Panglong. The Union Election Commission has already said that the elections will be held in the coming November. UEC designated the three-month pre-election period as the campaign period. According to the proposal, the conference will not be held later than July. The representatives to the conference will be invited five days ahead of the conference.

The country will send a passenger plane to Chiang Mai where the majority of EAOs leaders live in coordination with the Thai government. A direct Nay Pyi Taw-Tachilek flight has also been proposed. 150 representatives of the Government and the parliament, 150 representatives of the Tatmadaw, 150 representatives of political parties group, 150 representatives of EAOs, 50 essential representatives and 50 representatives of ethnic groups attended the previous conference. A proposal has been made to limit the number of representatives to one third of the number of the previous conference.

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Myanmar earns over \$ 542 mln from rice export as of 15 May

THE volume of exported rice and broken rice between 1 October and 15 May in this fiscal 2019-2020 is estimated to have reached nearly 1.9 million tonnes which is worth over US\$542.9 million, according to the official data released by the Ministry of Commerce.

During the period, over 1.25 million tonnes of rice worth more than \$374.3 million were exported to 62 countries while more than 643,722 tonnes of broken rice worth over \$168.6 million were exported to 53 countries.

Myanmar exports rice through the border and via maritime trade. Myanmar's rice goes to China through the Muse border and to EU and African markets through a maritime trade route.

China is the main buyer of Myanmar rice, followed by Mad-

agascar and the Philippines. Guinea is the fourth-largest buyer while Malaysia is the fifth-largest buyer of Myanmar rice. The European Union countries account for over 14.84 per cent of rice exports while 37.55 per cent of rice grown in Myanmar goes to African countries.

"At present, Myanmar's rice is highly demanded in the international market amid coronavirus pandemic. Foreign buyers are offering a higher price," said an MRF official.

The export value of rice and broken rice via border trade route reached more than \$78.08 million accounting for 14 per cent of total rice export value. The export value of rice and broken rice via maritime trade route hit \$470.8 million, accounting for 85 per cent of total rice export value. —Aye Cho

Monywa commodity depot to reopen on 2 June

Monywa commodity depot is arranging to reopen its market on 2 June, said U Tin Ko Ko, the person in charge of Monywa

commodity depot information. "The proposal is submitted to the Monywa township labour inspection department.

The officials from the labour inspection department and health department inspected the market. They said they will give the permission card to reopen the market on 30 May. If we received the permission card, we will reopen on 2 June," said U Tin Ko Ko.

The Monywa commodity depot was closed temporarily starting from 1 April to prevent the spreading of coronavirus disease. If the commodity depot reopens, the shop owners and their staff must wear the mask, wash their hands, measure the temperature and stand with four feet away from each other.

During the closure of the commodity depot, the shop owners are selling their products by using their phone via online system. —Myo Win Tun (Monywa)

Total border trade value exceeds \$7.13 bln

THE total trade value at 18 border trade camps as of 15 May, this fiscal year (FY) exceeded US\$7.13 billion, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

The total border trade value amounted to \$7.126 billion between 1 October and 15 May of 2019-2020 FY, up to \$446 million compared with the same period last year.

The total border trade value, as of 15 May this FY, included \$4.95 billion in exports and \$2.18 billion in imports. Compared with the last FY, the export earnings went up by more than \$86.8 million, while the import value increased by \$359 million. This time last year, the border trade was valued at \$6.68 billion.

Myanmar border trade is

being conducted through 18 border trade points with four neighbouring countries – China, Thailand, India and Bangladesh.

Among all the border points, the Muse border sees the largest volume and value of border trade, with an estimated value of more than \$3.08 billion this FY, followed by Hteekee with \$1.28 billion and Myawady with \$768 million.

Myanmar's major export items are farm, animal, marine, forest, mining, CMP and other products. Myanmar mainly imports capital goods, industrial raw materials, personal goods and CMP raw materials. —Zwe

Magway reopens express bus lines outside region

THE passenger highway bus lines in Magway region have been granted permission to resume their services outside of the region, according to the Magway Region Licencing and Transportation Supervision Department.

To prevent spreading of coronavirus in Magway region, the passenger highway bus lines

were suspended from 10 April to 15 May under the instruction of the regional government. On 16 May 2020, the regional government permitted the buses to resume in the first phase.

"On 16 May, the buses are permitted to resume in Magway region. Under the decision made at a meeting held on 28 May, the Magway regional government

granted the highway bus lines to run the buses to other states and regions as well as to Nay Pyi Taw," said U Thein Han, the regional head of Magway Region Licencing and Transportation Supervision Department.

The passenger highway buses must follow the rules and regulations adopted by the Ministry of Health and Sports.

A total of 343 bus lines are operating across the country and 79 bus lines are being operated in Magway region while 141 bus lines are being operated from Magway region to other states and regions and the remaining 123 bus lines are being operated from other states and regions to Magway region.—Naing Tway

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Eindu-Kawkareik road improvement project expected to be completed in 12 months

The Road Department is preparing to resume the improvement of Eindu-Kawkareik road in Kayin State as the dispute on land compensation has been settled

this month, said Assistant Director Min Banyar Htaw.

The upgrade of two-lane road with a total length of 64.735 kilometre—40 .44 km of Lot-

1 between Eindu village and Gyine bridge and 24.295 km of Lot-2 between Gyine bridge and Kawkareik— was started in December 2016. It is a part of the Greater Mekong Subregion East-West Economic Corridor, linking Myanmar to Thailand, which begins from the Danang Port of Viet Nam.

Although the improvement of Eindu-Kawkareik road was funded by US\$100 million loan from the Asian Development Bank, \$20 million loan from ASEAN Infrastructure Fund and \$1.8 million from state revenue, the ADB loan was suspended in 2017 as the project was said to breach environment conservation rules in extracting rocks for

the road in Lyunnya Mountain. The loan was given again only in May 2019, delaying the project one and half years. As the local authorities have negotiated land compensation this month and the remaining 4-km road section could be upgraded after rainy season, the entire Eindu-Kawkareik road could be finalized by 31 May 2021. The China Road and Bridge Corporation Co. Ltd., has won the bid to improve the road under the management of Ministry of Construction, and the road is a major transportation routes for both passengers and cargoes between Myanmar and Thailand.—Saw Myo Min Thein (IPRD)

Yangon water ferries to resume as usual starting from 1 June

YANGON Pansodan-Dala water ferries will resume as usual starting from 1 June for the passengers to be able to travel conveniently, according to the Delta Division of the Inland Water Transport (IWT).

The Pansodan-Dala jetty is the only gateway for the local people in southern Yangon -- Dala, Twantay, Kawhmu, Kungyangon townships and some townships in Ayeyawady Region to link with the commercial city hub of Yangon. However, the operation routes of the water ferries have been reduced from April to May because of declined number of passengers in the coronavirus outbreak period.

"The number of water ferry passengers has increased these days compared to last month.

This Pansodan-Dala jetty is one of the crowded places with the people because it is the entrance gate of the Yangon Region. After the coronavirus-positive patients have been found in Myanmar, the operation of water ferry has been reduced. The travelling of the passengers with water ferry is not normal in the water festival period. Starting from the second week of May, the people started to go outside their home. On 27 and 28, May, around 15,000 passengers travelled. So, the water ferry service is running 46 routes, as usual, starting from 1 June. With the increased routes, the passengers do not need to wait for the ferries and their travelling time will not be delayed, said Pansodan Jetty Manager Daw Khin Khin Nu.

Three 'Cherry' water ferries, operating between Pansodan and Dala daily, are reopening to provide transportation service as in normal period starting from 1 June. Moreover, the Z-crafts are operating

up and down from 6 am to 7 pm, transporting the vehicles and cargoes. The Yangon Pansodan-Dala water ferries are running from 5:30 am to 9 pm daily.—Naing Lin Kyaw (Dala)

The important UPDJC and JMC meetings will be held at the MICC-1. MICC-1 is more spacious. A six-foot space can be arranged between one seat and another. The most important meetings will be held at the MICC-2 and the signing ceremony and the opening ceremony will be held at MICC-1. The issue has been proposed to the EAOs. The points of the part (3) of the Union Agreement will be discussed between the Government and the EAOs in

June. Programmes are underway to call UPDJC and JICM meetings, which will be followed by the conference. The coming conference is important as some changes might occur in the part of Tatmadaw after 2020, and the situation of the government depends of the election results. As uncertainty might appear in relaying the results reaped from the ongoing discussions during the five years, it is required to reach an inclusively acceptable ground. EAOs and Tatmadaw will remain as participants, but there might be changes in the government. The representatives of the elected government will

take part in the negotiations. The peace process can be continued if an accord is reached on its continued implementation after 2020 as stated in the Union Agreement, through thorough discussions. It is an important issue and an essential task for the Government, the Tatmadaw, the EAOs and the political parties. Another factor is that the conference and the general elections are the inevitable process for the national cause, peace process and federal building.

As regards the involvement of retired Tatmadaw officers in the list of directors of the Union of Myanmar Economic

Holdings Limited, the DG said the director-general of Customs Department and the managing director of Myanma Port Authority have been included in the list of directors since the establishment of the UMEHL. But we have the knowledge about it only now. The relevant ministries also know about the matter only at present. But according to the ministries, the two officials have never attended the BOD meetings. But legal assessment of the case will be made after reviewing it and the legal counsel is sought from the Attorney General's Office.—Kyaw Han Aung *(Translated by Aung Khin & TMT)*

PARIS (France) — Here are the latest developments in the coronavirus crisis.

Trump cuts ties with WHO

US President Donald Trump delivers a major blow to the finances of the World Health Organization, making permanent his decision to break off ties with the agency and redirect WHO funds “to other worldwide and deserving urgent global public health needs”.

The move sparks a fierce backlash.

Germany blasts the deci-

sion as “disappointing” and a setback for global health, while Richard Horton, editor of *The Lancet* medical journal, says it is “madness and terrifying”.

“The US government has gone rogue at a time of humanitarian emergency,” he tweets.

The European Union calls on the US to “reconsider”.

More than 364,000 deaths

The pandemic has killed at least 364,362 people worldwide since it surfaced in China late last year, according to an AFP tally at 1100 GMT on Saturday,

based on official sources.

Nearly six million cases have been registered in 196 countries and territories.

The United States is the worst-hit country with 102,836 deaths. It is followed by Britain with 38,161, Italy with 33,229, France with 28,714, Brazil with 27,878, and Spain with 27,121.

Uruguay leader in quarantine

Uruguayan President Luis Lacalle Pou is in quarantine after attending a meeting with an official who tested positive for the virus.

Return of NBA?

NBA commissioner Adam Silver tells team owners he is targeting a July 31 return to play, US media reports, but the format for completing the top basketball league’s season remains unclear.

Formula 1 green flag

Formula One’s season will finally get underway with the Austrian Grand Prix on July 5, the Austrian government announces. The Spielberg circuit will also stage a second race the following weekend.

Both races will go ahead without spectators.

Pisa tower and Paris parks

In further signs of European countries progressively emerging from lockdowns, Italy’s famed Leaning Tower of Pisa reopens to visitors as do the parks in Paris, both shuttered for months.

Hands off Gibraltar monkeys

Authorities in Britain’s tiny enclave of Gibraltar, fearful of a virus outbreak among its famous Barbary monkeys, ban tourists from touching the animals. —AFP ■

Most areas in Japan to fully reopen Mon. as new infections fall

TOKYO — Thirty-eight of Japan’s 47 prefectures are set to fully reopen their economies on Monday as they seek to strike a balance between rebuilding the economies hit by the coronavirus and implementing measures to prevent a second wave of infections.

Schools will also reopen across the country, a week af-

ter Prime Minister Shinzo Abe fully lifted the nation’s state of emergency declared over the pandemic. With businesses resuming in stages from early May, a total of 38 prefectures such as Hokkaido, Aichi and Hyogo will lift restrictions on operations of shops and leisure facilities on Monday. Given their small number of infection cases, Okayama

and Tokushima prefectures had not filed requests that businesses suspend operations as part of efforts to curb the virus spread.

In the remaining seven prefectures including Tokyo and Fukuoka, such requests will be maintained for businesses with records of having clusters of infection, such as clubs with live music.—Kyodo News ■

Chile, Peru secure credit lines from IMF amid pandemic

WASHINGTON (United States) — The IMF approved a two-year \$24 billion credit line for Chile on Friday as the South American nation battles the growing impact of the coronavirus pandemic.

The announcement came a day after Peru secured a two-year, \$11 billion credit line, and as Latin America becomes a growing hotspot for COVID-19.

The Flexible Credit Line is a renewable funding mechanism granted to countries with strong economic policy track records, and Chile is only the fifth country to receive one. Along with Peru, Mexico and Colombia currently have FCLs in place.

IMF Managing Director Kristalina Georgieva praised Chile for its “very strong fundamentals ... and track record of implementing prudent macroeconomic policies” that have helped the country to weather the economic shocks so far.

However, “Chile’s open economy is exposed to substantial external risks as a result of the ongoing COVID-19 outbreak, including a significant deterioration in global demand for Chilean exports, a sharp decline or reversal of capital inflows toward emerging markets, and an abrupt tightening of global financial conditions,” she said in a statement.—AFP ■

Indian states ban consumption, spitting of tobacco in public places to prevent COVID-19

MUMBAI — Indian states are on a spree to ban consumption, spitting and smoking of tobacco and tobacco products in public places following a directive by federal government to all states in the country.

On Saturday, India’s western state of Maharashtra and South-Western state of Karnataka announced a ban following a similar ban announced by the Northern state of Rajasthan and North Eastern state of

Jharkhand.

“Spitting also contributes to spreading Covid-19. Considering this, we have decided to implement the prohibitory laws more strictly. Violators will have to pay a fine of 13 dollars for

first offence, 40 U.S. dollars for second and 66 U.S. dollars for subsequent offence,” Rajesh Tope, Maharashtra health minister said.

Maharashtra is the worst affected Indian state with

over 62,000 positive COVID-19 cases and its political capital Mumbai tops the list among cities in Asia’s third largest economy with close to 37,000 positive cases so far. —Xinhua ■

Stop tobacco industry exploitation of children and young people

MORE than three decades since the world started observing the World No-Tobacco Day in 1987, smoking remains a major health problem, blamed for so many illnesses such as lung cancer.

The number of deaths caused by cancer, hypertension, and respiratory diseases would be higher in the coming years if the current levels of consumption of tobacco products, including betel quid and cigarettes, do not decline.

The harmful effects of tobacco smoking are well documented. It is blamed for the death of seven million people around the world each year, mostly from direct tobacco use and around 890,000 from exposure to second-hand smoke.

With a focus on protecting children and young people from exploitation by the tobacco and related industry, the World Health Organization is today launching a new kit for school students aged 13-17 to alert them to tactics used by the tobacco industry to hook them to addictive products.

Even during a global pandemic, the tobacco and nicotine industry persist by pushing products that limit people's ability to fight coronavirus and recover from the disease. The industry has offered free branded masks and delivery to your door during quarantine and has lobbied for their products to be listed as 'essential'.

WHO calls on countries to protect children from industry exploitation by putting in place strict tobacco control laws, including regulating products like e-cigarettes that have already begun to hook a new generation of young people.

To protect our children, we need to make our tobacco-free policy realistic by imposing fines on businesses that sell tobacco products to kids and in restricted areas.

Most important, we need to make young people understand how incredibly foolhardy it is to inhale and swallow chemicals whose effects we do not understand and which lead to an addiction many cannot escape

World No Tobacco Day 2020

EVERY year, on 31 May, WHO and Partners celebrate World No Tobacco Day. The theme of 2020 is protection of younger generations, focusing on "protecting youth from industry manipulation and preventing them from tobacco and nicotine use. The specific goals of the World No Tobacco Day 2020 campaign are as follows:

- Unmask myths and expose manipulation tactics employed by the tobacco and related industries, particularly marketing tactics targeted at youth, including through the introduction of new and novel products, flavours and other attractive features;
- Provide young people with knowledge about the tobacco and related industries' intentions and tactics to hook current and future generations on tobacco and nicotine products; and
- Enable influencers (in pop culture, on social media, in the home, or in the classroom) to protect and defend youth and catalyze change by engaging them in the fight against Big Tobacco.

Global Tobacco Epidemic

Tobacco epidemic is one of the world's leading health threats, and a main risk factor for non-communicable diseases (NCDs) including: cancers, diabetes, chronic respiratory disease and cardiovascular disease. According to WHO's new report on global tobacco use trends (2019), there are 1.3 billion tobacco users globally. Every year, more than 8 million

people die from tobacco use, approximately half of its users. More than 7 million of those deaths are from direct tobacco use while around 1.2 million are due to non-smokers being exposed to second-hand smoke. Most tobacco-related deaths occur in low- and middle-income countries that are targets of intensive tobacco industry interference and marketing. Other key findings of the report included:

- Children and youth: Approximately 43 million children (aged 13-15) used tobacco in 2018 (14 million girls and 29 million boys).
- Women: The number of women using tobacco in 2018 was 244 million.
- Asian trends: WHO's South East Asian Region has the highest rates of tobacco use, of more than 45% of males and females aged 15 years and over, but the trend is projected to decline rapidly to similar levels seen in the European and Western Pacific regions of around 25% by 2025.
- Poverty: Tobacco use contributes to poverty by diverting

household spending from basic needs such as food and shelter to tobacco. The economic costs of tobacco use are substantial and include significant health care costs for treating the disease caused by tobacco use as well as the lost human capital that results from tobacco-attributable morbidity and mortality.

Tobacco use among young people in Myanmar

The global Youth Tobacco Survey (GYTS) was conducted in Myanmar at the national level in 2001, 2007, 2011 and 2016 to assess the prevalence of tobacco use among Myanmar youth. The 2016 GYTS, like its predecessors, was a national-level representative survey based on a sample of students 13-15 years of age enrolled in grades 9-11. The following points are key findings from this survey.

* **Tobacco use:** There has been no significant change in the prevalence of current use of any tobacco product (15.3% in 2007 to 13.6% in 2016). However, there was an increase in the prevalence of current cigarette

smoking between 2007 and 2011 (from 4.9% to 8.3% overall, 8.5 to 17.0% in boys and 1.3% to 1.5% in girls) with no significant change in current smokeless tobacco use.

* **Secondhand smoke:** Exposure to secondhand smoke (SHS) in homes did not change significantly between 2007 and 2016. One third of the students were still exposed to SHS in these circumstances. In contrast, the reported exposure to SHS in enclosed public places has declined significantly from 46.4% (all public places) in 2007 to 28.4% (enclosed public places) in 2016.

* **Access and availability:** Despite the ban on the sale of tobacco to minors, 54.5% of the smokers reported that they obtained cigarettes from a store, shop or street vendor and more worryingly about two-thirds reported that they were not prevented from buying those cigarettes because of their age; these indicators have remained largely unchanged over the years.

* **Anti-tobacco messages:** The percentage of students who saw anti-tobacco messages in the media dropped significantly from 93.4% in 2007 to 80.2% in 2016.

* **Tobacco marketing:** The percentage of students who saw someone using tobacco on TV or in videos or movies was high at 83.4%. Tobacco marketing has also declined. The percentage of students who were offered free tobacco products by tobacco companies and those who reported ownership of tobacco branded objects was found to be less than 6%.

Tobacco Industry Tactics to attract younger generations

Tobacco and related industries promote its products to potential smokers, including young people, to ensure the market for tobacco continues to in-

crease and that dying smokers and those who quit smoking are replaced. The tobacco industry targets young people through misleading messages that help shape attitudes to tobacco use.

The tobacco Industry is targeting a new generation with their tricks and tactics as follows:

(a) Direct Advertising

- Advertising in entertainment media like movies and TV shows -Attractive displays at children's eye level, near toys sweets and sugary drinks
- Tobacco products ads that imitate popular memes to appeal to children and young adults

(b) Indirect advertising

- Use of social media and sponsoring influencers to promote certain tobacco and vaping products
- Promotion of tobacco products at popular events for young people
- Distribution of free samples and promotional materials to young people

(d) Sponsorship

- Apprenticeships and school and university scholarships for students, and other support for schools
- Sponsorship of major sporting events/teams, including placement of tobacco company logos

(e) Other marketing tactics

- Flavours appealing to children in smokeless tobacco, shisha and e-cigarettes
- Kiddie packs and single stick sales

Tobacco industry interference in Myanmar

The tobacco industry lobby is strong in Myanmar. According to the fourth Tobacco Industry (TI) Interference Index, Myanmar ranks third highest out of 9 ASEAN countries analyzed. Ac-


cording to the survey, TI interference in Myanmar increased from 2015 to 2016. Based on the report, the industry has worked to delay implementation of the 2016 legislation requiring pictorial health warnings on cigarette packs. There are still tobacco packs being sold which are not compliant with the requirement. Policymakers in Myanmar should consider strengthening safeguards against TI interference, for example by instituting a code of conduct for Government officials that requires disclosure of conflict of interests.

The Current Burden of Tobacco Use in Myanmar

Tobacco use undermines economic growth. In 2016, tobacco use caused 64,033 deaths in Myanmar, 56 per cent of which occurred among citizens under the age 70. As a result, Myanmar lost productive years in which those individuals would have contributed to the workforce. The economic losses in 2016 due to tobacco-related premature mortality are estimated at MMK 1.32 trillion.

While the costs of premature mortality are high, the consequences of tobacco use begin long before death. As individuals begin to suffer from tobacco-attributable diseases (e.g. heart disease, strokes, cancers), expensive medical care is required to treat them. Spending on medical treatment for illnesses caused by smoking cost the Government MMK 71.9 billion in 2016, and caused Myanmar citizens to spend MMK 226.7 billion in out-of-pocket (OOP) healthcare expenditures. In addition to generating healthcare costs, as individuals become sick, they are more likely to miss days of work (absenteeism) or to be less productive at work (presenteeism).

U.S. to start eliminating special treatment for Hong Kong: Trump

WASHINGTON — U.S. President Donald Trump said Friday that his administration will start the process of eliminating special treatment for Hong Kong, blasting China for breaking its “word to the world” on ensuring the territory’s autonomy.

The announcement came after China on Thursday decided to introduce a national security law to crack down on what it views as subversive activity in Hong Kong, which saw massive pro-democracy protests erupt into violence last year.

Trump said the United States will take steps to sanction Chinese officials directly and indirectly involved in eroding Hong Kong’s autonomy and suspend the entry of certain foreign nationals from China identified as potential security risks.

The president also said he will be “terminating” the U.S. relationship with the World Health Organization, which he criticizes for being China-centric amid the coronavirus pandemic, and redirecting funds to other global public health needs.—Kyodo ■

Los Angeles restaurants reopen as virus lockdown eases

LOS ANGELES — Los Angeles restaurants and hair salons were granted permission to reopen immediately Friday, as restrictions were eased despite fears the city has become a coronavirus hotspot.

Restaurants in Los Angeles county – which has suffered more than half of California’s virus deaths – will be allowed to offer dine-in services with capacity limited to 60 per cent.

Customers will be required to wear face coverings while not eating, must wait for their tables outside the restaurant, and will be screened for symptoms on entry.

Bar areas of restaurants will remain closed.

“This further brings our communities together and resumes a sense of normalcy, representing monumental progress for Los Angeles County on the path toward recovery,” Board of Supervisors Chairwoman Kathryn Barger said.

Densely populated Los Angeles county has suffered more than 50,000 confirmed coronavirus cases including 2,290 deaths, and has lagged behind most of California in reopening.—AFP ■

Virus-battered Italy faces worst recession since WWII

ROME — Facing its deepest recession since World War II and with business confidence collapsing, the coronavirus pan-

demic is hitting Italy’s economy hard.

Business confidence in the eurozone’s third largest econ-

omy in May plummeted to its lowest level since official statistics institute ISTAT started the index in March 2005.

The figure is “alarming”, said small business federation Confesercenti.

“The health and economic emergency has swept businesses away, especially in shops, services and tourism,” it said.

Its members are particularly concerned “by the lack of liquidity necessary to pay costs and salaries... we are close to a point of no return and that’s why the measures decided by the government (loan guarantees, SME subsidies) must be operational immediately,” said federation head Patrizia De Luise.

“We need to reduce bureaucracy and accelerate and simplify procedures, because if support is delayed again, many businesses will have no option but to stop,” she said.

The government last week accused banks of not acting quickly enough, but they said that they had already passed on around 400,000 loan requests worth more than 18 billion euros (\$20 billion) to the state-backed Central Guarantee Fund.

Finally, even in their healthy years, working smokers are less productive than non-smokers.

In total, tobacco use cost Myanmar’s economy MMK 2.62 trillion in 2016, equivalent to about 3.3 per cent of Myanmar’s GDP that year.

Recent developments of Tobacco Control in Myanmar

Myanmar signed the WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (WHO FCTC) in 2003 and ratified the treaty the following year. Since that time, Myanmar has made significant progress in tobacco control. For example, it passed a strong tobacco control law in 2006 and has enacted several policies to reduce tobacco use, including: prohibiting smoking in many indoor public places, mandating that graphic warn-

ing labels cover 75 per cent of cigarette packs, and banning tobacco advertising on traditional and new forms of media (e.g., television, the internet). By legislating and funding these important measures, Myanmar is helping to curb the tobacco epidemic and has set the stage for strengthened efforts.

Myanmar is one of 15 countries worldwide receiving FCTC 2030 project support. The FCTC 2030 Project is a global initiative funded by the UK Government to support countries to strengthen FCTC implementation to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). In consultation with the Government of Myanmar, five FCTC provisions were selected to model within the investment case:

- Increasing tobacco taxation to reduce the affordability of tobacco products (FCTC Ar-

ticle 6);

- Enforcing bans on smoking in all public places to protect people from tobacco smoke (FCTC Article 8);

- Implementing plain packaging (FCTC Article 11: Guidelines for implementation);

- Instituting mass media campaigns against tobacco use (FCTC Article 12); and

- Implementing and enforcing a comprehensive ban on tobacco advertising, sponsorship, and promotion (FCTC Article 13).

Join the fight to become a tobacco-free generation

Young people need to be provided with information about the harms of tobacco use and tobacco industry marketing tactics. They have a right to protection from tobacco marketing and second-hand smoke.

Article 5.3 of the WHO FCTC requires countries to

protect their tobacco control policies from the vested interests of the tobacco industry. Furthermore, implementation of the WHO FCTC requires Parties to take measures to protect youth against the harms of tobacco use.

The Ministry of Health and Sports remains committed to take more effective measures to reduce tobacco use among adolescents and to raise awareness on harmful effects of tobacco. Myanmar had already rolled out the “Five Year Strategic Plan for Young People’s Health (2016–2020)”, which recognizes the importance of improving adolescent health. These youth related policies will serve as one of the avenues to promote the agenda of reducing tobacco consumption among youth. Myanmar will also undertake the following actions.

- Develop and implement a code

of conduct for government officials and civil servants for their interactions with tobacco industry, in line with Article 5.3 and its guidelines

- Continue to raise awareness on protection of public health policy from the vested interests of the tobacco industry among all government agencies and public officials, in collaboration with civil society

Malaysia's Mahathir challenges his removal from ruling party

KUALA LUMPUR — Former Malaysian Prime Minister Mahathir Mohamad mounted an official challenge Friday against his removal from the ruling party he founded, as the war with his successor and party president Muhyiddin Yassin heats up.

In separate letters dated Thursday and signed by Bersatu organizing secretary addressed to Mahathir, his son Mukhriz and three others, the five were told their memberships were “nullified” for opting to sit among the opposition during the May 18 Parliament meeting, thus break-

ing party rules.

“The organizing secretary has exceeded his authority. I am still the chairman. Please remember that. They tried to remove me, but it’s not valid,” Mahathir told a press conference at Bersatu headquarters where he promptly announced that Muhammad Suhaimi Yahya has been sacked from his post as organizing secretary.

He also claimed that there is no provision in the party constitution that touches on where a legislator should sit.

“I have done nothing that

is against the constitution,” he said, adding, “Where you sit should not be a cause for sacking.”

Mahathir’s lawyer Haniff Khatri, in a statement, said his office has submitted a notice to the Registrar of Societies, an agency under the Home Ministry that regulates non-governmental organizations and political parties, to reject Bersatu’s termination letter and applied to refer the dispute to the registrar.

A similar notice has been served to the party headquarters.—Kyodo ■

First flight of returning European employees lands in China

BEIJING — A Lufthansa plane carrying around 200 mainly German workers landed in China on Saturday, marking the first return of Europeans since the country suspended visas over the coronavirus.

China drastically cut international flight routes in late March and imposed an entry ban on most foreigners -- including those with valid residence visas.

The move underlined its fears over imported coronavirus cases and a second wave of infections as the virus epicentre shifted beyond China, where the deadly pathogen was first reported late last year.

Many workers found themselves stranded abroad and unable to return after leaving China at the height of the epidemic.

Lufthansa’s flight from Frankfurt landed shortly before noon at Tianjin airport, southeast of Beijing, the German flag-carrier said.

The group, made up of employees of German companies and their families, were tested for COVID-19 after they landed and will have to quarantine for two weeks.

“We did not know if this plane would leave or not” until the last minute, said passenger Alexander Ophoven before take-off.

A second aircraft -- reserved for people whose who need to be in China for economic, commercial, scientific or technological purposes, or for urgent humanitarian reasons -- is scheduled to depart from Frankfurt for


Shanghai on June 3.

There are more than 5,000 German companies operating in China, according to the local German Chamber of Commerce.

Two months after closing its borders, China is beginning to lift restrictions on foreigners.

Beijing announced on Friday that some Singapore nationals will be allowed to return from early June. They will only be allowed entry into six cities and provinces initially, including Shanghai.

The number of international flights between China and the rest of the world will increase from 134 to 407 per week as of Monday, according to the Chinese Civil Aviation Administration.—AFP ■

Singapore's plan for “fast lane” with China draws criticism at home

SINGAPORE — Netizens in Singapore have reacted sharply to the government’s announcement of an agreement reached with China to launch a “fast lane” in early June to facilitate essential travel between the two countries.

A statement released by the Foreign Ministry late Friday said that, with effective coronavirus prevention and control measures in place, the arrangement would first be applied between Singapore and the six Chinese provinces or municipalities directly under the central government -- Shanghai, Tianjin, Chongqing, Guangdong, Jiangsu and Zhejiang.

It will be gradually expanded to other parts of China, it said, adding that the two governments also agreed to explore increasing air links between the two countries for the proposed fast lane.

Since Feb. 1, Singapore has banned the entry or transit of Chinese nationals and anyone with a travel history to mainland China within 14 days of arrival in Singapore.

The ban was subsequently extended to all short-term visitors from overseas as the COVID-19 pandemic worsened and spread to other countries outside China.

Following the announcement, the Facebook page of Channel News Asia, the English-language news website for Singapore’s national broadcaster, was flooded with criticism of the agreement.

“Of all countries you open up to the country where the virus originated...too risky,” one reader commented.—Kyodo ■

Vietnam's COVID-19 cases increase to 328

HANOI — Vietnam reported a new case of COVID-19 infection on Saturday, bringing its total confirmed cases to 328 with zero death so far, according to its Ministry of Health.

The latest case was a one-year-old Vietnamese boy recently returning to the country from Russia, said the ministry, noting that 33 other passengers on the same flight with the baby had been confirmed to have contracted the virus.

Meanwhile, 279 patients have totally recovered from the disease, according to the ministry.

Vietnam has recorded no local transmission for 44 straight days while there are nearly 7,900 people being quarantined and monitored in the country, according to the health ministry.

Trump cuts ties with WHO as pandemic grips Latin America

WASHINGTON — US President Donald Trump said he is severing ties with the World Health Organization over its handling of the coronavirus pandemic, as the death toll from the disease spiked again in the United States and Brazil.

The virus, which has killed more than 364,000 people and devastated the global economy, is progressing at different speeds across the globe, with Europe continuing to open up from lockdown on Saturday after seeing its number of infections steadily fall.

Italy's iconic Leaning Tower of Pisa reopened, while Parisians flocked to parks open for the first time in months.

But countries in Latin America are bracing for difficult weeks ahead, especially Brazil, where the death toll shot up by 1,124 on Friday and there was a record

number of new infections. The unprecedented challenge of the

pandemic has put pressure on the WHO, and Trump's decision

to end hundreds of millions of dollars in funding comes when

the UN agency needs it most.

Trump initially suspended funding to the WHO last month, accusing it of not doing enough to curb the early spread of the virus and being too lenient with China, where the virus emerged late last year. On Friday he made that decision permanent in a major blow for the agency's finances, as the US is by far its biggest contributor, pumping in \$400 million last year. The president told reporters the US would be redirecting WHO funds "to other worldwide and deserving urgent global public health needs."

'Madness and terrifying'

The move sparked a fierce backlash on Saturday, with German Health Minister Jens Spahn saying the "disappointing" decision was a setback for global health.—AFP ■

Israel police kill Palestinian they mistakenly thought was armed

JERUSALEM -- Israeli police in annexed east Jerusalem on Saturday shot dead a Palestinian with special needs they mistakenly thought was armed with a pistol, Israeli and Palestinian sources said.

The incident happened in the alleys of the walled Old City near Lions' Gate, an access point mainly used by Palestinians.

"Police units on patrol there spotted a suspect with a suspicious object that looked like a pistol," an Israeli police statement said.

"They called upon him to stop and began to chase after him on foot. During the chase, officers also opened fire at the suspect, who was neutralized.

"No weapon was found at the scene after the area was searched," the statement said.

The Palestinians' official news agency Wafa identified the dead man as Eyad Hallak, a resident of the Wadi Joz neighbourhood of east Jerusalem with special needs.

There has been an uptick in violence in east Jerusalem

and the occupied West Bank in recent days, although it has yet to reach the levels of 2015-2016 when Israeli security forces struggled to stop a wave of so-called lone wolf attacks unconnected to any established militant group.—AFP ■

Merkel a 'no' for Trump's in-person G7 summit

BERLIN — German Chancellor Angela Merkel will not attend an in-person summit of G7 leaders that US President Donald Trump has suggested he will host despite concerns over the coronavirus pandemic, a German government spokesman said Saturday.

Leaders from the Group of Seven, which the United States heads this year, had been scheduled to meet by videoconference in late June after COVID-19 scuttled plans to gather in-person at Camp David, the US presidential retreat in the state of Maryland.

Trump last week, however, indicated that he could hold the huge gathering after all, "primarily at the White House" but also potentially parts of it at Camp David.

Merkel, a scientist by train-

ing, has declined.

"As of today, considering the overall pandemic situation, she cannot agree to her personal participation, to a journey to Washington," the spokesman said, confirming an earlier report on the Politico website.

"The federal chancellor thanks President Trump for his invitation to the G7 summit," he added. The 65-year-old chancellor is the oldest G7 leader after Trump, who is 73. Japan's Shinzo Abe, also 65, is several months younger than Merkel. Their age puts them at higher risk from the coronavirus.

The White House has said it is putting the huge diplomatic gathering back on the agenda as a "show of strength" when world economies are gradually reemerging from shutdowns.—AFP ■

Officer charged with murder of black American as unrest sweeps US

MINNEAPOLIS — Violent protests erupted across the United States late Friday over the death of an unarmed black man at the hands of police, with murder charges laid against a Minneapolis officer failing to quell seething anger.

Demonstrators clashed with police for a fourth straight night in the midwestern city of Minneapolis, where fires raged and

there was widespread looting as well as sustained cat-and-mouse clashes between protesters and police.

US President Donald Trump ordered soldiers prepare to deploy to the city, Minnesota National Guard Major General Jon Jensen confirmed early Saturday.

The state has become the epicenter of violence since

George Floyd died there in an arrest by an officer who pinned him to the ground for several minutes by kneeling on his neck.

Derek Chauvin was charged Friday with one count of third-degree murder -- unintentionally causing a death -- and one count of negligent manslaughter.

"This case is now ready, and we have charged it," said county prosecutor Mike Freeman as

outrage grew over the latest death of an African American in police custody.

But the charges failed to calm a shaken nation whose deep wounds over racial inequality have been torn open anew, with riots raging from New York to Los Angeles in one of the worst nights of civil unrest in years.

In Atlanta police cruisers

were attacked and set ablaze as rallies spun out of control, while in the capital Washington protesters collided with Secret Service agents in heated midnight scenes in front of the White House.

Protests took hold in a swathe of cities including Boston, Dallas, Denver, Des Moines, Houston, Las Vegas, Memphis, and Portland.—AFP ■

Germany, Brussels seal pact on Lufthansa rescue plan: sources

FRANKFURT — Germany and the European Commission have reached agreement on a giant Berlin-funded rescue plan for coronavirus-hit Lufthansa, a Commission spokeswoman and a source close to the negotiations said Friday.

Since the pandemic hit Europe, the Lufthansa group — which also includes Brussels and Austrian Airlines and Swiss — has been bleeding one million euros per hour, with around 90 per cent of its 760-aircraft fleet grounded.

The deal would see the German carrier give up eight planes and their associated landing rights, the spokeswoman and the source said.

Lufthansa said in a statement it had “decided to accept the commitments offered by Germany to the EU Commission” for the rescue package, adding it

would surrender up to 24 take-off and landing slots that could be allocated to rival airlines.

German media had previously reported the European Commission would demand the group give up valuable takeoff and landing rights at its Frankfurt and Munich hubs in exchange for Brussels’ green light.

The nine-billion-euro (\$10 billion) German state

lifeline, would see Berlin take a 20-per cent stake in the group, with an option to claim a further five percent plus one share to block hostile takeovers.

That would make the federal government Lufthansa’s biggest shareholder. On top of a total 5.7 billion euros in extra capital and 300 million to buy the shares at face value, public investment bank KfW would also lend Lufthansa

three billion euros.

The company would agree to pay back much of the capital plus interest, while granting the state two seats on its supervisory board.

Hammering out the details of the package took so long because Chancellor Angela Merkel’s conservatives were keen to minimize state control over the company’s day-to-day running.—AFP ■

Trump announces probe of Chinese companies listed in US

WASHINGTON — US President Donald Trump on Friday ordered a probe into the actions of Chinese companies listed on American financial markets as tensions flared anew between the world’s two biggest economies.

The announcement followed Beijing’s move to implement a new security law on semi-autonomous Hong Kong that critics say would stifle freedom, as well as with Trump’s claims that China obfuscated the origins of the coronavirus that has killed more than 100,000 people in the United States.

“I’m instructing my presidential working group on financial markets to study the differing practices of Chinese companies listed on the US financial markets with the goal of protecting American investors,” Trump

said, without providing details on what steps his administration might take.

“Investment firms should not be subjecting clients to the hidden and undue risks associated with financing Chinese companies that do not play by the same rules. Americans are entitled to fairness and transparency,” he added.

As of February 2019, 156 Chinese companies with a market capitalization of \$1.2 trillion were listed on US markets, at least 11 of which were state-owned, according to the Congressionally-mandated US-China Economic and Security Review Commission. Among the largest were e-commerce giant Alibaba, China’s largest oil producer PetroChina and Sinopec, the world’s largest oil refiner.— AFP ■

Global energy leaders call for greater investment in clean electricity systems amid Covid-19 crisis

PARIS — Energy ministers and electricity industry CEOs from around the world have called for mobilizing investments for secure and sustainable power systems to offset the impact of Covid-19 crisis on the electricity sector.

The participants in a high-level virtual meeting hosted by the International

Energy Agency (IEA) recognized the critical importance of the electricity sector in response to the pandemic to keep essential services running, hospitals open and communication flowing.

“Resilient electricity systems are vital for modern societies today and for a sustainable energy future, but they need much

greater investment,” said IEA Executive Director Fatih Birol.

The IEA’s World Energy Investment 2020 report earlier this week highlighted that global investment in the power sector is set to fall 10 per cent this year, compounding previous declines.

“The drop in investment in electricity grids,

an essential but often overlooked part of the shift to cleaner energy, is set to be even steeper,” said Birol. “Renewables like wind and solar will not be able to fulfil their great promise without a robust infrastructure that reliably delivers the power they produce to consumers,” he added.— ANI ■

INFRASTRUCTURAL development of a region plays a vital role in helping the country's GDP increase and uplifting the standard of living of poor people. Development of infrastructural projects provides economic growth, creates job prospects for local residents and lifts people out of the poverty. The road transport network plays an important role in fostering economic and social development of a region, improving socioeconomic status of local people, and speeding up the flow of trade.

Sustainable development of the road transport networks would help Ayeyawady Region and Rakhine State reachable without consuming much time. Being located in a strategic position of Rakhine State's road transport network, Gwa Township connects some townships in other regions and states in the country through Ayeyawady Region and links other areas in Rakhine State via Thandwe Township. Majority of local people in Rakhine State's Gwa Township rely on motor road for travelling.

New international level wholesale market to emerge in Yangon City

AS now is time to improve multiple sectors of Yangon City, high-rise buildings, high-rise hotels, high-rise business centres and shopping malls mushroom in many parts of the city. Some of the buildings are under construction and some have completed. Currently, Seamanea Yangon wholesale market which would be the largest modern trade centre is being built in Yangon City to commission it into service soon.

Mutual cooperation

The project of international

level wholesale market is under construction on 167 acres of land at the corner of Bago River and Yadana Road in Dagon Myothit (Seikkan) Township, Yangon Region. The project is being jointly implemented by Singapore-based Seamanea Group and Ei Co Ltd of Myanmar in a mutual cooperation.

The project aims to emerge a modern wholesale market where a large volume of commodities are available at a single place as well as to become the largest and most advanced trade centre in Myanmar. To become Yangon City as a busi-

ness hub of Myanmar, industrial zones and special economic zones must be operated successfully with investments from international community and businesses. So also, it is necessary to emerge the wholesale markets meeting international standards so as to give paces for sales of products.

Construction of more than 700 shops

To be able to address such situation, an international lev-



el wholesale market is being built in the place that will be a business hub of Yangon City. The first phase of the project on 100,000 square metres of land will comprise more than 700

shops.

Car parks

A wholesale market to be formed with more than 700 shops, banks, restaurants, su-

ship use the 146-mile long Yangon-Ngathaingyoung-Gwa Road, a major road linking Ayeyawady Region, a delta area full of rivers, creeks and fertile lands with Rakhine State, an area rich in natural resources such as oil and gas reserves, for travelling to other areas. The road connecting Yangon City via Gwa Township with famous Ngapali Beach leads through the vast, evergreen flatlands in Ayeyawady Region before crossing the the Rakhine Yoma Mountain Range. The road crossing the Rakhine Yoma Mountain Range has many curves and is vital to link Rakhine State with other regions and states in the country. The distance between Yangon and Ngapali Beach, one of the most famous beach resorts in Myanmar, is around 230 miles and the travelling time from Yangon to Ngapali Beach is about 10 hours' drive.

In order to solve road transport barriers encountered by people with travel difficulties and boost infrastructural development in Ayeyawady Region and Rakhine State, A coastal road stretching 170 miles is being built at a cost of around Ks. 300 billion. Construction of bridges also plays a crucial role in building the coastal road. Upon completion of the coastal road that connects Chaungtha and

Ngwehsaung Beaches, Gaw Yin Gyi Island in Ayeyawady Region and some beach towns in Rakhine State, it is expected to take around six hours to travel from Yangon to Ngapali Beach. Officials from the Ministry of Construction take the grievances of local people into consideration in order to lessen negative effects on the environment when constructing the coastal road.

Of the bridges to be built along the coastal road, the Gwa-Makyayngu Bridge un-

der construction will be a major bridge connecting Ayeyawady Region and Rakhine State. Construction of the Gwa-Makyayngu Bridge began on 18 November 2019 and the estimated cost of the project including its approaches is Ks. 9.32 billion. The structure is being built by Special Bridge Group-8 of the Department of Bridge under the Ministry of Construction. The bridge is of a reinforced facility and measures 1,399 ft. in length, 24 ft. in width, and has the capacity to

withstand 75 tonnes of weight. Its clearance is about 20 ft. and waterway under the bridge is 85 ft. and has a 3 ft. long pedestrian walkway on each side. The project has been about 25 per cent finished so far, said Daw May Ma Tun, an in-charge engineer from the bridge construction site.

Once completed, the bridge would serve as a new trade route between Ayeyawady Region and Rakhine State and residents from nearby areas would be able to use

the facility in all seasons with greater ease. With the new road link, travellers from all corners of the country would be able to visit tourist attraction sites such as beaches and islands in Gwa and Thandwe Township by road, and Rakhine State would likely see tourism boom. In addition, the bridge would contribute to development of trade in the area, facilitate swift flow of commodities and reduce transportation charges for local people.

permarkets as well as car parks for systematic parking of vehicles in various sizes will be built

in addition to modern warehouses and advanced wide rooms.

The second phase of the

project will be implemented on 300,000 metres of land where the market to emphasize wholesale trading, the halls for expositions and hotels will be built. Such implementation aims to give better facilities to businesspersons from global countries and local and foreign manufacturers in all aspects.

Striving for implementation

The project will be implemented with three phases in construction tasks. Utmost efforts are being made for inauguration of the construction of the first phase in coming April. The second phase which will consist of more than 1,000 shops will be built after April of coming year.

The third phase of the project will comprise housing apartments, shopping malls and shopping centres as well as hotels. Arrangements are being made for the international level wholesale market in order to create business linkages and give services for production, sales

and distribution in a single place.

When the first phase of the project has been commissioned into service, it aims to give services of renting shops to small-scale businesspersons and merchants of Myanmar to do their businesses. Better stay facilities will be arranged for local and foreign entrepreneurs who arrive in Myanmar so as to operate various kinds of businesses in a single place.

Smooth transportation

Such kind of international level wholesale market in Yangon takes a position on the route to Thilawa Special Economic Zone and international ports. Moreover, the wholesale market has easy access to Yadana Hninsi Housing and Aya Chantha Advanced Housing Project as well as Emerald Bay in a short time.

Danyingon wholesale market has already been commissioned into service in Yangon. Such wholesale market emphasizes sales of various kinds of

products such as fruits, vegetables, meat and fish, dairy products. The wholesale taking a position in Insein Township of Yangon Region comprises more than 500 shops.

Sales of variety goods

The undergoing international level wholesale market will accommodate a large number of products such as textile, electronics, cosmetics, digital products, information technological products, foodstuffs, construction materials, luxuries, personal goods, household utensils and electronic products.

Emergence of an international level wholesale market and business environment in Yangon City will contribute much towards not only businesspersons but also investors so as to operate their businesses in new market and to develop economy of Yangon City.

UEFA considers ‘all options’ for Champions League format

ISTANBUL—UEFA is studying “all the options” for the format of this season's interrupted Champions League, amid reports on Friday that European football's governing body is considering moving the final from its scheduled venue in Istanbul.

The Turkish city was due to host the final this Saturday at the Ataturk Olympic Stadium, but the tournament was suspended in mid-March at the last-16 stage because of the coronavirus pandemic.

UEFA still hopes to conclude the competition by the end of August, but with major changes to the format likely and games set to be played behind closed doors.

“We are looking at all the options regarding the calendar and

the format of the competition in the working group involving the clubs, leagues and national as-

sociations,” a UEFA spokesman told AFP.

“No decision has been taken


yet but there should be at the Executive Committee meeting on June 17.”

According to a UEFA document seen by AFP, August 29 could be chosen as the new date for the final.

The New York Times reported Friday that the final would be moved from Turkey but that Istanbul could be chosen as host of a future final, when it is safe for fans to travel from abroad in large numbers.

Turkey, a country of 83 million, has so far recorded 4,461 coronavirus-related deaths and nearly 161,000 confirmed cases.

The country is currently in the process of loosening lockdown measures introduced to halt the spread of the virus and its domestic football season is set to resume on June 12.—AFP ■

Sports Minister Vincenzo Spadafora on Thursday gave the government's approval for a restart on June 20, in a championship which has been suspended since March 9.

“The clubs welcomed the green light given yesterday by Minister Spadafora for the resumption of Serie A and voted unanimously to play the four postponed matches on the weekend of June 20-21,” Serie A said in a statement.

The four matches in question are Atalanta v Sassuolo, Hellas Verona v Cagliari, Inter Milan v Sampdoria and Torino v Parma.

The league added that the 27th round of matches would be organized from the week of June 22.

“Dates and times of the matches will be announced in the coming days,” it added.

As Spadafora had requested, Italian Cup matches will take place the previous week with the final of that tournament on June 17.

No dates have been given yet for the return legs of the semi-finals, with Napoli set to host Inter Milan and Juventus at home against AC Milan, but they could be played on the weekend of June 13 and 14.—AFP ■



It was a sunny day after two consecutive days of raining. I have been in a conversation with a security man from our company. I accidentally knew about him that he went to university and left the university over two decades ago.

Sayagyi ('Revered teacher') the late Dr. Than Tun (6 April 1923-30 November 2005) would turn (if he were still alive) 97 on 6 April 2020. Dr Than Tun was a preminent and native historian of Burma of the late 20th century. His undergraduate degrees were from Rangoon University specializing in history. He obtained two earned doctorates from the University of London in 1956 and 1990 respectively (see below). He was Professor of History from University of Mandalay from 1965 till his retirement in 1983. He was a Visiting Professor in Northern Illinois University in the United States and in Kyoto University in Japan in the 1980s. He published English language academic journal articles on history both in Burmese and English and many books in Burmese mainly on historical themes.

In his historical writings Than Tun gave major reliance not (not) on what the Burmese (now Myanmar) or indeed foreign chroniclers wrote in their 'histories'. Instead his research methodology and historical research was based mainly on empirical work by collecting, collating and interpreting the historical events recorded in epigraphs, inscriptions and votive tablets throughout the ages.

In late March 2020 I bought and read History of Buddhism in Burma, 1000 to 1300 AD by Dr Than Tun (4th printing January 2020). I am grateful to the publishers for not 'reverting' or changing the word Burma, Burmese, Burman, Pagan mentioned in the original manuscript of Than Tun to the current vogue of expressions: 'Myanmar' 'Bamar' and 'Bagan'. In any case, it is a histor-

ical distortion (I trust Sayagyi Dr Than Tun would not necessarily disagree with this) to wily-nilly change formally, officially as well as informally and unofficially and retrospectively the terms used in historical documents like Than Tun's Ph.D. thesis of 1956.

Seik Ku Cho Cho စိတ်ကူးချိချိ publishing house republished a 'revised and enlarged' edition of then Ph.D. candidate Than Tun's thesis for his Ph.D. submitted to the Faculty of Arts, University of London in the year 1956.

As a dilettante but with an interest in history and things historical I have learned a lot from Than Tun's tome or treatise (no less). There are quite a few typos (not Than Tun's but probably those of the publishers) of the 4th edition. There are a few grammatical or stylistic expressions a few of those may be those of (or by) Than Tun himself of which I would respectfully point out only one stylistic issue.

Throughout his thesis Than Tun used the phrase 'It is interesting to note' at the very least about 15 times. I recall that the post

graduate theses guidelines in 1979 at the Faculty of Law at Monash University in Australia states to the effect that 'Do not overuse phrases such as it is noteworthy, it is interesting... just make it noteworthy or interesting but eschew the over-use of these phrases'.

Notwithstanding such stylistic issues it is intellectually challenging to learn from the late blunt-speaking, forthright historian.

Another landmark achievement of Than Tun should be stated. About 34 years after Than Tun was awarded a Doctorate (Ph.D.) by the University of London in 1956 the same University awarded him a second Doctorate (D. Litt, Doctor of Literature) in 1990 for his 10 volume (over 7000 pages) collection, collation and skeletal translations of the royal orders issued by various Burmese kings from the years 1598 to 1885 in The Royal Orders of Burma published by the University of Kyoto, the Center for Southeast Asian Studies between the years 1983 to 1990. (The publication of The Royal Orders of Burma, in

part, a collective effort. In the first volume Than Tun thanked about 46 persons by name for their assistance in their collection and compilation).

This writer would only 'skim' the postulates provided with strong, convincing epigraphic evidence Than Tun made in his earlier work (in his first doctoral thesis). Around 95% of the time this writer was unable to read the phonetic transliteration of the medieval Burmese (that was the term used by Than Tun). There is one photographic reproduction of a single sentence inscription in medieval (or is it early?) Burmese from a votive by or about King Aniruddha (Anawrahta). This writer is unable to decipher it.

Apparently, Than Tun did not translate his full thesis from English into Burmese. (Incidentally colloquial Burmese was Dr. Than Tun's style of writing from the mid-1960s). Still, I have seen a few segments of his thesis being translated by himself into Burmese in the Universities Central Library website.

(3) The 'revered' King *Kyan Sitttha* ကျွန်စစ်သား (Dr Than Tun transliterated as *Thiluin Man*) သီးလိုင်မင်း was (a) usurper (page 24) and (b) interloper (page 319)! Than Tun listed only Thiluin Man as a 'usurper' among the 12 Pagan kings during the period he discussed (page 24).

(4) Than Tun stated that Aniruddha 'only' prayed that he attained 'nirvana' but the arguably more ambitious or

egotistical (my words not that of Than Tun) Thiluin Man (Kyan Sitt Thar) and Cansu I (One) ခင်သု ၁ (Alaung Sithu) အလောင်းစည်သူ prayed not only for nirvana (nibbana) နိဗ္ဗာန် but for Buddhahood (in contemporary Myanmar language *hsu-gyee-pan?*)

(5) The peak of the Pagan Empire at least in terms of territorial demarcations (based on conquests) was not during Kings Aniruddha's and Thiluin Man's time but during the time of 'Cansu II' ('Narapati Sithu) နရပတိစည်သူ

(6) Before Aniruddha's time the Burmans (Bamas) were a 'raw' ethnic group' and the Mons 'the conquered were, in a sense, conquerors' culturally over the Burmans.

(7) Mon language was used extensively starting from Aniruddha's time and especially in Thiluin Man's time. Mon rather than Burmese was ostensibly the Court language and definitely the main language of most of the inscriptions of the period from about 1084 when Thiluin Man became king of Pagan to about

1174 when 'Cansu II' ခင်သု ၂ (*Narapati Sithu*) became king.

(8) 'The Burmanisation' (Than Tun's term) started with Cansu II (Narapati Sithu) around 1174. Quite a few times Than Tun inferred that the Burmans owe a lot to the Mons linguistically and culturally. 'Burmanisation' started around 1174 and the Burmese language *Myanmar Sar* မြန်မာစာ or should it be/is it? *Bamar Sar* ဗမာစာ) became more in use only in late 12th century.

(9) The Arigyi the supposedly corrupted 'monks' have been de-based or denigrated by the chroniclers. Than Tun argued that the Ari did not exist before the supposed arrival of 'pure' Theravada Buddhism to Pagan around 1057 (through Shin Arahan) but only in the 13th century where they were quite popular at that time. Monks belonging to that particular sect, in some religious festivals, drank liquor and ate meat and that was about all the 'deviant' monks of the era did. Later chroniclers not only exaggerated the supposed shenanigans of the Arigyis but wrongly assigned the Aris to the earlier (11th) rather than the 13th century.

Almost all of the the points mentioned above do not conform to what this writer was taught (until middle school) in the history texts and in history lessons. Arguably, it can perhaps be stated that some if not almost all of the points summarised above have not (not) been incorporated in current middle and high school texts,

In relatively recent Myanmar contemporary history and to be 'provincial',

the writers (perhaps not yet the 'chroniclers') of the eighth standard history text of 2018-19 academic year mentioned the artificial or 'puffed up' term *khitpyaung taw hlan yae* ခေတ်ပြောင်းတော်လှန်ရေး (*epoch-changing revolution*) in its literal translation) to describe the take over of March 1962 and subsequent events that engulfed if not almost blighted the country.

The text also used the derogatory term *pyi pyae* ပြည်ပြူး (the English translation 'expatriate group' does not fully convey the derogatory nature of the term *pyi pyae*) to describe the followers of former Prime Minister U Nu (25 May 1907-14 February 1995)'s failed rebellion from 1969 to 1980. Are we still in the Burma Socialist Programme Party (BSPP) era? (Incidentally around 2005 I have seen a paper written in English by Than Tun and published by the Myanmar Historical Commission where he strongly critiqued the BSPP regime. I have not seen such critiques by Than Tun written in the Burmese language).


This writer did mention to two current full-time and adjunct Professors of History about these anomalies if not distortions in middle school, high school history texts. Independently, both informed me that the middle and high school history texts are in the process of being revised.

Even when the new texts are produced may we really see substantive and necessary changes in terminology and orientation regarding contemporary Burmese history? Would any of Dr Than Tun's 'revised' and measured analyses say of the Pagan (Bagan) era be incorporated in the 'revised' history texts? ■






